

NAZIS NEAR RICH GROZNY OIL FIELDS

oneh, 300-odd miles above the Stalingrad battle area, but declared that German armored columns were sweeping inexorably deeper into the Caucasus.

Nazi Warplane Attack

Axis-allied Rumanian troops were credited with capturing Slaviansk, 25 miles northwest of Krasnodar, while Nazi warplanes attacked Russian troops attempting to flee at Black Sea ports between Tuapse and Anapa.

The German command said Nazi bombers sank two more transports and damaged six others along the Black Sea coast.

The Russians themselves painted a black picture of the vast struggle except in the Kletskaya sector, 75 miles northwest of Stalingrad, where the German onslaught against the big Volga steel city was said to have been definitely stopped.

Soviet dispatches conceded that the red armies were falling back amid bloody fighting in the wild lands of the Caucasian foothills and that the Germans were less than 150 miles from Ordzhonikidze, near the rich Grozny oil fields, more than half way down the Caucasus land bridge to the middle east.

The committee pointed out that local tax reduction and indebtedness elimination are of the utmost importance in this war period.

Gene Hooker, reporting for the industrial development committee of the chamber, said that representatives of dehydration operations have been in Klamath Falls investigating the possibilities of establishing a dehydration plant here.

Nazi Fliers Attacked in Paris

NEW YORK, Aug. 12 (AP)—The British radio reported today that a group of German fliers drilling in Jean Bouin stadium, in suburban Paris, had been attacked with hand grenades, two of them killed and eight severely injured.

The broadcast, heard by CBS, gave no source for this report and did not say who was held responsible for the attacks.

BBC also said that French police had discovered a dynamite cache near Clermont-Ferrand and that all police leaves in that area had been cancelled.

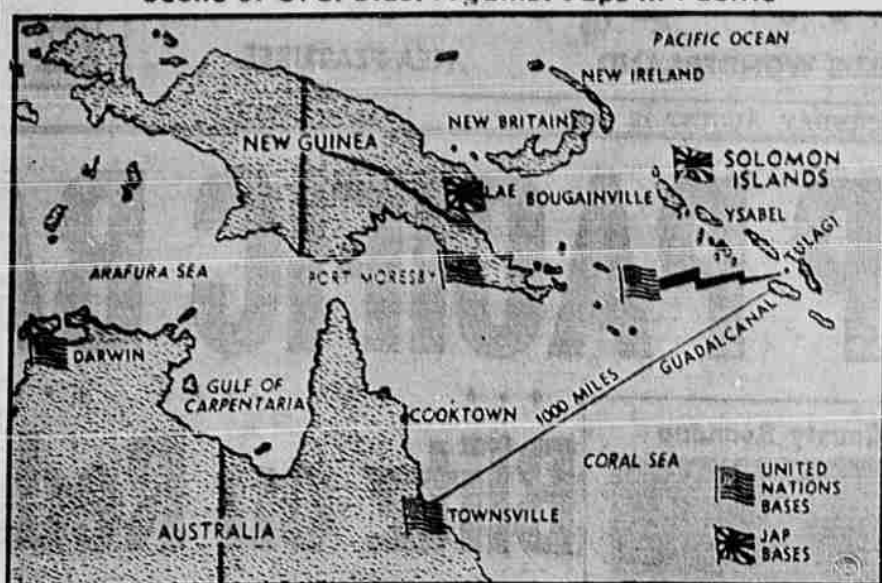

the rioters showing signs of tiring although some government trucks were looted of their food loads.

No Death Count

There was no accurate count of the cost of life since Sunday when India's aspirations for independence suddenly erupted into a bloody struggle of growing intensity but the casualty lists in Bombay alone reached at least 31 dead and more than 250 wounded.

Late today troops opened fire once more on an unruly crowd which had stoned a military truck in the Bhuleswar area of Bombay, adding an indefinite number to Bombay's casualty roll.

Following this police opened fire over the heads of a mob which attempted to destroy a sentry box in the Zaveri bazaar. No one was injured.

Meanwhile, the death of 12 persons, including a police inspector, and the wounding of many, were announced at New Delhi—evidently a cumulative total for disorders in that capital.

Since the terror began as the sequel to the arrest of Mohandas K. Gandhi and other Hindu leaders after the All-India Congress party made him generalissimo of a planned non-violent campaign to break British rule, 500 or more other Indians have been made prisoners.

Silver Shirt Leader Gets 15-Year Sentence

INDIANAPOLIS, Aug. 12 (AP)—William Dudley Pelley, founder and leader of the Silver Shirts of America, was sentenced today to 15 years in prison in the first major sedition case since America's entry into the war.

Federal Judge Robert C. Baltzell imposed the sentence after denying a defense motion for a new trial.

The dapper, 52-year-old Pelley, whom government attorneys called "a Benedict Arnold" and "an Aaron Burr" in their prosecution, was convicted a week ago of 11 counts of criminal sedition in connection with publications of the Fellowship Press, Inc., which he headed.

In passing sentence Judge Baltzell said he believed Pelley should be imprisoned "for the duration."

more than 5000 items in the average store.

The overall increase, the industry claimed, would not exceed one and a half per cent. Dr. J. K. Galbraith, deputy OPA administrator, predicted the advance on individual items would be "relatively small."

OPA explained that designation of March as the ceiling price month caught food distributors with many selling prices based on prices on stock purchased months before. With replacement costs increased, distributors could not restock except at the risk of cash losses.

Consequently, both low-priced wholesale and retail distributors would be compelled to drop important lines of food products unless the "squeeze" were relieved, OPA said.

said the navy, "is believed to have been sunk" during the bombardment.

