tical sense as "parachutists or invading armies" and had no constitutional rights.

The defense declared that some of the prisoners, at least, were in effect refugees from Germany and had no intention of actually using the training and the explosives with which they came equipped.

Further, the defense had contended that President Roosevelt's order closing the civil courts to specified types of persons was "totally invalid and unconstitutional."

In handing down its decision at the end of an extraordinary three-day session, the court observed that it "has fully considered the questions raised."

Chief Justice Stone announced that the court denied the prisoners' motion to file writs of habeas corpus.

Only seven of the eight accused saboteurs sought the writ.

into a death trap for the nazis. Soviet armored trains rolled into the shell-torn battle area, bringing up fresh reinforcements to bolster red army veterans who appeared to be slowly turning the tide against the Germans.

Caucasus Gains

While the situation along the Don river bend visibly improved, the soviet command acknowledged that Marshal Fedor von Bock's armies had scored new gains in the critical struggle in the northern Caucasus.

German field headquarters asserted that nazi troops had crossed the lower Don on a 150-mile front, and German military dispatches reported that nazi columns lunging into the Caucasus had captured the important rail junction of Kuschchevka, 45 miles south of Rostov.

Nazi military quarters said German vanguards were making quick headway in two big columns south of Rostov and beyond Proletarskaya, and declared that according to information reaching Berlin the soviet retreat at several points became a disorderly flight.

Confirmation still was lacking for a Vichy (French) radio broadcast report yesterday that German troops from the Crimea had crossed the narrow Kerch strait to the Caucasus mainland and were impinging the Russians below Bataisk.

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ALLIED BOMBERS HIT DESTROYER, FIRE TRANSPORT

tralia, causing slight damage and one casualty, and made a futile, single-plane night attack on Horn Island, in the Torres Strait.

Keeping up their own offensive operations, allied heavy bombers pounced on the destroyer-escorted Japanese transport 100 miles off Gona mission, Papua, and scored five direct hits, leaving the vessel spouting flames visible for 30 miles.

Then the destroyer escort was machinegunned from low level and her anti-aircraft guns silenced.

The transport, described by today's communique as a medium-sized cargo vessel, was the fifth enemy ship damaged or sunk since the Japanese invaded the Papuan peninsula last week. Heretofore one transport was sunk and two others and a destroyer were hit by allied bombs.

From all yesterday's operations three allied planes were missing.

For the first time in several days allied headquarters said there was no ground activity at Kokoda, inland village midway between Gona mission and the allied base at Port Moresby. The latter was attacked by three Japanese night raiders without damage.

Enough Aluminum

Richard S. Reynolds, president of the Reynolds Metals company, Richmond, Va., testified that he had informed Kaiser that enough aluminum could be produced for the flying boats.

Reynolds said aluminum production, using bauxite from Arkansas, could be expanded "as fast as Kaiser can build his ships."

The only problem, he said, was water power.

"We might have to ask the American people to go back to kerosene lamps to save freedom for the world," Reynolds said, explaining that he "imagined electricity would have to be diverted from the homes."

Reynolds suggested the committee hear Simon Lake, inventor of the submarine, and other experts on Lake's plans for cargo submarines, capable of transporting tanks and other war materials.

Chairman Lee (D-Ore.) of a military subcommittee seeking support of a resolution to set up a separate board to produce 70-ton flying boats said the smaller cargo planes should be built "in far greater numbers" than projected.

Petrillo Deprives Public to Get At Unions, Charge

NEW YORK, July 31 (AP)—Neville Miller, president of the National Association of Broadcasters, today charged James C. Petrillo, president of the American Federation of Musicians (AFM), with seeking to deprive the public of recorded music "in order to get at the few establishments which he believes should employ union musicians."

Through Petrillo, the AFM has ordered a ban on making recordings for radio and other public use which Petrillo says comprises 95 per cent of the music heard in the United States and Canada. The ban is effective at midnight tonight.

