NEW YORK, Aug. 8 (Wide World) — In these days of censorship and unusual editorial problems in presentation of the news, a forum on war information to be broadcast from Washington tomorrow (Sunday) by MBS at 5 p. m. should do much to bring producer and consumer of news nearer an understanding.

Around the table will be Capt. Lowell Limpus, New York Daily News war analyst; Claude A. Mahoney, of the Washington Star; Clifford A. Prevost, of the Detroit Free Press, and Richard L. Wilson, of the Des Moines Register and Tribune. Prevost is president and Wilson a past president of the National Press club.

NAVY ENLISTMENT PROGRAM PRESSED

Men subject to the draft no longer have to have a release from their draft board before they can enlist in the navy, and may enlist even though they have received their orders for induction.

This information was received today by Chief Gunners Mate F. R. Duncan, local navy recruiter, from G. F. DeGrave, lieutenant commander in charge of the U. S. navy recruiting office in Portland.

In other words, it was explained, if John Doe has his induction papers calling for induction into the army at 8 o'clock in the morning of a certain day, his enlistment in the navy may be accepted up to 7:59 of that day.

3 TRAINMEN HURT IN FREIGHT CRASH

KENNEWICK, Wash., Aug. 7 (AP)—A west bound Spokane Portland and Seattle freight train crashed into the rear end of another westbound freight, which had halted at Yellepit, 20 miles below here for water, injuring three trainmen seriously and derailing scores of freight cars yesterday.

The injured were Engineer L. C. Curtis, Fireman Raymond Bacon and Brakeman H. E. Smith, all of Wishram, Wash. They were members of the crew of the moving train.

Railroad men said they believed at least 35 cars were demolished, 15 on one train and 20 on another, and that the number of cars derailed was too large to count. Conductor Lewis of a rescue train estimated 160 cars left the tracks.

Albacore Price Goes Up to \$415

ASTORIA, Ore., Aug. 8 (AP) The way prices were going Friday tuna was well on the way to becoming a luxury food.

Albacore went up to \$415 a ton—\$7 above the all-time high set here last week in private sales.

But if consumers had cause to worry about the higher price, so had packers. They feared that tuna, not being purchased by the federal government, ought to be classed as an unessential product and that the fishing fleet might be confiscated for war duty.

The new price put tuna higher than fancy Columbia river Chinook salmon.
