Man Entering Services Must Give Up Ration Cards

Men entering the armed services must surrender their rationing cards to their local war price and rationing boards, William H. E. L. Cox, OPA sugar executive, warned today.

Use of the rationing cards by other members of the families after the men have joined the services, is prohibited by federal law, he said.

The same rule, he said, applies to Japanese held in detention camps, to persons entering hospitals for more than 10 days or even going to jail for that period of time.

Joseph H. Quinn Has His Own Trouble With Japs

SAN DIEGO, Calif., Aug. 13 (AP) — Joseph H. Quinn, 31, U. S. navy fire controlman on duty on an east coast-based war vessel, and divorced from a Japanese wife he married in Tijuana, Mex., in 1938, has placed a final problem before the district attorney here.

Quinn is making alimony payments to his former wife, now in the Santa Anita Replacement Center, and wants to know if he should continue to remit.

Two children were born to the couple and a condition of the divorce was that Quinn contribute \$25 monthly for their support.

"What I want to know," he wrote local officials, "do I have to fight 'em (the Japs) and support them at the same time?"

Quinn has been remitting regularly through the probation department. The district attorney's office said it probably will recommend that payments be continued but that the money be impounded for the duration or until the children are released.

Realtors from out-of-town said the convention was the best yet held by the state association. A resolution from the convention generally thanked Klamath officials and the public here.

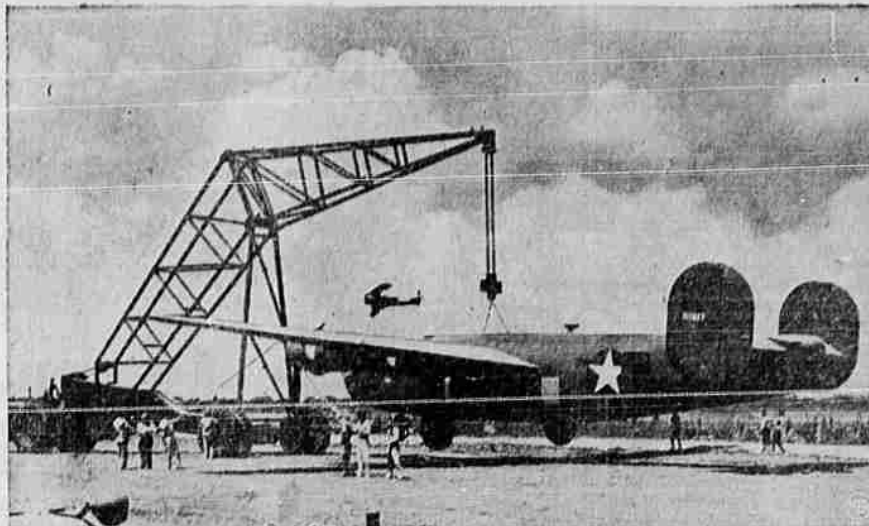
Netherlands Sub Gets 2 Jap Ships

WAR PUBLICITY SETUP CHANGED

WASHINGTON, Aug. 13 (AP) — A complete and drastic reorganization of the public relations agencies of the army and war department to eliminate duplication of effort, inconsistencies and "promotion" of news was announced today by Secretary of War Stimson.

At least 75 of more than 100 public relations officers of various arms, services and bureaus of Washington outside the regular war department bureau of public relations under Major General Alexander D. Surles will be reassigned, if possible, to duty with troops, Stimson said.

Stimson said the decision to reorganize the public relations setup was taken before publication Monday of a story issued at Mitchell field, N. Y., with pictures said to be of fifth column signs pointing to important defense installations, a story the army later said "may be untrue."

However, Stimson said, this occurrence was precisely the kind of thing that the reorganization might be expected to eliminate in the future. Obviously aroused by the Mitchell field story, Stimson said he had made a direct personal request to Lieut. Gen. Hugh A. Drum, eastern defense commander, for a thorough investigation.

Ickes Acts to Avert Western Fuel Emergency

WASHINGTON, Aug. 13 (AP) — Secretary of Interior Ickes announced today that he had dispatched to Seattle a representative empowered to take action to "avert a threatening coal and wood emergency in Washington and Oregon."

Brigadier General Bruce P. Disque, assistant director of the office of solid fuels coordinator for war, was named as the representative.

Ickes, who acted in his capacity as solid fuels coordinator, advised Oregon and Washington householders to increase the purchase and storage of coal from other states immediately.
