

WLB REFUSES WAGE INCREASE IN NEW YORK

WASHINGTON, July 29 (AP)—The war labor board has refused to grant a general wage increase to 1200 Remington Rand company employees in New York's Tona-wanda and North Tona-wanda plants because, it decided, two recent pay raises they received more than compensated for higher living costs since Jan. 1, 1941.

Applying its wage stabilization formula for the first time since it was set forth in the Little Steel case, the board rejected the CIO United Electrical, Radio and Machine Workers' demands for a 10-cents an hour raise but approved a 2 1/2 cent increase for women employees hired on an incentive basis.

The added amount brought the women employees' hourly pay to 50 cents reducing inequalities, the board said, between their wages and those of the men. Citing the formula based on a general rule that workers need 15 per cent more money than they were receiving Jan. 1, 1941, to offset higher living costs, the board declared that their pay raises totaling 18 cents an hour for men and 11 cents for women more than met the scale.

Workability
Dean Wayne L. Morse, public member of the board, suggested that the decision demonstrated the "workability" of the stabilization formula which in the Little Steel case gave more than 150,000 workers a 44-cents-a-day raise instead of the dollar their union asked.

Almond Clough, field organizer in charge of the union's Buffalo, N. Y., office said the WLB decision "virtually means wage freezing," and added he did not think it a "fair one." He disputed the board's formula of a 15 per cent increase to compensate for higher living costs, saying union surveys show costs in the Buffalo area have gone up 25 per cent.

TAXIS MUST CEASE LUXURY SERVICES

Taxicabs must cease all unessential and luxury services such as sight-seeing, hauling passengers to race tracks, ball games and similar services, to be eligible for new tires, Richard G. Montgomery, state OPA director, said today.

Considerable latitude is given the local war price and rationing boards but the interpretation of OPA's legal department on the eligibility of taxicabs for new tires, follows:

"Taxi service in order to be eligible under section 504 (a) (1) of revised tire rationing regulations must be essential for mass transportation in the community. Upon application for tires, local boards should consider whether the applicant is supplying taxi service to race tracks, for sight seeing trips or for other non-essential purposes. Section 611 (b) indicates that if service constitutes a luxury means of transportation a certificate for tires should be denied."

West Refineries, Distilleries Enter Rubber Picture

PORTLAND, July 29 (AP)—West coast distilleries and sugar refineries could be used to convert surplus wheat from the Pacific northwest to synthetic rubber, J. B. Cella, president of a California wine company, said here yesterday.

He told a reporter that the plants could use grain already in storage to make 75,000,000 gallons of ethyl alcohol in a year. He estimated it would produce 150,000,000 pounds of synthetic rubber.

Cella declared that the distilleries have all the facilities, men and material needed.

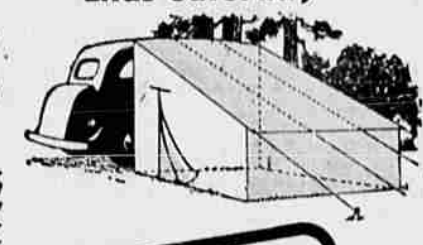
