

BOARD 2 MEN CALLED TO FILL AUGUST QUOTA

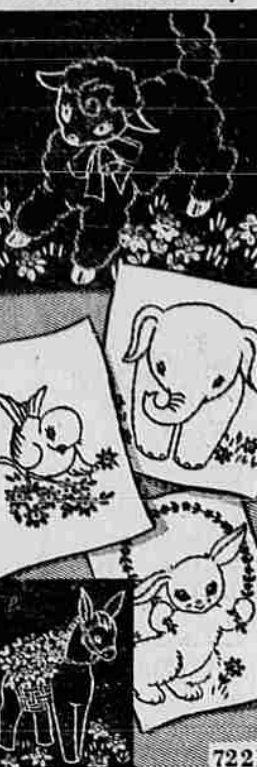

PAXTON CARTER'S BROTHER ENLISTS

T. C. Carter, brother of the first man from Klamath county to be killed in service, has been accepted by the navy and was sworn in at Portland yesterday. He is the son of Mr. and Mrs. T. C. Carter Sr., of 2524 Crest street.

Carter's brother, Paxton, a veteran of eight years' service with the navy, was killed at Pearl Harbor December 7, when a Jap bomb dropped through the funnel of the USS Arizona, exploding the magazine and sinking the vessel.

Carter enlisted with the navy here on Pearl Harbor day, but his application was held up on account of a minor physical defect. For the past two months he has been concentrating his efforts on correcting the condition. Word of his acceptance, received by the local recruiting station, indicates that he is off to a good start toward realizing his ambition to avenge the death of his brother.

BETHLEHEM DIVIDENDS PROP MARKET

NEW YORK, July 31 (AP)—The regular Bethlehem dividend declaration and somewhat better than expected earnings figures for the steel beltmaker apparently helped put recovery props under today's stock market.

Forward leanings appeared at the start in most departments when the two major steel issues came out with advances of more than a point each. Dealings tapered later and top gains were reduced for most favorites in the closing hour. Plus marks, though, were well in the majority.

Transfers for the full proceedings approximated 300,000 shares.

On the upside the greater part of the time were Santa Fe, Southern Railway, Youngstown Sheet, Republic Steel, Standard Oil (N.J.), Chrysler, American Airlines, Westinghouse, Allied Chemical, Anaconda and Goodrich. Loew's went into new high ground since 1939.

Occasional backwardness was exhibited by American Telephone, Sears Roebuck, International Harvester and Union Carbide.

Rail bonds were in demand. Commodities retreated.

ORDERS FOR PINE LUMBER INCREASE

PORTLAND, Ore., July 31 (AP-USA)—Orders for pine lumber continued on the increase for the week ending July 25, the Western Pine association reported today, but shipments and production fell off from the previous week.

Orders totaled 78,473,000 board feet compared to 77,962,000 for the previous week and 88,067,000 for the corresponding week last year. Shipments were 84,340,000 feet as against 85,741,000 the week before and 94,421,000 last year. Mills produced 91,249,000 feet while the total for the previous week was 91,833,000 feet and 93,739,000 in 1941.

CHICAGO WHEAT

CHICAGO, July 31 (AP-USA)—Wheat prices fell a cent or more a bushel again today to new lows for the season as the market remained unsettled because of the military situation in Russia.

Very favorable crop reports from the domestic spring wheat belt and Canada, where high yields were forecast, continued lagging flour demand and hedging against the new crop move-

ment also were bearish factors. At the low of \$1.16 1/2, September wheat showed a loss of about 21 cents a bushel from the season's high established in January and was almost 16 cents under the loan rate for No. 2 grades of new wheat here.

Wheat closed 1-11 cents lower than yesterday. September \$1.16 1/2, December \$1.19 1/2; corn 1-1/2 down, September 88 1/2, December 91 1/2. Oats 1-1/2 off; soybeans 1-1/2 lower; rye 1-1/2 lower.