These ship losses raised the Jap's total for the Aleutians to nine sunk, one believed sunk and 11 damaged.

All the actions reported by the navy were in the Kiska area except for a Japanese aircraft attack August 3 on the U. S. Destroyer Kane off Atka Island about 350 miles east of Kiska. The destroyer was unharmed. Kiska is the Jap's main base although the navy has reported their occupation of Attu and Agattu, at the tip of the island chain.

The navy reported that Kiska was bombed once July 22 and twice July 29 in addition to the other actions reported, and on Aug. 4 army pursuit planes shot down two Kawanishi seaplane bombers in an action no details of which were given.

AIR MARKERS NON-HOSTILE

NEW YORK, Aug. 12 (AP)—Lieut. Gen. Hugh A. Drum, commanding general of the eastern defense command, said today that alleged "air marker" incidents, described in a recent release by the first air force at Mitchell Field, N. Y., were without "hostile motive."

"As a result," Gen. Drum added in a formal statement, "the cases were dropped as having no bearing on national defense."

"The responsibility and the reasons for the release of the photographs and the story are now under investigation and appropriate action will be taken in due time."

The Mitchell Field story and photographs had to do with sacks of grain stacked in a field in the form of a figure nine with the tail of the figure reportedly pointing to an aircraft plant, and plowed fields or woodland clearings shaped like arrows pointing to defense plants and air fields. The material was released to newspapers of last Monday morning.

"Following normal intelligence procedure, investigations were made with the conclusions that no hostile motive could be attached to any one of the incidents in question."

SHIP SUNK

WASHINGTON, Aug. 12 (AP)—The navy announced today that a small Dutch merchant vessel had been torpedoed and sunk by an enemy submarine in the Atlantic late in July, approximately 300 miles off the northern coast of South America. Survivors have been landed at ap east coast port.

dies; and an attack upon the Kei Islands.

A headquarters communique said allied planes, striking by night at Rabaul, which is northwest of the Solomons, scored hits near airdrome runways from which Japanese aerial assistance could be sent to the Tulagi defenders.

The air clash over New Guinea occurred near Samarai, which is on the southeastern tip of the island on a line directly west of Tulagi. Out of seven Zeros encountered, allied airmen either destroyed or damaged every last one of them.

ance of untapped raw materials. He added that he was greatly impressed by the story of a west coast promoter, Henry J. Landahl, who told the committee yesterday of trying for 40 years to raise money for a blast furnace in the Pacific northwest, only to be constantly balked by the United States Steel corporation and the J. P. Morgan banking interests because the project would compete with their properties.

The larger steel corporations, such as U. S. Steel and Bethlehem, had "integrated" their own facilities to handle the war orders. Truman said, while the testimony of small independent rolling mill owners showed a shortage of raw materials that was threatening them with extinction.

Yank Pilots Practice in African Desert

CAIRO, Aug. 12 (AP)—United States army fighter pilots have arrived in the western desert to learn flying conditions at first hand as dust storms curtailed the war on that front to ground patrols and artillery exchanges.

The Americans are joining RAF squadrons at present, and will fly RAF American-made Curtiss Kittyhawks and Tomahawks, with which most of them already are familiar, it was disclosed.

After watching the Americans give aerobatic displays, a British squadron leader enthusiastically declared:

"Those boys certainly can fly. If they're all like that there's going to be fun."

The American pilots, who are under the command of an Alabama colonel with more than 5000 flying hours to his credit, are being placed in RAF South African squadrons.

Meanwhile battle operations were primarily confined to operation of British patrols over the whole front facing the Germans and Italians.

A British communique said casualties were inflicted on enemy working parties in the northern sector, while artillery fire took place in the northern and central areas.

ization has been taken away from him. Both reside in New York.

Grand Jury
Biddle said that evidence against the group would be presented to the grand jury in New York City, Brooklyn and Chicago within ten days and that indictments might be expected shortly after that.

United States attorneys in those jurisdictions will handle the cases and there will be no special prosecutors, he added. Biddle declined to say whether the two nazis whose lives were spared because they aided the government, George John Dasch and Ernest Peter Burger, would be used as witnesses in the trial of their alleged accomplices.

Biddle said that those against whom criminal indictments are to be asked, include:

Mr. and Mrs. Hans Haupt, Mr. and Mrs. Harry Jaques, Mr. and Mrs. Walter Wilhelm Froehling, and Mr. and Mrs. Otto Richard Wergin, all of Chicago; Helmut Leiner, and Herman Heinrich Faje, both of Astoria, Long Island, N. Y., and Anthony Cramer and Miss Hedwig Engemann, both of New York.

Treason is punishable by death. In response to questions, Biddle said that the justice department had no jurisdiction over the bodies of the six executed nazis and that their disposition rested with the war department.

AFL WITHDRAWS UNFAIR CHARGES

The Klamath Basin District council of the AFL Lumber and Sawmill Workers union has withdrawn all unfair labor practice charges filed late this spring against the Pine Industrial Relations committee and individual lumber mill operators, it was learned today.

The charges were filed with the National Labor Relations board and based on a union allegation that both the PIRC and the operators had refused to bargain with the LSW on labor demands for increased pay and other points.

The majority of AFL-LSW workers were subsequently granted pay boosts either in direct negotiations with individual companies or by firm proclamations. Most of the increases were made retroactive to April 1 and were for 74 cents per hour.

Some observers construed the withdrawals as a step toward more harmonious relations between the AFL-LSW and Klamath area employers.
