EIGHT KLAMATH YOUNG PEOPLE ATTEND MEETS

Four Klamath young people attended the nineteenth eastern Oregon summer school for church workers and young people from June 15-26, and four attended the vacation church school camp from July 6-17. Both are sponsored by the Episcopal church and are held at Cove in the Blue mountains near LaGrande.

Those attending the summer school were June Bosworth, Betty Glidden, Willis Glidden and Billy Radcliffe. The two-week camp was enjoyed by Molly Cashin and Harlan Bosworth Jr., of Klamath Falls, Chuck Evans of Prospect and Ted Pepple of Bonanza.

Hazel Morrison, district field worker for the Episcopal church, accompanied the young people to and from Cove and was assistant director of the vacation camp. She also was one of the camp officers at the summer school, being custodian of the church and altar.

A religious program of inter- national interest and importance will be broadcast Sunday, Aug- ust 2, at 10:30 a. m. (PWT) over the combined networks of the Mutual Broadcasting system in the United States, and CBS in the British Isles, and CBS in Canada. Attempts are also be- ing made to include Australia and New Zealand in this world- wide network.

The first portion of this signif- icant broadcast, which will reach almost all the allied nations, will originate in St. Louis and will feature the Lutheran hour. Dr. Walter A. Maier, well-known ra- dio preacher, will deliver the gospel message, "Bringing Christ to the Nations."

The second part of this half- hour religious broadcast will originate somewhere in the Brit- ish Isles and will feature an out- standing leader of religious life in Great Britain.
