TULELAKE — Lieut. Robert Fensler, eldest son of Mr. and Mrs. Clark W. Fensler, has been promoted to the rank of captain in the army air corps, according to word received here Saturday. The new captain, just 24 years old, pilots a "flying fortress." He advised his parents that he has received instructions to leave his base in Florida early this week for duty at an unknown destination.

Graduated from the Tulelake high school in 1936, his progress since he enlisted in the U. S. army in December, 1939, has been meteoric. His initial training was at Randolph Field, Tex., as a flying cadet. Graduating from Kelley Field, Tex., as a second lieutenant in August, 1940, he acted as an instructor at the same field until December of that year. Later he was assigned as an instructor in advanced flying at Randolph Field, Ariz., where he remained until leaving for Florida several weeks ago.

Captain Fensler, reared on a Tulelake farm, is believed to be one of the youngest captains in the service among men enlisted from this area. He has two brothers, Jack and Dick, who are also members of the armed forces. Their father served in World War I.

Achieve Lawyer, aviation machinists mate, 3rd Class, former scaler with the Klamath Reservation forestry division is visiting his wife and relatives at Klamath Agency. He has been in training at the navy aviation training school, Chicago. Lawyer is the son of Corbett Lawyer of the Klamath Agency staff, and attended the University of Idaho and later graduated from University of Oregon.
