Here we have 144 candidates for ulcers of the bone and flesh with paralysis and insanity in the offing. These prostitutes are of the motorized brothels. Hundreds of girls are shipped like cattle from camp to camp, by the vice syndicates. We give these figures from GENE TUNNEY'S ARTICLE in the AUGUST READER'S DIGEST.

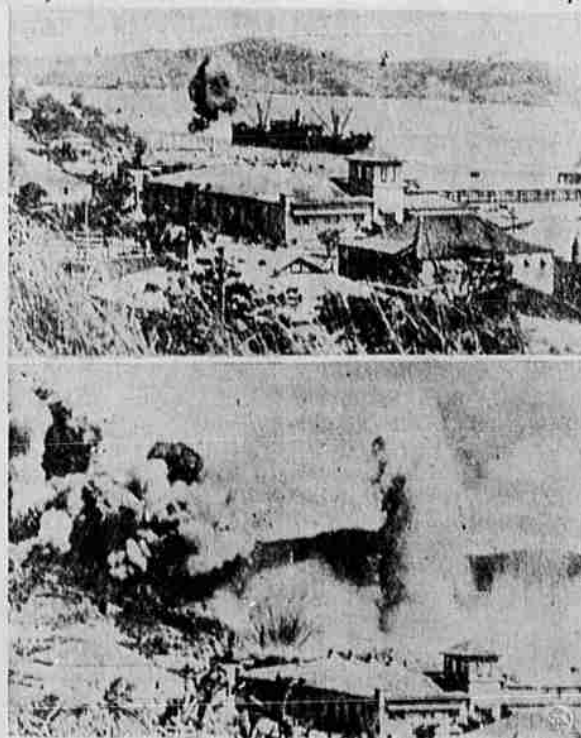

POST OFFICE RECEIPTS UP OVER JUNE

Postal receipts held up surprisingly well during July, according to Postmaster Burt E. Hawkins, recording an increase over both the previous month and over July, 1941. Figures released were \$13,097.07 for July, 1942; \$12,684.04 for July, 1941; \$12,045.41 for June, 1942. The percentage increase over July, 1941 was 3.25.

Money orders, too, registered a boost in both numbers and volume in July of this year over the same month in 1941, the figures showing 5977 orders issued for \$76,005.80 as against 4211 for \$72,356.23. This includes money orders issued both at the main postoffice and at the substation in Lee Hendrick's drug store.

V-Mail
Hawkins said that the public was making use of the V-mail message forms available at the post office, but that he expected they would become still more popular when the public fully realized the advantages they offered. He pointed out that much cargo space was saved by their use and that they assured faster service.

Chief advantage to the individual, however, he pointed out, is that letters sent in that manner will still reach their destination in spite of the loss of the plane or ship on which they might be sent. This is assured by the original letter being photographed on a microfilm which is shipped to the destination of the message, printed, then delivered in the usual manner. If for any reason the microfilm is destroyed, the letter can be rephotographed and sent on to the addressee, Hawkins explained.

U. S. Warplanes Raid Canton Area

CHUNGKING, Aug. 8 (AP)—United States army warplanes raided the Canton area again early this morning, shot down two Japanese planes and destroyed several more on the ground, Lieut. Gen. Joseph W. Stilwell's headquarters announced today.

Still another enemy aircraft was listed as probably shot down in combat, though its destruction could not be confirmed. The raid was the second on the Japanese air base at Canton in three days. Thursday American fighters were credited officially with destroying 10 grounded enemy planes in a surprise assault without loss to themselves.

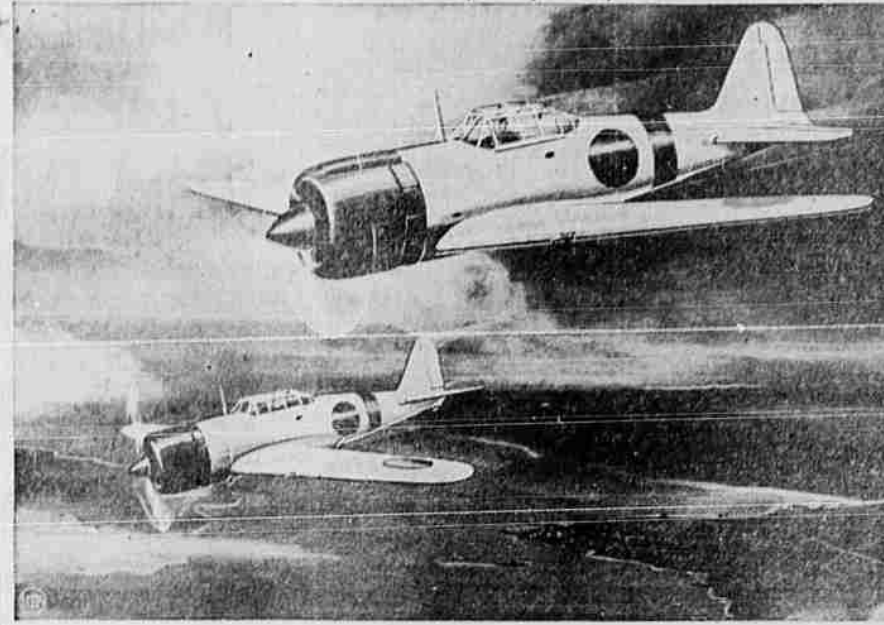

Jane Hibbard Describes War Changes in Alaska

Jane Hibbard, who arrived in Klamath Falls on July 26 after having spent nearly two years as a public health nurse in Alaska, has enlisted in the navy nursing service and has been ordered to report on September 9 for further assignment.

