

1942 EYED AS RECORD RAIL TRAVEL YEAR

"Increases in travel by railway are occurring so fast that the railways apparently will be called upon to handle more passenger traffic in 1942 than in any previous year in history," says Railway Age. "If they satisfactorily succeed, it will be in spite of difficulties, because diversion of travel to highways caused a sharp reduction in cars available for passenger-carrying by rail."

Incomplete data indicate that passenger traffic (passengers carried one mile) had begun in May to exceed all previous records. The previous May record made in 1920 was 3 billion 800 million passenger-miles, while the traffic in May, 1942, apparently exceeded 3 billion 900 million passenger-miles. In 1920, when travel by rail was the largest in history, it amounted in the first five months to 17 1/2 billion passenger-miles, while in the first five months of 1942 it was about 16 1/3 billion.

"The increase in passenger train speeds has helped accomplish these increases in service; but much more than increase in speeds has been necessary. Locomotives and cars must be kept moving more continuously than ever, and the number of cars per train has had to be increased. Average revenue passengers per car increased 27 per cent in the first quarter to 18.4 passengers; but, as this figure shows, most cars have not been crowded, although there has been some crowding in territories having the largest traffic increases."

"The railways thus far have done a good job in handling the hugely increased traffic. And a public which so largely deserted them to ride on rubber can make no reasonable complaints when unable to get all the service it wants on rails."

EUGENE LOVE GOES TO WEST POINT

WASHINGTON, Aug. 7 (P)—Everett E. Love, Klamath Falls, has been chosen by the war department for appointment to the U. S. military academy at West Point. Rep. Pierce was informed today.

Love had been third alternate among Pierce's nominations.

Everett E. Love is Eugene Love, KUHS graduate of last spring and prominent in sports and scholarship achievement at the local school.

Los Angeles Navy Station Enrolls 25,000th Recruit

LOS ANGELES, Aug. 7 (P)—The navy recruiting office here enrolled its 25,000th recruit since Pearl Harbor Thursday—a record which Lt. Comdr. George T. Howe said was unparalleled in any other city in the country.

He is George Segall, 31, employed in the casting office of a movie studio. Segall said if he could cast his own part in the war, it would be in the photographic division "so I could be on hand in Tokyo to film the day we sound taps for the Japs."

Navy Excludes Wives Of Service Men From Reserve

WASHINGTON, Aug. 7 (P)—The navy revised its regulations governing appointment of officers and enlisted personnel in the Women's Reserve Thursday to exclude wives of all members of the nation's armed forces.

Previously, the only stipulation had been that wives of naval officers could not be appointed to the Women's Reserve.

Bear Gets Home In Portland Zoo

PORTLAND, Aug. 7 (P)—A 25-pound Russian brown bear was in its new home at the Washington park zoo today, the gift of soldiers at the Portland port of embarkation.

The four-month-old cub made its way to this country as cabin mascot on a Russian freighter. It was given to the soldiers, who kept it two months and then—looking into the future—decided it belonged where it would not be the major project for all hands.

91ST WILL HONOR QUARTET OF HEROES

CAMP WHITE, MEDFORD, Ore., Aug. 7—Special honor to the four soldiers of the division, who were awarded the Congressional Medal of Honor in World War I, will be given at the activation ceremony of the 91st Infantry Division, here, August 15. Members of the 1917-19 division will be honor guests at the event.

Of the four, Major Oscar F. Miller of Los Angeles, Calif., died from wounds received in leading his battalion during a front line advance of the 361st Infantry in the Argonne Forest. Wounded in arm and leg, the officer was at the very head of the advance, inspiring and guiding his men, until a third wound through the abdomen compelled him to fall to the ground.

Two other Californians, Philip C. Katz of San Francisco and Lloyd Selbert of Salinas, were presented the Medal of Honor. The San Franciscan, a sergeant in the 363rd Infantry, voluntarily crossed a machine-gun swept area to bring a wounded comrade to safety. Selbert, a sergeant in the 364th Infantry, dashed forward alone under fire and wiped out an enemy machine-gun emplacement after a hand-to-hand struggle.

Chester H. West of Idaho Falls, Idaho, another sergeant with the 363rd Infantry, also eliminated a machine-gun nest in a hand-to-hand encounter for which he received the outstanding award.

The activation ceremony will include military exhibits, music, and a stirring transfer of the old 91st Division's colors to Major General C. H. Gerhardt, commanding general of the new division.

Klamath Housewives Asked To Aid in Salvage of Fats

It has been estimated that more than two billion pounds of fats are wasted in the kitchen each year. Since fats are a source of explosives now vitally needed for the armed forces, it makes it necessary to take immediate steps to salvage these waste kitchen fats.

Housewives in Klamath county are urged to join in the salvage campaign to obtain waste fats and oils for making glycerine which is needed for explosives. Local meat dealers are to receive waste fats turned in by the housewives. The dealers will pay four cents a pound for the waste fat and will turn the fat back into the commercial channels where it will reach the government.

Housewives are asked not to turn in fats which they can use in cooking—what is wanted is that no fats be wasted. The campaign urges that all fats that come from preparing other foods be used around the house so that the purchase of fats from the stores will be reduced to a minimum.

It is desired that housewives save pan drippings from roasts, fats trimmed off meat, soup skimmings, bacon, ham and sausage fryings, broiler drippings, and any other by-product of meat preparation.

Not less than one pound should

be taken to the meat dealers at one time. The fats should be strained and placed in wide-mouth cans, not glass or paper, and should be kept in a cool place or in a refrigerator so they will not become rancid. It is desired that the fats be turned in at other times than weekends, if possible, because that is the time the dealers are the busiest with their regular work. They will not be paid for containers.

BIG GRAIN FIRE

PENDLETON, Aug. 7 (P)—Umatilla county's largest grain fire of the season destroyed 160 acres of wheat four miles south of Pendleton late yesterday afternoon. Volunteer rural fire fighting crews and equipment summoned through the civilian defense control center are credited with saving the remainder of the crop in the 320 acre field. The blaze is believed to have started from a tractor used for harvesting.

GREEN GUARDS GET CHANCE AT CAMPING

SALEM, Aug. 7 (Special)—Camping in the green forests of the high Cascades, with three glorious days spent in hiking, swimming, patrolling and visiting one of Oregon's highest forest lookout points. That is the award offered all boys and girls who place in a fire prevention contest announced this week by the Keep Oregon Green association.

In all, 20 Oregon youth, 10 boys and 10 girls will be selected by contest judges as winners in the expense paid forest outing. As an additional award some top-placing green guard squad will all have the opportunity to join the other youth in the vacation awards.

According to the contest rules any Oregon boy or girl has a right to participate in the contest. Only requirement is that the youth be enrolled as a green guard either through their own youth organization or by direct contact with the Keep Oregon Green association, State Forestry building, Salem. Those not yet enrolled as green guards should apply for membership at an early date in order to prove their eligibility.

What each green guard must do is this—see that the fire manual is completely filled out so that it has the name of the

local forest warden or ranger and so that all fire prevention activities are checked. Then mail the fire manual along with a letter telling of fire prevention activities to state Keep Oregon Green headquarters. All entries must be postmarked not later than midnight September 15.

Oregon Hunting Ban Unlikely

PORTLAND, Aug. 7 (P)—Request for closure or curtailment of Oregon's deer hunting season is not likely. Frank B. Wire, state game supervisor, said today.

Lieut. Gen. John L. DeWitt asked for closure of California forests to deer hunters recently. Wire said he believed the action was to lessen forest fire hazards. The California season is open now in some areas, but Oregon's does not open until September when the fire threat is somewhat less serious.
