Long, Hard War Necessary to Lick Japs, Fisher Says

termined to relegate Japan to a minor place in world affairs.

He sees no possibility of a popular revolt against the Japanese military dictatorship. Nor does he see any possibility of an economic collapse in Japan. We might as well make up our minds, he says, that Japan will have to be defeated in war.

Pearl Harbor and the ensuing swift campaigns in the Philippines, Malaya, the Dutch East Indies and Burma were no swift impulsive developments on the part of Japan, Dr. Fisher told his audience. Preparation for all of these campaigns was going on openly in Japan during nearly all the years he was there, even to the green paint on the faces of Japan's jungle soldiers. Years ago, he says, he saw the tactics for these jungle campaigns being practiced openly in and near Japan's great cities and heard Japanese military and naval officers laugh derisively when the British turned the guns of their great citadel at Singapore to the sea only. They were even then planning to take Singapore from the rear.

Preparation
Years before the war began in Europe the Japs were teaching their soldiers to swim in heavy field equipment so that Hongkong and Singapore could be taken from across the water when the time came. All this he cited as evidence of the long preparation they have made for the war.

Russia and Japan, he said in answer to questions, are hereditary enemies, and their present non-aggression treaty is merely a truce that deceives neither side. The Western Aleutian islands, he thinks, must be retaken from the Japs at whatever cost may be necessary, as they are not only advanced bases for invasion of Alaska, which is definitely on the Japanese program, but in addition are flank threats to any help we may try to give to Russia as well as listening posts to detect and report hours in advance American bombing expeditions against Japan, thus warning the Japanese of the approach of our bombers and enabling them to be ready.

No Love for Nazis
Japan has no love for Germany, he answered a questioner, and whenever the interests of the two come into conflict there will be war. Japan, he says, entered the axis in pique because of her treatment as an inferior race by Britain and the United States.

As proof of his assertion that no love is lost between the Germans and the Japanese, he cited the fact that large numbers of Jews have found sanctuary in Japan and receive protection despite angry protest by Germany.

Siberia, Australia and Alaska, he told his hearers, are all definitely within the orbit of Japan's war aims, and can not be dismissed as scenes of future conflict—which may begin any time.

isdiction of a military commission declared during his argument today that only one of the men had any intention of communicating with Germany.

That one was named by Colonel Kenneth Royall, one of the officers assigned to defend the eight nazis before the panel of seven generals, was Edward John Kerling.

Portugal Address

Kerling, leader of the group of four explosive-laden men who landed from a submarine at Ponte Vedra, Fla., had an address in Portugal which could be used as a relay point for communications intended for Germany.

Attorney General Biddle, discussing the validity of the military commission established by President Roosevelt to try eight alleged nazis saboteurs, told the supreme court today that the president could not be made answerable to it while acting as commander-in-chief of the nation's armed forces.

He expressed this view in response to a question by Justice Jackson while arguing in opposition to a petition by seven of the eight nazis who came from Germany by submarine for a writ which would take them out of the custody of the military commission before which they are on trial for their lives.

The central issue before the court is the contention of counsel for the prisoners that a presidential proclamation denying them the use of the civil courts and ordering a military trial is "totally invalid and unconstitutional."

shortest possible time, a highly trained military force.

"It is our responsibility to win the war, to win it as quickly as possible, and to win it with the least possible sacrifice of American lives," he declared.

"To accomplish this we must have skilled, hardened soldiers who are better prepared and more highly proficient in the science of warfare than our enemies whose preparation for this conflict extends over a period of ten years and longer."

Missed Point

Concluding that Stimson has "missed the point of immediate seriousness" involved in the northwest harvest, Nye asked for a conference with the war secretary.

Nye asserted that the recent deferment for 30 days of men recently called for induction in the army was "only scratching the surface" of the need.

"I am ready to agree that our paramount concern at the moment is that of affording a military power, but after all, there is a tremendous heap of military power in the producing and saving of an adequate food supply," Nye said.

and California avenue to prevent any fires that sweep the hills from entering the city. In addition, Ambrose and men selected from crews on duty have been attending to individual requests to have lots burned off in the order the requests are received.

"We can't begin to keep up with the long waiting list ahead," he said, "and I should like to urge persons to undertake burning weeds on their own property or adjacent vacant lots. This can be done safely, if a few simple precautions are observed."

Here is how it should be done. First obtain a permit from the fire department. Cut weeds back a few feet from fences, trees or other inflammable objects. Have a garden hose on hand long enough to reach around the area to be burned. Burn against the wind, preferably in the morning. Burning at night is prohibited by order of Lt. Gen. DeWitt, commander of the western defense area. Don't leave the fire until the last spark is out.

Ambrose cautioned people to haul away trash piles which have accumulated before attempting to burn an area or requesting the fire department to do so. The fact that these smolder for a long time creates an unnecessary hazard and slows up the work of the firemen in burning off vacant lots.

14-Year-Old Indian Boy Held for Alturas Murder

SACRAMENTO, July 30 (P) — A 14-year-old Indian boy, Donald Geary, was held for murder today in the shooting of his hunting companion, Wilbur Barlese, 13, on an Indian reservation near Alturas.

U. S. Attorney Emmet Seawell ordered a first degree murder charge filed against the boy. District Attorney Charles Lederer of Modoc county said young Geary had confessed he shot Barlese, also an Indian, at close range in a fit of rage.

The two had been hunting all Monday afternoon on the X-1 Rancheria, where the boys lived,

the sons of farm workers. "I got sleepy and must have dozed," the sheriff quoted Geary. "Any way, when I woke up Wilbur was shooting at a target in back of me. He was firing over my head. That made me mad, so I shot him."

Geary at first said his friend took his own life, then said he shot him accidentally. Confronted with Barlese's powder-burned shirt, he then admitted he shot the boy with his small-caliber rifle, the sheriff said.

A United States marshal is bringing the boy here for trial in federal court.

series of attacks, had gained some ground in the Kletskaya sector, 80 miles northwest of Stalingrad, but the communists added:

"All attempts by the Germans to drive wedges into our defenses failed."

This indicated that the Russians were doggedly holding their lines intact, slowly yielding where necessary, and frustrating the Nazi tactics of encirclement and annihilation.

Nazi Gains

On the far southern front, where Gen. Fedor von Bock's armies are striking toward the Caucasus oil treasures, the Russians conceded fresh German gains in the Bataisk sector, 15 miles below Rostov-on-Don.

A bulletin from Nazi field headquarters declared German troops had stormed and captured the town of Proletarskaya, 100 miles below the lower Don, thereby cutting the last direct rail line to the Caucasus oil fields. Oil may still be shipped, however, up the Caspian sea to the rail-river city of Astrakhan on the Volga.

The reported advance to Proletarskaya meant that the Germans had now swept 100 miles southeast beyond Rostov in their drive to the Caspian, and the speed of the thrust across the steppes indicated that they were meeting little opposition. Proletarskaya is 175 miles southwest of Stalingrad.

formed air sources said, while the British lost nine bombers of the considerable force which made the 700-mile foray, first against that city since November 8, 1940.

This was partly offset by destruction of eight of the Nazi raiders which made a series of overnight "nuisance" attacks on Britain's Midlands and dropped some bombs in London for the first time since June 3.

RAF fighters sped across the channel to continue the coastal raids today.

The British attacks on submarines in the Bay of Biscay area far from shore are being countered by German fighter formations, and dog fights between RAF bombers and Nazi Messerschmitt and Arado fighter patrols are becoming almost daily occurrences, informed air sources said.
