

REALTORS ALL SET FOR START OF CONVENTION

Final plans are just about complete for the "David B. Simpson" 8th annual realtors' convention at the Willard hotel, Aug. 6, 7 and 8, announced H. R. "Dick" Maguire, convention chairman for the Klamath Realty board.

Mayor John H. Houston and Police Chief Earl Heuvel have given cooperation to efforts to make the convention one of outstanding characteristics. The city band will greet the delegates' train on its arrival Wednesday evening, while the mayor and the chief will personally extend greetings. Motorcycle police escorts will accompany the motorcade of some 40 cars transporting the delegates from the depot to the Willard hotel.

On Thursday morning when the Realtors' National President David B. Simpson of Portland and William MacRossie and family of Greenleaf, Conn., arrive, they will be personally escorted to the hotel by Mayor Houston, Police Chief Heuvel, Bogue Dale, local realty board president, and R. H. Dunbar.

The opening session, at 10 a. m. Thursday, will be held in the circuit court room, county court house, as will all other morning sessions between the breakfast and luncheon meetings. This privilege was made possible by the courtesy of Judge D. R. Vandenberg. The pastor of Klamath Lutheran church, Rev. L. K. Johnson will give the invocation at the opening session.

In addition to the "Shark" furnished by Copeco, private pleasure craft will be available for the Women's Klamath lake trip Thursday afternoon thanks to the civic mindedness of the following local citizens: Roland Manary; Roy Carter; Jim Douglas; Andy Collier; G. E. Bodenhamer and Fred Fleet.

Thanks to the hard work done by the convention committee, no less than 32 cars belonging to Klamath Falls citizens, many of them members of the board, have been pledged for transportation of delegates from Wednesday evening until Saturday night. Included in the tours made possible by use of these cars will be a trip to Tulelake, the Petroglyphs and the Japanese settlement, as well as transportation back and forth to the country club and a grand tour to Crater lake on the last day of the convention.

Messrs. Fleet, Chilcote and Dale report a good response to the invitation extended local people to attend the Thursday evening banquet at which Dr. Donald M. Erb of Eugene is speaker, and the annual banquet Saturday night when National President Simpson talks. Tickets for these affairs are also moving well at the convention office in the Willard hotel.

ROOSEVELT TO GIVE VIEWS ON RUBBER PUZZLE

WASHINGTON, Aug. 5 (AP)—President Roosevelt is going over the petroleum and rubber situations and may present his views to congress and the nation by tomorrow.

That probability arose today in the wake of these developments:

1. The president affirmed at his press conference yesterday that he would veto a bill settling up a separate government agency to make synthetic rubber from grain alcohol.

2. The war production board was reported considering, as an alternative to nationwide gasoline rationing, a plan to limit automobile driving in non-rationed areas by making a periodical check of mileages shown on speedometers.

3. Price Administrator Leon Henderson described the eastern gasoline shortage and the national rubber emergency as separate problems "in no way connected" and said the question of nationwide fuel rationing was so important that a decision would be made "only after careful analysis of all the complex aspects of the situation."

4. The war production board was disclosed to have decided on nationwide rationing in July — most of the necessary forms already had been printed — but President Roosevelt intervened.

5. An office of price administration official, who declined to be quoted by name, said fuel oil rationing in the east was a "distinct possibility." Curtailment of gasoline deliveries as far west as the Mississippi was being considered, he said, to make more tank cars available for the Atlantic seaboard's petroleum needs.

6. Rep. Hartley (R-NJ) declared in a radio talk that the synthetic rubber program had been delayed by "incompetence and mismanagement" in the government agencies concerned and by "selfish, powerful, private interests."

HIGH PRICES

REDSPOUT, Aug. 5 (P)—The first tuna catch landed here this season was delivered early this week by Dan Arkell who received \$408 a ton. Other prices listed here are \$320 a ton for Chinook salmon, \$200 for Silver-sides and \$60 for Ling Cod and scrap fish.

Myers succeeded E. B. Hamm, who resigned when he moved to Bend.

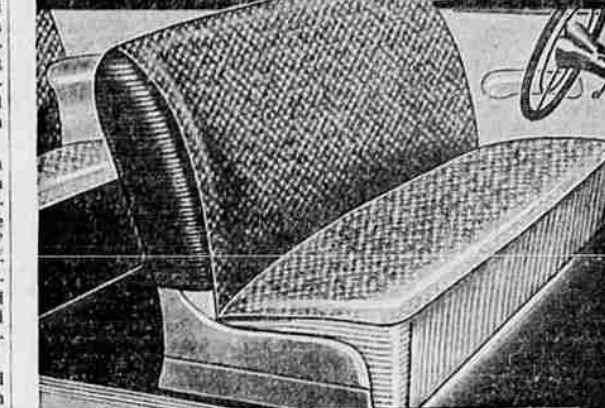
Mrs. Dennis succeeded Betty Baker, who resigned as of August 1, and on Tuesday was married to District Attorney L. Orth Sizemore.

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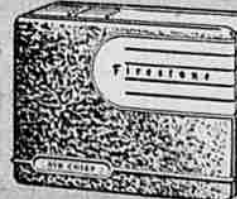
