

State Regent Guest Of Eulalona DAR

Mrs. William Horsfall of Marshfield Pays Official Visit to Local Chapter

Mrs. William Horsfall, Marshfield, state regent of the Oregon Daughters of the American Revolution, was the guest of honor at a luncheon given by Eulalona chapter in the Peltan party room Monday, August the third. Mrs. Z. W. Dixon, chapter regent, presided at the luncheon, introducing the guest of honor and other guests.

This was the annual official visit of the state regent to the local chapter. Mrs. Horsfall talked informally, giving highlights of the Continental Congress held in May, in Chicago, and telling of the accomplishments of the DAR, not only in the United States, but in chapters in Canal Zone, China, Cuba, England, France and Puerto Rico.

Oregon stood first in the nation in the amount of war bonds purchased by members of the DAR, according to Mrs. Horsfall. She urged members to put their shoulders to the wheel in every effort to win this war and down those who would destroy democracy. To lose this war, she asserted, means slavery for all of us. Members were asked to save everything of value in the salvage program, such as paper, rubber, cotton cloth, iron, copper, brass, etc. Records are to be kept in the National Society files at Washington, D. C., of all those who have given 300 hours or more to war service, and who are regularly purchasing bonds and stamps.

Mrs. Lloyd Goble, in behalf of the chapter, presented a gift to Mrs. Horsfall. Miss Marian Horsfall of Glendale, California, accompanied her mother. They are driving and visited chapter in Grants Pass, Medford, Ashland, and Lakeview before coming to Klamath Falls. Women Voters Plan Program for Year

Many Join Klamath League During Past Week As Year's Work Outlined

Members of the Klamath County League of Women Voters are promised a thrilling program for the fall and winter months, as well as fascinating study sessions, according to plans outlined by Mrs. L. H. Stone, program chairman. A meeting of the board of directors was held Tuesday afternoon at the home of the president, Mrs. Everett R. Dennis, and tentative plans for the first two fall meetings were discussed.

New members will be honored at these two meetings, one in the afternoon and one in the evening. It was decided, and the two monthly meetings, afternoon and evening, will be continued throughout the winter.

Fifty-three new members have joined the league since the beginning of the membership drive, July 20. It has been announced by Mrs. B. C. Johnston, membership chairman. This number, with the seventy-five old members of the organization, brings the total membership to 130, and it is expected that more will join when meetings are resumed in early September. Mrs. Johnston wishes to thank members of her committee for their diligent work in the drive, and for the many interested recruits they have brought to the league for the ensuing year.

It is the purpose of the league, the president, Mrs. Dennis says, to guard democracy on the home front while armed forces protect it on foreign battle fronts. "Democracy must be guarded on the home front and who is to do this if not the men and women who are left at home?" she asks. Government will go on; democratic forms and practices must be preserved; elections will be held and citizens will vote, or will they? It is one of the provinces of the league to point out again and again that American people must vote, and that failure to do so is the same as voting "ja" to the forces that oppose democracy.

The League of Women Voters prepares encouraging programs urging every citizen with the right to vote to do so, in order to become a good soldier in the army that guards democracy at home. The ballot is the weapon, and it must not become rusty from disuse. When the bands play, and the boys come marching home, this weapon must be given back to them, bright and shining from much care and handling, and the institutions of free government must be functioning in the good American way, not 50 per cent, but in full strength.

The league is marshalling its forces throughout the states and territories of the nation to fight against indifference, passivity and against over-preoccupation with war thought and duties, for though the war must be won, democracy must not suffer in the winning. The league undertakes the task of arousing the citizenry of America to a fuller sense of its duty as guardian of self-government, and Klamath county women are eager to do their part in this great mission. Study technique employed by the league is one of the projects about which members are most enthusiastic. Members are not allowed to rely upon their famed feminine intuition in political matters. The "work program" is decided upon by the national league, but it represents the wishes of a large majority of the membership of state and local organizations which all have a finger in the program pie, Mrs. Dennis points out. National league makes available to state and local groups authentic material on all program items. Members with a yen to find out what makes the government tick arm themselves with questionnaires and proceed to take certain phases of governmental machinery apart. Then they come back to the league and tell the others what they found in the works. "If there is a member of the Klamath County League of Women Voters who does not know how our schools are run, how county government operates, what is wrong in the basement of the city hall and many other things of urgent concern to this community then she has not attended meetings or the study group sessions, or she has sat through these meetings with cotton in her ears," says Mrs. Dennis in connection with local study projects. Other groups concentrate on national and international affairs making the league a fully rounded, alive and working organization.
