

NAZIS SLOWED DOWN IN TWO KEY SECTORS

(Continued from Page One)

Kotelinkovski sector, 95 miles south of Stalingrad.

The high command emphasized the role of Nazi dive-bombers in helping German troops "in their heavy defense" against Soviet "relief attacks" in the Rzhhev sector, northwest of Moscow, and conceded the Red armies were striking back in the big bend of the Don river before Stalingrad.

Meet in Moscow

As the Russians fought desperately to stem the 45-day-old Nazi offensive, London heard that delegates of the major United Nations were gathering in Moscow for a "save Russia and win the war" conference on grand strategy for a second allied front.

British officials maintained silence, but it was reported that representatives of the United States, Great Britain, the fighting French and Norway were either in Moscow or en route.

Moreover, axis radios for the past week have been circulating "unconfirmed rumors" that Prime Minister Churchill had gone to the Soviet capital, along with William C. Bullitt, special envoy of President Roosevelt.

London quarters said there was little doubt that any such conference would discuss "the urgent task of creating a second front in Europe in 1942," particularly now that Russia's southern armies are in such grave danger.

Japs Attack Feared

These quarters also cited repeated warnings from allied sources recently that Japan, with upwards of a half a million troops reported massed along the Russian Siberian frontier, planned to attack Russia soon in the Far East.

On the Soviet fighting front, conflicting versions of the battle came from Moscow and Berlin.

The Germans reported the capture of Armavir, on the Rostov rail line, 160 miles south of Rostov; Yelsk, on the Sea of Azov, 70 miles southwest of Rostov; and Timashevskaya, 130 miles southwest of Rostov.

Capture of Armavir would place the Germans within 85 miles of the Malkop oil fields, which produce seven per cent of Russia's oil, and would represent a 50-mile advance from Kropotkin, the southernmost point claimed by the Germans previously in their drive down the Rostov-Baku railway.

By contrast with the Nazi claims, a mid-day bulletin from Red army headquarters gave this picture of the 350-mile battle-front:

Kotelinkovski sector, 95 miles south of Stalingrad — "The Germans are sending in large numbers of tanks in attempts to smash our defenses. Our troops have repulsed these attacks."

Kushchevka sector, 50 miles south of Rostov — "The Germans launched repeated attacks

The lone setback conceded by the Russians was in the Belaya Glina sector, 100 miles southeast of Rostov, where Red army troops withdrew at several points yesterday.

of Walter Woodard, Cottage Grove lumberman, was burned. A few days later his mill had a \$40,000 fire.

Police Chief Myron Perry of Cottage Grove also reported evidence pointing to arson in the Chambers mill blaze. He said gasoline or kerosene had been used to spread the flames which broke out under the green chain. Hoses of the mills fire-fighting system had been cut.

Perry said also that Chambers had received a letter July 26, the day Woodard's residence was destroyed, warning that his (Chambers) home would be burned. The officer said the letter had been turned over to the FBI.

Flames from the Chambers mill jumped across the Pacific highway for a time, causing motor traffic to be detoured. Box cars on a mill siding were damaged. Oil tanks a block away were threatened.

response might result in a basis for negotiations.

But the little Hindu leader declared bluntly that Britain's assurance of post-war freedom for India was not acceptable.

"Waiting is harmful," he said. Maulana Abdul Kalam Azad, president of the dominant All-India party congress, was authorized to dispatch appeals to President Roosevelt, Gen. Chiang and Ivan Maisky, Russian ambassador to Britain, as soon as the congress committee passes on a resolution calling for a nationwide disobedience movement.

Bombay observers said endorsement of the resolution was regarded as a foregone conclusion. Other Far Pacific developments included:

China War Front—Lieut. Gen. Joseph W. Stilwell's headquarters announced army bombers attacked an airbase near Canton, taking the Japanese by complete surprise, and destroyed 10 enemy planes on the ground.

Hawaii—U. S. army headquarters disclosed that an American "Flying Fortress" on a secret mission to Japanese-held Wake Island last weekend destroyed four to six Japanese planes which rose to attack it, and returned to base safely.

They said the ballot line-up would be the same with the exception of the "no-union" designation which would not appear in either case.

Brown said the CIO had expected a greater turnout of voters than was recorded but attributed the number to recent large turnovers of men. The mill employs close to 900 workers, 550 of whom cast ballots.

Brown said that in the run-off election the AFL Machinists' union must attain a majority in their group to be named bargaining agent. Failing to do so in the runoff, the CIO and other AFL votes will be tallied with those of the production poll and the winner determined on the whole.

McKenzie said the same eligibility list will be used in the run-off as was used yesterday. He said 610 production employees and 80 machinists and helpers were eligible to vote. The CIO early this summer won bargaining rights for Weyerhaeuser woods workers in an NLRB election.

Yesterday's poll was conducted by NLRB Representatives Kenneth McClaskey, William Bartley and John Hedrick.
