FIRE DESTROYS KLAMATH RANCH

FORT KLAMATH—Fire of undetermined origin which broke out here Sunday afternoon destroyed a small dwelling house, two barns and quantities of material and machinery stored there as well as a truck, trailer and car, all belonging to George S. Hoyt, rancher of Klamath marsh and former resident here. The occupants of the small house together with all its contents, were Mr. and Mrs. Merritt Bremer, both of whom were absent at the time of the fire.

Three other residences in the vicinity belonging to Hoyt, as well as business properties in the neighborhood, were for a time endangered by the fierce blaze, which was finally brought under control by fire equipment from the Klamath Agency and the water truck of Updegrave brothers, assisted by local residents including men from ranches who were engaged in haying at the time and were called in by telephone to help put out the fire. Absence of wind was a favorable factor in controlling the blaze and saving adjacent buildings, it was said. Sparks from the fire ignited awnings at windows of the William A. Page residence some distance north of the burning property.

Hoyt was absent at his Klamath marsh ranch at the time of the conflagration. It is understood that the large loss is partially covered by insurance.

PENDLETON, Aug. 12 (AP)—Pacific northwest grange officials, representatives from other farm organizations, and business and civic leaders will hold an all-day meeting in Pendleton September 4 to press for immediate action in utilizing grain in the manufacture of synthetic rubber.

Among the national authorities asked to attend are Secretary of Agriculture Wickard, Donald Nelson, war production board chairman, Bernard Baruch, chairman of a special committee named by President Roosevelt to study the subject of rubber, James T. Jardine, director of the office of experiment stations in Washington, D. C., Senator McNary of Oregon, Senator Gillette of Iowa and Dr. E. P. Lathrop, in charge of synthetic rubber experiments at the agricultural research laboratory in Peoria, Ill.

The meeting is being sponsored by state grange masters of Oregon, Idaho and Washington under the leadership of E. T. Taylor, Idaho master.

STOCK PRICES MAKE WEAK TRY AT RECOVERY

NEW YORK, Aug. 12 (AP)—Stock prices made an indecisive effort at recovery in today's late market dealings after an early session in which they bobbed aimlessly.

At the finish quotations unchanged to a little higher had a precarious balance over minus signs.

Warner Bros., low-priced amusement issue, took the late play to move in large blocks at a fraction better than the best previous for the year.

It displaced Chrysler in the spotlight. The former opened on a block of 1000 shares, and later slipped more than two points on yesterday's dividend cut; there was some come-back later.

Ahead most of the time, though there were plenty of swings from loss to gain and back, were such issues U. S. Steel, Bethlehem, Westinghouse, Eastman, Consolidated Oil and Standard Oil (N. J.).

Profit-taking from time to time set back Eastern Airlines and American. Others inclined to dip included Santa Fe, Caterpillar, American Telephone and Kennecott. Homestake slipped more than a point on fair turnover.

Turnover in stocks was about 300,000 shares, against 250,000 today.

CHICAGO WHEAT

CHICAGO, Aug. 12 (AP)—The wheat market's recovery attempt, based partly on diminished receipts at many terminals, high government loan rates, delayed harvest in the spring crop belt and improved subsidized foreign export sales evaporated today because of lack of sustained buying power.

Early price gains ranging up to

1 cent were whittled away in later trade when buying subsided and scattered hedging sales caused small net losses to be posted.

Wheat closed 1/2 lower than yesterday, September \$1.17 1/2, September \$1.20 1/2, corn 1/2 off to 1 higher, September 86 1/2, December 88 1/2, oats 1/2 lower; Soybeans 1/2 higher; Rye unchanged to 1/2 off.

BOSTON, Aug. 12 (AP-USA)—The demand for domestic wools was slow in the Boston wool market today. Some sales of fine staple wools were made at \$1.18, clean basis. Offers of 50 cents, grease basis, were received for bright graded three-eighths wools, but little was available at this price. Sales of secured pulled wools, type B, were made at \$1.07.

Nazism Pushing Germans to Revolt, Exile Asserts

PORTLAND, Ore., Aug. 12 (AP)—Ten years of national socialism have pushed the German people dangerously close to revolt, Dr. Hermann Rauschning, exiled president of the Danzig senate, declared yesterday.

"German morale will break soon—sooner than the people in this country believe," Rauschning told a reporter.

Terrorism may crush first signs of the revolt, Rauschning said, but it will be "only a postponement of the showdown." "The German people are against war, and against national socialism. . . . You can win victory after victory, but you can't ask more than the soldier can stand. . . . The burden has become impossible for the common man to bear," he added.
