He really knows furs, restyling, remodeling, designing, ALL the business. Best of all, he's nice to deal with. If you are thinking of a fur coat, stop in and look over the stock at Cummings'. RECRUITING FOR WEBFOOT GROUP STARTS

Recruiting in Klamath Falls for Company B of the maintenance battalion of the 14th armored division was started here Thursday by Major G. C. Cowan of the ordnance department, U. S. Army.

A. A. Turner of Turner Chevrolet company has been named contact man for the recruiting program in Klamath Falls, it was stated by Major Cowan, who was accompanied here by A. F. Seranos of Portland. Applications for enlistment and other information may be obtained from Turner.

Company B is being recruited as a "Webfoot" group, composed strictly of Oregon men. Wanted for the company are master mechanics, electricians, store keepers, motor experts, company clerks, cooks, heavy truck drivers, welders, and generally all men of mechanical inclinations.

Applicants will be interviewed at the Willard hotel on July 28, it was announced.

Under the new army pay bill a man going in as a technician, sixth grade, will draw \$34 per month, and if he has a wife and child he can allot \$22 to his dependents and the government will match it with \$40, giving his wife and child a total of \$62. This will leave the enlisted man \$32 for pocket money since he has all of his equipment, clothing, lodging and food furnished by the army at no cost to him.

Most of the enlisted personnel will be taken in technical grades with pay running as high as \$138.