"Our order has not changed,"

Petrillo told newsmen last night in making public a letter to Chairman James Lawrence Fly of the federal communications commission, who has said he would look into the recording matter and also into Petrillo's cancellation of broadcasts by the National High School orchestra at Interlochen, Mich.

9 Indicted on International Spy Ring Charge

NEWARK, N. J., July 31 (AP)—A federal grand jury returned today an indictment charging Herbert Karl Friedrich Bahr, 29, formerly of Buffalo, N. Y., and eight men in foreign countries with setting up an international spy ring to gather information on war industries and the armed forces of the United States.

The indictment said the ring had offices in Madrid, Spain; Zurich, Switzerland; Rio de Janeiro, Brazil; Istanbul, Turkey, and Stockholm, Sweden.

The others named in the indictment, which charged them with conspiracy to commit espionage against the United States, were:

Karl Bauer, Max Bucholz and Dr. "Otto" Baum, all of Germany; Otto Lindt of Switzerland; Don Julian Rubio of Madrid; Alfredo Mae of Rio de Janeiro; Izante Wennberg of Stockholm and C. J. Saridaki of Istanbul.

AFL PLANS MEET TO FURTHER PAY RAISE

Representatives of AFL Lumber and Sawmill workers local unions in Washington, Oregon, California, Idaho and Montana will meet Sunday in Boise, Idaho, to "further their efforts toward getting a larger wage raise and better working conditions for the pine industry," local headquarters of the union said today.

Hugh R. Haddock, president of the Klamath Basin District council who will attend the conference from here, said the union hopes to adjust minimum wage differences between pine and fir industries and place wages for women on the same level as those for men. "Because of the present higher wage being paid in fir, the pine operations are losing a great number of their skilled workers to the fir," the union announcement said.

The labor office said that in recent negotiations with the AFL-LSW, employers offered a 7 1/2 cent per hour boost retroactive to April 1 as a settlement of demands for a 90-cent per hour minimum scale retroactive to February 10 and a work week of five consecutive eight hour days.

The offer was accepted, according to the union, as a partial settlement with the understanding that a final decision be left to the War Labor board.

PORTLAND, July 31 (AP)—The state public welfare commission reported today the first case of a needy Oregon family of German race which may receive funds from the German government. The case was referred to the state agency by the federal social security board.

The wife, whose husband is held in an internment camp as a dangerous German alien, is of uncertain citizenship. If she is proved a German national, money will be forwarded by the German government through the Swiss legation to the state commission. If she is an American citizen, as she claims, money will be supplied from an emergency fund provided through federal security.

RAF KEEPS UP AIR WAR ON NAZI EUROPE

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but without any particular enthusiasm or excitement.

This dispatch, evidently written to pass rigid censorship, implied a Russian conviction that British air attacks alone do not satisfy Russia's need for second front action and that the British effort had suffered in Russian eyes by recent comparison with the Russians' simultaneous fight for life in south and repeated air attacks on eastern Germany.

While fighting what are probably the bloodiest battles of the war, the red army also has been able to bomb Germany, having made at least four recent attacks on Koenigsberg, East Prussia.

craft and added that one American plane was lost. The pilot, however, was saved.

Downed Two

Capt. Albert J. Baunier shot down two of the Japanese bombers, the war bulletin said, the same number as credited yesterday to Maj. John E. Allison of Gainesville, Fla.

All four of the bombers were downed in the first raid. It was while returning from this engagement that the one American plane casualty crashed when coming in for a landing.

The three enemy fighters were destroyed during the second attack to bring the score to seven, the biggest single day's bag since the regular U. S. air force succeeded the American volunteer group on July 1.

The communique's reference to the new-type Japanese Zero was the first made of the use of these planes in China. It was believed they were brought in to deal especially with the American planes, but their first day's work was a flop.

Every one of the bombers they were escorting turned tail before getting to its target.

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
