The St. Louis Cardinals, about the only outfit able to make things interesting for Brooklyn, wheeled into Ebbets field today for a three-round showdown of Durocher's Darlings.

The pre-setters coasted up to the important series yesterday by stopping the Pittsburgh Pirates twice without dipping into the "big four" of their pitching staff, while second-place St. Louis split with the Boston Braves and slipped back another notch, seven lengths behind.

Today the Dodgers planned to lead with their ace, Lefty Larry French, who has rested exactly a week.

The Dodgers nipped the Pirates, 3-2 and 5-3, scoring all the runs they needed in the first three innings of each game. Joe Medwick drove in all the Brooklyn markers in the opener with a pair of doubles and Dolph Camilli paced the attack in the nightcap with a triple, double and single.

After two weeks in Casey Stengel's canine cottage for loafing on the mound, Tom Earley came out and stopped the Cardinals cold as he pitched the Braves to a 5-2 decision in the first game, but the Cardinals took the second, 5-3, with the help of some nifty relief hurling by Harry Gumbert.

Cincinnati regained third place by whipping the New York Giants, 6-2 and 2-1, and dropping them back into the four spot.

At Philadelphia, three home runs in one game by Catcher Clyde McCullough couldn't keep the Phils from turning back the Chicago Cubs, 4-3 and 6-1.

In the American league, the New York Yankees downed the Detroit Tigers, 5-2, in the only single game of the day, but added a game and a half to their long lead with the help of the

SEATTLE, July 27 (AP)—California's touring tennis troupe, which has won virtually every title in Oregon and Washington the past three weeks, headed for the Spokane and the inland empire championship tournament today after taking six of 10 crowns at the annual Washington state meet here yesterday.

The Spokane show will open Wednesday and close Saturday.

Nick Carter, San Francisco, became one of the few triple champions of this area when he won the Washington men's singles title yesterday, defeating Harry Roche, also of San Francisco, 7-5, 6-1, 6-2.

The Chicago White Sox and Philadelphia Athletics split, Chicago winning the opener for Ted Lyons, 2-1, on a triple by Joe Kuhel and a single by Bob Kennedy in the ninth and Philadelphia taking the second, 3-2 in 10 innings, with Leonard Harris tossing a four-hitter and Dee Miles singing home the winning rally.

The Suds beat the last place Portland Beavers 6 to 1 Saturday then won yesterday, 6 to 2 and 4 to 0, to stick in third place, the triple victory gave the Rainiers all seven games of the series with the tail spinning Beavers.

The Rainiers collected 12 bingles in the opener yesterday while Larry Gury was holding the Beavers to six scattered safeties in the opener, then scored four runs off six singles, a walk and an error in the nightcap as Carl Fischer handuffed the Portlanders with three hits in seven innings.

Lord Byron Boots Lead In 'Shanter

Faces Heafner Today in Playoff for Pro Crown After Collapse With 77

CHICAGO, June 27 (AP)—Byron Nelson, shaken by one of the most amazing collapses in the history of big-time golf, went out bleakly today to battle Clayton Heafner of Linville, N. C., in an 18-hole playoff for \$25000 first money in the Tam o'Shanter open tournament. The starting time was noon PWT.

Nelson, the tall ex-Texan, was a woebegone figure, and a lot of exceptionally smart money had

been bet over-night that he would lose to Heafner, the blond giant who won the Mahoning Valley tournament at Gerard, Ohio, a few weeks ago with an astonishing 72-hole total of 284.

It was a crusher—what happened to Nelson yesterday. One of the world's great golfers, he shot a miserable 77 over a course whose true par is about 70, to dissipate a lead that had looked impregnable and finish in a tie for the fourth, fourth with 195's.

Sheverly Nusom, Quincy, Ore., scored 191X200 to capture the women's title. Mrs. Clara Ray, Coquille, was second with 180.

The 100-target handicap event was won by Carl Carbon, Spokane, with 95 hits. Ceighton Jones, Gervais, was second with 94.

The 200-target handicap was won by Don Fraser, Sun Valley, Idaho.
