Ceiling Break May Up Canned Fruits, Berries 10-25%

WASHINGTON, July 25 (AP)—The first break in the price administration's ceiling over food costs might result in a 10 to 25 per cent increase in the prices of the 1942 pack of canned fruits and berries, the OPA said Friday.

Administrator Leon Henderson previously had indicated the break would be "more than 15 per cent."

A formal statement from his office Friday said an order probably would be issued within two weeks, "possibly lifting wholesale and retail prices 10 to 25 per cent, depending on the item affected."

Eat a Green Vegetable Daily, Nutritionist Says

One green vegetable every day, more if possible—that's what everyone needs, according to the nation's nutrition experts.

Wilted Greens

To every 2 quarts of greens, measured after they are looked over and washed, allow 1 cup bacon fat, 1 cup vinegar, and if desired 1 small onion, chopped. Cook onion in bacon fat until

Vegetable-Meat Loaf

One-half cup uncooked rolled oats, 1 cup boiling water, 2 teaspoons salt, 1 tablespoon fat, 1 small onion, chopped, 2 cups chopped cooked green vegetable, 1 1/2 pounds ground beef. Add rolled oats gradually to boiling, lightly salted water. Stir and boil for 3 minutes. Melt fat and cook onion in it a few minutes. Add other ingredients and mix thoroughly. Form into loaf in greased shallow pan. Bake in moderate oven (350 deg. F.) about 1 1/2 hours.

Shredded Green Beans and Fresh Pork

Melt 2 tablespoons fat in pan, add 1 quart shredded green beans and 1 teaspoon salt. Cover and cook about 20 minutes, turning beans frequently. Add 2 cups shredded cooked pork. Stir until pork is well mixed with beans and cook for about 5 minutes.

Add Enriched Bread to New Summer Dishes

Add enriched white bread to main dishes of vegetables from your victory garden. It will give extra vitamins, proteins and energy food to your diet.

Golden Squash Crisp

(serves 6)
Three small yellow summer squash, 1 tablespoon minced onion, 1 tablespoon butter, 1 pound hamburger, 2 slices enriched bread, 1 tablespoon cat sup, 1 teaspoon salt, 1 teaspoon pepper, 1 cup buttered coarse enriched bread crumbs.

Halve squash lengthwise; peel and parboil until almost tender. Drain and remove seeds, leaving shells for stuffing. Cook onion in butter for 1 minute; add meat and heat until brown. Combine with enriched bread cut in small cubes, catsup and seasonings stuff shells and place filled side down in shallow buttered baking dish. Brush tops with any melted fat and sprinkle thickly with bread crumbs. Bake in hot oven (400 deg. F.) until golden brown—about 15 minutes. Serve plain or with well-seasoned to mato sauce.

Baked Carrot Shortcake

(serves 6)
Six slices enriched bread, 1 cup grated raw carrot, 1 table spoon grated onion, 1 cup diced celery, 2 eggs, slightly beaten, 1 cup milk, 2 tablespoons melted butter, 1 tablespoon salt, 1 teaspoon pepper.

Cut enriched bread into cubes and combine with carrot onion and celery. Combine beat an eggs, milk, and blend with first mixture. Press into shallow but tere baking dish, making mix ture about 1 inch thick. Bake in moderate oven (375 deg. F.) until brown—about 40 minutes. Cut in squares and serve with a mixture of creamed vegetables like peas, celery, and radishes or corn, green pepper and lima beans.

Goldwyn Forecasts Early Death for Double Feature

CHICAGO, July 25 (AP)—Samuel Goldwyn, the Hollywood producer, forecasts an early death for double feature movies. Twin bills have been taking too much of the time that should be devoted to war subjects, he said yesterday in an interview broadcast by radio station WGN. By war subjects, Goldwyn said, he meant films that would tell the public how they can best help the government carry on the war to a successful conclusion.
