

FIRE DEPARTMENT REPORTS 37 CALLS

Grass fires accounted for 25 out of 37 runs made by the fire department during the month of July, with the Pelican Bay Lumber company fire being the major conflagration in which firemen's services were demanded. This blaze took place outside the city limits, however, and therefore losses sustained were not recorded in the report turned in to the city council by Fire Chief Keith Ambrose.

All but \$9.90 of the \$970.70 loss caused by fire during the month was recovered through insurance collected, the report showed. Value of the property at risk was listed as \$333,225.

Thirty-eight calls were answered, one of which was false. Classified as to type of fire, there were five in dwellings, two in business buildings, one in a rooming house, one in a restaurant and two automobiles. These are in addition to the 23 grass fires and the lumber mill blaze.

Matches and careless smokers led the list of causes of fires with 25. Seven were the result of hot ashes or open fires, three of defective wiring, one of hot grease and one of sparks on a roof.

142 Girls Return From 4-H 80 Boys There This Week

A record number of girls, 142, have returned from the 4-H club summer camp at Lake O' the Woods where they spent the week of July 26 to August 1, and 80 boys are enjoying camp activities there this week, to return August 8.

Most popular diversion for the youngsters has been the waterfront activities including both swimming and boating under the supervision of Vern Anderson of Reed college assisted by Bob Erickson of Klamath Falls.

The camp is said to be fortunate in having H. C. Seymour, state 4-H club leader there to contribute toward the program with inspirational talks to the girls and boys. A well-rounded schedule of crafts and nature lore under qualified leadership also has provided new skills and interests for the campers under the directorship of Clifford Jenkins, county club agent.

Lloyd Seely, county sanitarian, is in charge of camp cleanup, dormitory inspection, rifle marksmanship and leathercraft, with L. E. Francis, Jackson county club agent leading groups in bird study. Group discussions of common courtesies at the girls' camp were led by Louise Schneider and Mrs. Winifred Gillen.

Miss Schneider, who is state club agent at large, also acted as instructor in the art of plaster casting, while Mrs. Gillen assisted in teaching wood carving and had responsibility for planning menus and managing the kitchen.

Most of the leadership personnel for the girls' and boys' camps is the same, with Alice Stout serving as camp nurse and first aid instructor. Mrs. Ina Christy of Corvallis, Mrs. Charles Thurman, Mrs. Carnes and Mrs. Finley of Klamath Falls are responsible for "dishing out the grub." Eileen Raynor is camp secretary and members of the senior 4-H club are assisting about the camp in many ways.

The evening vesper hour each day is followed by the camp fire program, always looked forward to by the youngsters. This year the girls enjoyed talks on bird life by Francis, singing, movies, stunts and a get-together with Boy Scouts and Camp Fire girls.

The boys' activities run to more active amusements and include a baseball game, tournament, swimming, fun fest and a fire fighting talk with moving pictures given by the rangers.

Rev. Hugh Bronson was in charge of Sunday church services for both camps.

RUBBER SHIPPED

PORTLAND, Aug. 6 (AP)—Rubber collected by Oregonians in the scrap salvage drive is going out of the state at the rate of 56 carloads, each carrying 30 tons, a week.

Cliff Radcliff, shipping director, said the Oregon rubber is being shipped to Fort Snelling at Minneapolis. There it is sorted and reshipped to reclamation plants.

POLICE ARREST 33 WOMEN LAST MONTH

Arrests of 33 women during the month of July were recorded on the tally sheet submitted to the city council by Acting Chief Earl Heuvel. Twenty-two of these were for drunkenness, nine for disorderly conduct, one vagrancy and one traffic violation.

A total of 294 arrests were made with the proportion for various offenses the same as those listed for the women, there being 153 drunks, 41 disorderly conduct, 27 traffic violations and 26 vagrants.

In addition, the report listed the following offenses: drunk driving, 4; liquor to Indians, 5; possession of liquor by Indians, 2; larceny of automobiles, 2; obtaining money under false pretenses, deserter and indecent exposure, one each.

The total of bail and fines taken in by the police judge for the above offenses during July was \$1688.50.

Police investigated six reports of burglary by breaking or entering, six of larceny, including two auto thefts, one of rape and one of aggravated assault. Of these, five cases were cleared by arrests made.

Thirty-five reports of stolen property were received and seven out of 12 persons reported missing were located. Ten out of 11 automobiles reported stolen were recovered, and five of 10 bicycles missing were found.

Building Totals Off But Number of Jobs Keeps Up

Building permits for the wartime month of July this year were less than one-sixth what they were in July, 1941, in money value, but there were two-thirds as many permits issued for the past month as in the same month last year. The comparative figures are 1942, 36 permits for \$9,340 and 1941, 50 permits for \$58,605.

This was revealed by the report of City Building Inspector Harold Francey, who said there was a marked improvement in July over June, probably due to the better understanding people now have of what is permitted under present government regulation of building and remodeling. Permits for June numbered 15 for \$2,941 and for July, 36 for \$9,340.

Practically all of the permits were for remodeling, there being 20 issued for private residences, eight for business houses and five for private garages. Only new construction was one garage and two concrete oil tanks, amounting altogether to only \$475.
