## Harrison, Harbert in Golf Playoff

ST. PAUL, Aug. 3 (P)—Two of golf's "H" boys, Chick Harbert and Dutch Harrison, climb around the rugged Keeler public links in an 18-hole playoff for the St. Paul open golf championship today and the \$1000 that goes with first place. They finished at square Sunday with 280 strokes each—eight under par—at the end of the regulation 72 holes.

Probably more important to them than the coin is the title, which will advance the fortunate winner farther up the ladder to fame.

Both, Harbert of Battle Creek, Mich., and Harrison, the Arkansas traveler working out of Harrisburg, Pa., have been tabbed by their compatriots as the up-and-coming golfers of the day—players whose names might some day rest beside those of Ben Hogan, Craig Wood, Byron Nelson and others in the fan-cian. Therefore, an additional punch has been added to this playoff.

## 3 Records Broken By Nancy

Portland Miss Cracks Marks  
At Oregon AAU Splash

PORTLAND, Ore., Aug. 3 (P)—Fifteen-year-old Nancy Merki, the Multnomah Athletic club's ace swimmer, cracked three more records, one of them a national mark, in the Oregon AAU swimming meet here Saturday.

Two other records also fell, one of them in the national women's AAU outdoor junior 220-yard freestyle, won by Muriel Mellon, San Diego, in 2:43.4 minutes. The record was 2:45.4, held by Edna Soltyziak, New York.

Miss Merki cut six-tenths of a second off the American record of 2:35, set by Mary Lou Petty, Seattle, in 1935 for the women's 220-yard freestyle event.

She also lowered Oregon marks in the 110-yard freestyle for girls under 16, turning in a time of 1:09.1, and in the 440-yard freestyle with a time of 5:32.4.

Suzanne Zimmerman, Multnomah club, shattered the 110-yard backstroke mark with a time of 1:17.5, equalling the national record held by Gloria Callen, Nyack, N. Y., for the slightly shorter 100 meter event.

Bud Hill of the Washington Athletic club won the 220 and 400-yard men's freestyle races. Two teammates also were winners, Gordon Sherwood in the men's 110-yard freestyle and Gordon Campbell in the 110-yard freestyle for boys under 16.

## Medford Gives Dorris 2 Weekend Beatings

Haynes, Benham Hurl Victories; Bud  
Larson Slips as Crapo Bangs 3 for 7

Klamath's Pelicans stuck to the Oregon-California league pace set by the loop-leading Medford Craters by tripping the unfortunate Grants Pass Merchants, 10-1 and 9-4, in a Sunday doubleheader on Recreation field while the Craters downed the Dorris Lumberjacks, 8-3 and 15-12, in a weekend pair in the valley.

Ken Benham, ex-Whitman college ace, topped the .500 mark in Sunday's ooper here when he limited the Merchants to five hits and a lone score for his fourth victory against three defeats.

Meanwhile the Bigbills were jumping on Steve Crippen and Lee Gehring for 13 bingles and half score counters. Hagedorn scored the Grants Passer's only run in the fourth when he doubled, advanced to third on an infield out and crossed the plate when Third Baseman Virgil Gross bobbled Steve Crippen's grounder.

Gross atoned for the lapse, however, by whamming three doubles in four trips to the plate as the Klamaths slammed Crippen for two runs in the first, three in the third and five in the fifth.

The Merchants took an early lead in the second game by posting a score in the third and another in the fifth before Manager Ernie Bishop's crew knotted the count on a single by Hatfield, a double by Gross, a wild pitch and a squeeze play.

Grants Pass came back in the top of the sixth, however, with two runs on three hits off Virg Haynes to lead, 4-2.

But the Pelicans weren't through. In the Klamaths' half of the same inning Bud Larson started it off with a single, the first of four hits and three walks good for seven runs. Larson came up again as tenth man to step to the plate and swatted a second single which drove in the final two tallies.

Hi Hatfield's triple drove in three of the seven runs. The up-rising ended scoring for the game.

With three hits in eight trips, First Baseman Paul Crapo maintained his spot at the top of Pelican hitters. Leading prior to Sunday with a .432 season average, his performance yesterday held that pace. Bud Larson, whose .429 was crowding Crapo up to the Grants Pass series, slid off slightly with three for eight, for a day's mark of .375.

Right Fielder Hatfield slapped five safeties in seven appearances to creep up on the leaders. Gross, with four for six, also climbed.

Next weekend the Pelicans travel to Dorris for a pair with the Lumberjacks.

