

# LUMBER MILLS CONCENTRATE ON WAR EFFORT

Klamath's lumber industry is making a determined effort to get lumber to the places where it will do the most good in the war program, Don Drury, Klamath Plywood manager, told the Kiwanis club in a talk Thursday in which he outlined the effects of war conditions on industry here.

Drury told of the changes that have taken place in the war period to create a definite "war" market, with buyer and seller reversed in their relationships. He related the problems the industry is having in finding labor, with a resultant increase in mechanization and the employment of women.

Priorities, he said, add to the troubles of the industrialist seeking greater mechanization of his operations.

He said that an outstanding development of the period has been power tree felling equipment. Three such machines have been introduced here. He said they have some "bugs" in them but these are being ironed out. Skilled operators are needed for these machines, but the work is easier.

**Here to Stay**  
Discussing wartime industrial developments, Drury said the economy grain bins, which are now being constructed here for orders totaling about \$1,500,000, are a "very clever product" and represent a phase of the lumber industry that is here to stay.

The young manufacturer expressed his confidence in a sustained timber supply for the Klamath country, despite the heavy cut being made to meet wartime demand. He said the market later on will take lower quality products when the first quality runs out. He added that timber is constantly ripening and should be cut to meet current demands before its value is lost.

Drury said he is not seriously concerned over forest service warnings about a depleted timber supply.

Discussing labor pay, Drury said that overtime payments alone amount to \$60,000 a week in the 14 larger operations here and said that in view of that figure, war savings bond quotas here do not appear too high.

Drury was introduced by Kiwanian Cal Huson.

It was announced at the Monday meeting that the district Kiwanis convention set for Vancouver, B. C., in August has been cancelled because of the war, and that a business convention is to be held in Yakima, Wash., August 17 and 18. Phil Hitchcock, Sisters Lumberman, will be a candidate for district governor at the convention this year.

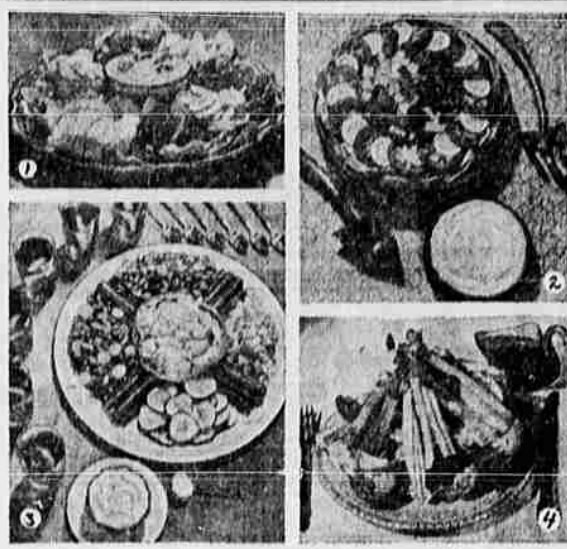

## It's Salad Time

Here are a few ideas for Salad Time to suit a variety of tastes:

- 1. Fruit Variety Salad**  
3 peaches, sliced  
1 cup seeded grapes  
1 grapefruit, sectioned  
3 plums, quartered  
Maraschino cherries

Arrange plums, peaches, grapes, berries, bananas and grapefruit on lettuce or salad greens. Serve with 1 cup real mayonnaise to which has been added 2 teaspoons maraschino cherry juice and 4 maraschino cherries, sliced. For real goodness, top salads with luscious real mayonnaise. Serves 6.

- 2. Ham Salad**  
1½ cups cooked ham, sliced  
1 cup scallions, sliced  
1 cup celery, sliced  
3 tomatoes, sliced  
Lettuce or salad greens

Line salad bowl with lettuce or salad greens. Lightly toss together ham, scallions and celery. Place in

salad bowl. Arrange sliced tomatoes and eggs around edge of bowl. Serve with creamy real mayonnaise. Serves 6.

- 3. Garden Supper Salad**  
2½ tablespoons onion chopped  
¼ cups cooked carrots and peas  
1½ cups lima beans  
1 small cucumber, sliced  
1 small cooked cauliflower  
1½ cups celery, sliced  
Lettuce

Add chopped onion to lima beans. Season lima beans, cucumber, celery, mixed carrots and peas with ½ teaspoon salt and ¼ teaspoon pepper each in separate bowls. Marinate each in 1½ tablespoons French dressing 1 hour. Place whole cauliflower in center of chop plate, surround with lettuce leaves. Divide chop plate into 4 sections with frankfurters. Place marinated vegetables in each section. Serve with real mayonnaise. Serves 6.

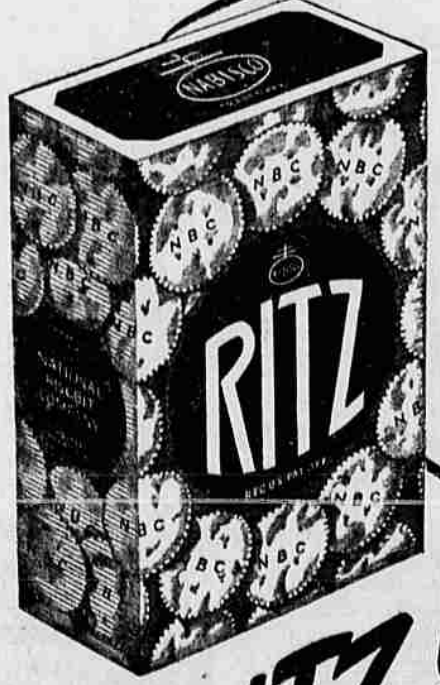
