RESERVATION MAN GOES INTO NAVY

Frank E. Blakeslee Jr., range examiner of the forestry division of the Klamath reservation, is entering the U. S. navy as radio technician second class, August 12. He will be sent to a navy radio school for nine months before entering active service.

Blakeslee graduated from the forestry school of Colorado State college in 1939. He obtained much experience in forestry and grazing during 1933 to 1939 in Colorado, Arizona, Wyoming and the Pacific states with the soil conservation service, Indian service and forest service before being appointed to the Klamath Agency in January 1940.

He has made considerable progress in development of range improvements consisting of water and fencing facilities on the Klamath reservation during his tenure here.

In June this year Blakeslee married Leslie Lowery of Pembroke, N. C., who was formerly a nurse at Klamath and Warm Springs reservation. Mrs. Blakeslee intends to return to North Carolina for a visit before returning to work in the Indian service.

The local Agency staff and their families as well as many other friends in southern Oregon are bidding the Blakeslees farewell and good luck in their new undertakings.

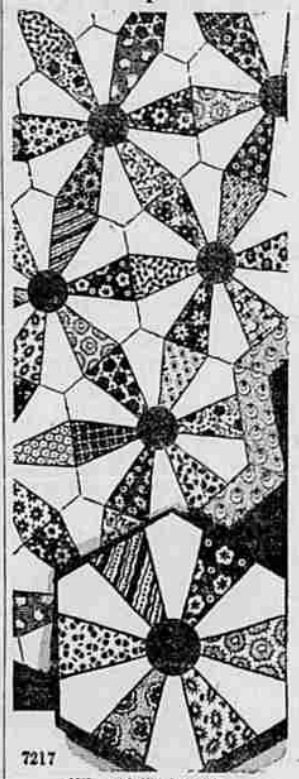
Bay Area Bakers End Walkout, Submit To Arbitration

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 6 (AP) — Their 16-hour walkout ended, 500 San Francisco bakery workers were back on the job today and their wage demands were in the hands of an arbitrator.

The walkout affected five of the city's leading bakeries which produce 75 per cent of the bread here.

The back-to-work vote followed efforts by Federal Conciliator Omar Hoskins and Lieut. Commander Hugh S. Center of the navy to bring about a settlement before the San Francisco bay area, and perhaps the armed forces stationed here, should be confronted with an acute bread shortage.

"It is, Madame," a board member replied.

"Well," she said, "the store-keeper made me pay for it."

279 ACCIDENTS IN CITY IN JULY

July chalked up 279 accidents, reported to city police out of a total of 2,530 for the year to date. They resulted in 41 persons being injured during the month, but no fatalities.

Police tabulations, recorded by means of colored pins on a large map of the city prominently displayed in the city hall showed that there have been more accidents occur at Eleventh and Main streets than at any other one spot during the year. Twenty-seven crashes have occurred there, as against 20 for the next most dangerous intersection, Sixth and Main street. The Ninth street intersection with Main claims a close third with 19.

Other especially hazardous spots, as indicated on the map, are on Pine street where it intersects at Ninth and High streets and at South Sixth and East Main streets. Ten or more accidents have occurred at each of these places.

There has been only one fatality within the city limits so far this year and five crashes resulting in serious injury, according to the map, which shows four pedestrians involved in mishaps with automobiles.

Eleanor Roosevelt Disavows Support Of Left Wing Labor

NEW YORK, Aug. 6 (AP) — Disavowing any support of the left wing of the American Labor party and in so doing making one of her rare statements on foreign affairs, Mrs. Franklin D. Roosevelt says:

"I do not wish to be controlled in this country by an American group that, in turn, is controlled by Russia and Russia's interests."

The president's wife expressed this attitude in a letter rebuking Eugene P. Connolly, ALP left wing leader, for his alleged use politically of a previous statement of hers in which she endorsed the party as a whole.

Salem Senators Sked Game Against Silverton Red Sox

SALEM, Aug. 6 (AP) — The game that the fans have been howling for for three years — matching the Salem Senators of the Western International League against Silverton of the State League — will be played next Monday night in Silverton, it was announced last night. The proceeds will be given to navy relief.

UNSINKABLE FAMILY

ST. JOSEPH, Mo., (AP) — Mrs. James R. Coyle learned last January her husband survived a submarine attack en route to Bermuda — although 26 of 41 St. Joseph laborers aboard the ship were lost.

In February he was aboard a ship which weathered a sub attack. Then he survived a passenger-plane engine failure en route to Bermuda.

Last night Mrs. Coyle learned her son, 18, a navy signalman, survived a freighter sinking — and escaped again when Japs machinegunned his lifeboat.

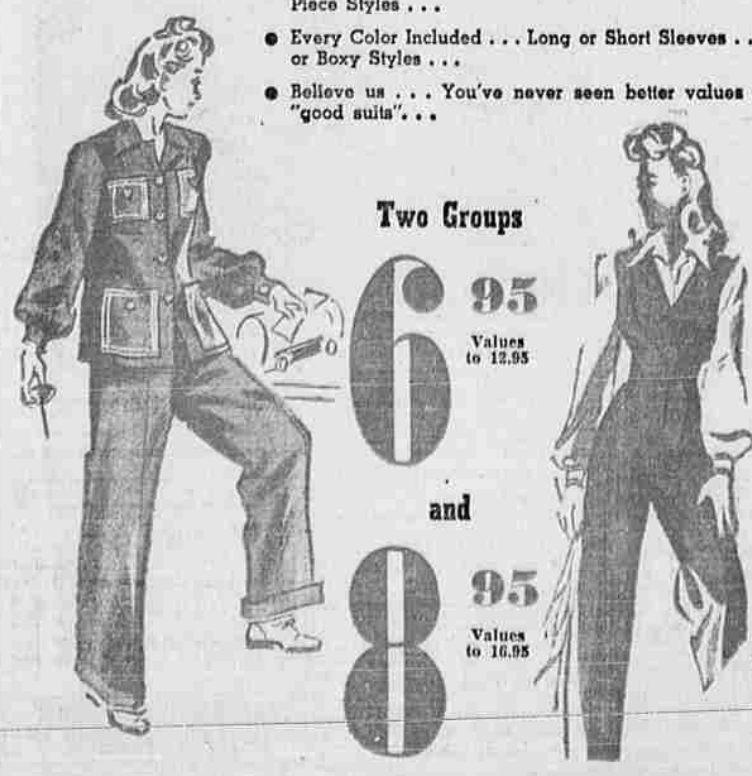