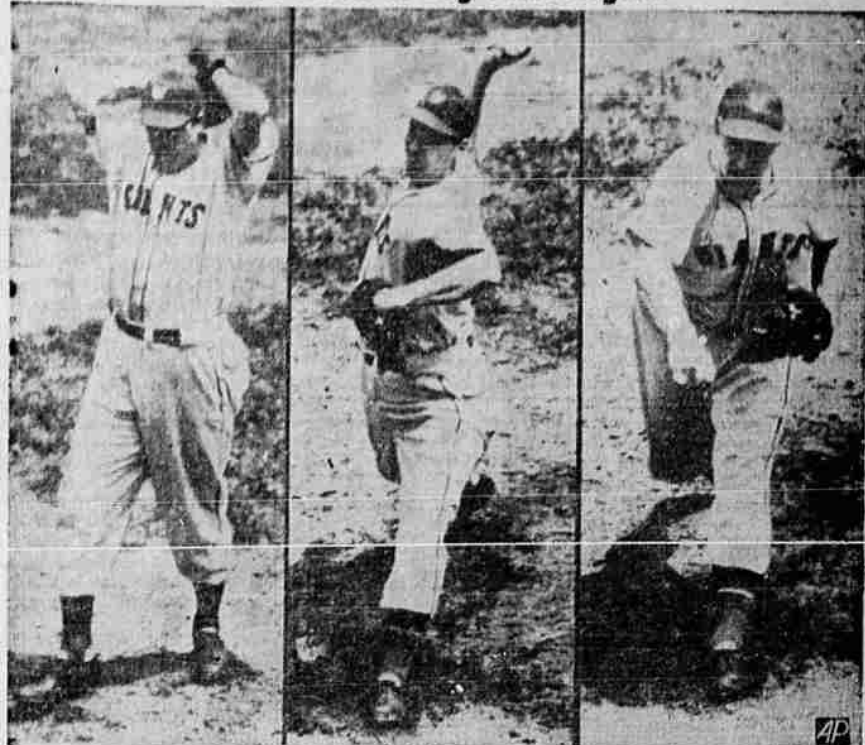
CALIFORNIANS

The Brooklyn Dodgers, who might not be so far along with their work had they met the New York Giants more often, tangle with their hecklers from Harlem this evening in a contest that has generated more excitement in Gotham than any baseball battle since the last World series. Army relief will be the principal beneficiary.

With everybody who goes through the gates buying a ticket and many others purchasing ducats without going to the game, officials won't be satisfied with anything less than \$100,000.

The Giants helped the Dodgers preserve their nine-game lead yesterday by splitting a doubleheader with the second-place St. Louis Cardinals, which is all the Dodgers could do with the Chicago Cubs.

It took the Dodgers 10 innings to turn back the Cubs, 5-4, in the first game. In the second game, Claude Passeau pitched the Cubs to a 7-6 triumph.

Carl Hubbell pitched the Giants to a 7-1 decision over the Cardinals for his fifth straight win as Mel Ott blasted two home runs, one with the bases loaded. Then Mort Cooper tossed a four-hitter at the Giants and the Cards won, 3-2.

The Cincinnati Reds clung to their one-game third-place margin over the Giants by splitting with the Boston Braves. Al Javery blanked the Reds 7-0 on five hits in the first game, with Max West contributing a grand slam homer, but Cincinnati took the second, 4-2.

The Pittsburgh Pirates dumped the Philadelphia Phils, 4-2 and 3-2, and hoped over the Cubs into fifth place.

In the American league, the New York Yankees downed the St. Louis Browns twice and stretched their lead to 12½ games over the Cleveland Indians, who wrested second place from the Boston Red Sox with the help of the Detroit Tigers.

A two-run homer by Tommy Henrich led the Yanks to a 4-2 victory over St. Louis in the opener and Ernie Bonham blanked the Browns, 10-0, in the nightcap, although he yielded 10 hits.

The Indians nosed out the Philadelphia Athletics, 4-3 and 4-2.

The Detroit Tigers knocked the Boston Red Sox into third place by four percentage points, taking the first game, 8-4, as Paul (Dizzy) Trout pitched seven-hit ball and contributed a three-run homer. The Tigers annexed the second, 6-2, on the nine-hit hurling of Virgil Trucks and Al Benton.

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## Salem Drops Into Cellar Of WI Loop

Climaxing a week-long drive which saw them win six out of seven games, the Spokane Indians swept a doubleheader from the Salem Senators yesterday and moved into third place in Western International Baseball league standings.

Long the occupants of the cellar the Indians now have a three-point advantage over the Senators as a result of the 5-4 and 8-4 victories.

Dwight Aden raced from second to home on a short hit by Buccola to center field in the 11th inning of the opener yesterday to give the Indians the game after they tied the score in the eighth with a two-run rally.

At Tacoma the Tigers finally broke the winning streak of the league-leading Capitanos and reduced the Cap margin to four games when they took a double bill, 11-6 and 5-2.

The Caps opened the first game with four runs in the first inning but the Tigers had drawn ahead by the end of the fourth and then continued to tally the rest of the way while holding the Caps to lone runs in the fifth and ninth.

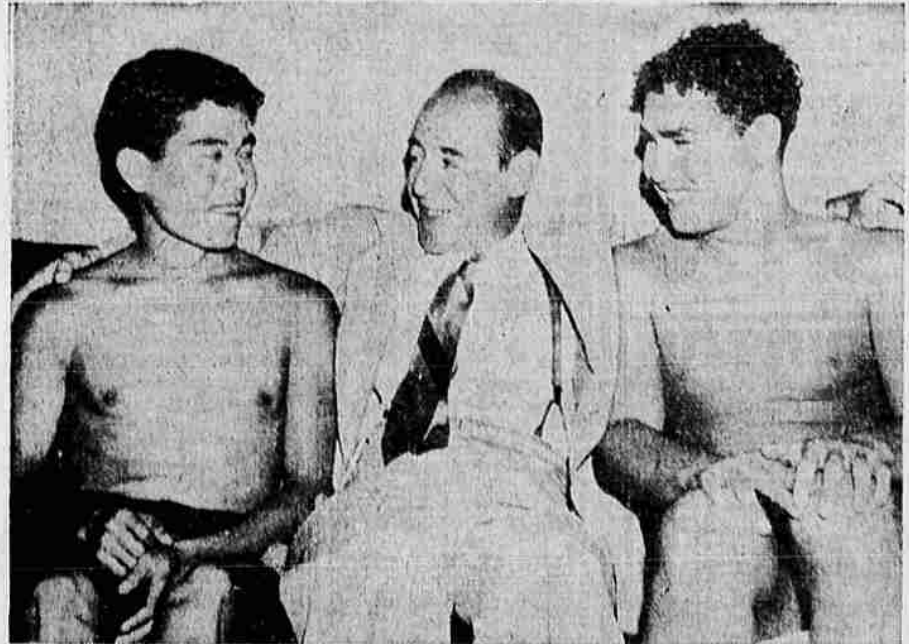