Miss Hibbard spent nine months in St. Petersburg and a year in Juneau serving under the territorial department of public health. She reported that most of the cases there deal with crippled children, of which there are a great number because of the prevalence of tuberculosis among the natives.

The most notable change in Juneau brought about by the war, she said, has to do with shipping, which has always closely affected the lives of the people. Their chief diversion throughout the years has been the arrival and departure of boats from the states. Nothing of this nature is now published in advance or until some time after

the big event is past—and then only a list of the passengers is printed, not even indicating the time nor the name of the boat.

The coastal liners themselves are all painted a drab gray, Miss Hibbard related, with the names completely obliterated. Since there are fewer boats, and cargo space is taken up with war materials, there is seldom a choice of more than two or three vegetables at any given time and the selection of other foods is limited correspondingly.

As a result, many people around Juneau have attempted this year to raise victory gardens. Miss Hibbard said, but with rather discouraging results because of the poor soil and short growing season.

Juneau has not experienced the extreme boom conditions of some areas of Alaska.

Miss Hibbard is staying with her parents, Mr. and Mrs. W. H. Hibbard, of 402 Riverside, while awaiting her assignment for duty with the navy.

170 Boys to Leave Sunday For Junior Police Camp

Approximately 170 boys will leave for a one-week outing at Lake o' the Woods on Sunday, August 9, at 7 a. m. The youngsters will meet on the courthouse lawn, where three school buses and two city trucks will be waiting to furnish transportation to the lake, according to City Recreation Officer Dave Bridge.

During past years, the camping trip has been confined mainly to members of the junior police. This year extensive plans have been made to take boys and girls from eight years of age and up to grade school age. The first week will be devoted to the boys. The second week the girls take over the camp.

For many years the senior police department has made the junior police camp possible. The camp has grown to such an extent that more help has become necessary, Bridge said. This year the city recreation committee has made allowance for the hiring of necessary help and the financing of the trip.

Many people outside of the city officials have begun to show an interest in this worthwhile program, it was pointed out. Members of the board of education of the high school have made transportation in the form of three buses possible for the trip. The city council has aided the use of city trucks to haul bedding and supplies. Through Altha Urquhart, local welfare head, commodities will be furnished again by the state welfare association. At a recent meeting the Elks lodge went on record as being in favor of furnishing 75 gallons of fresh milk for the camp.

All boys are urged to meet promptly at 7 a. m. Sunday. Bridge again advised the youngsters to bring plenty of bedding. Bridge stated that any boy having a sleeping bag is advised to bring it in place of bedding. Expert help will be furnished in the conducting of swimming classes, so swimming suits will be necessary for those interested. Each camper should have: bedding, not less than

four heavy quilts or blankets; tooth brush and paste; face towel and soap; swimming suit, fishing rod, necessary food list which has been given to all campers, 10 cents for each day, and old clothes with a change.

Extension Unit News

The calendar of home extension programs for the coming year was completed this week by Mrs. Winnifred Gillen and Miss Azalea Sager, state home demonstration leader with headquarters in Corvallis, who came here for that purpose.

Subjects for the meetings were selected by delegates to the annual program planning day held in May, and will be led by specialists in each field of work covered. Object of the project is to assist homemakers in solving problems brought about by the war.

Project leaders will be trained to carry on demonstrations which they in turn will present to women in their individual communities. The first such training meeting on the drying of fruits and vegetables and the use of war substitutes will be held on September 29 at a place to be announced later. Lucy Case, extension nutritionist from Oregon State college, and Mrs. Gillen, local home demonstration agent, will be in charge.

Subjects to be covered in the year's program are: remodeling of clothing, war substitutes in cooking, the use of dried fruits and vegetables, sewing machine care and the use of attachments, war emergency buffet meals, meats for low cost meals and the repair and care of household equipment.

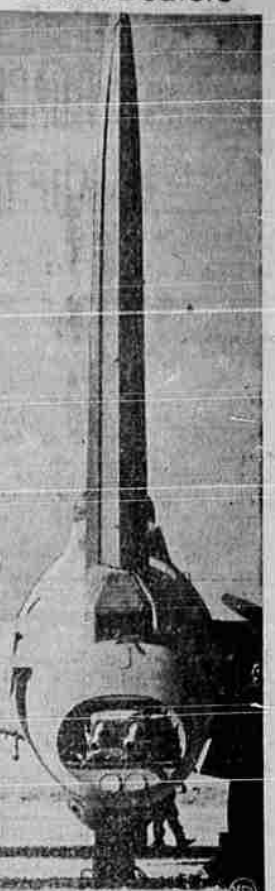
Major Gifford will also conduct public spiritual meetings Sunday at 11 a. m. and 8 p. m.
