Volunteer Patrols Guard Santa Monica Coastline

SANTA MONICA, Calif., Aug. 7 (AP)—Patrols of 1350 volunteers working in six-hour shifts are keeping watch along Santa Monica's beaches between 5 a. m. and dawn to prevent the possible landing of saboteurs.

Each man has one-fifth of a mile to cover. Fifteen thousand auxiliary police working in four-hour shifts, are walking similar patrols on Los Angeles city beaches, while sheriff's deputies and county employees keep watch along the county shoreline.
