LUCY TELFORD, 83, DIES EARLY FRIDAY

Lucy Almon Telford, 83, for the past 38 years a resident of Klamath Falls, died at the home of her son, Wilbur, 73 Pine street, early Friday morning, August 14. The beloved matron, who came to Klamath Falls in the early part of the century, leaves a host of friends and relatives to mourn her loss.

Lucy Almon Towle was born December 4, 1858, in Hickman, Ky. She married Henry C. Telford in Beatrice, Neb., February 7, 1876. In 1887, the family moved to Ellensburg, Wash., and in 1890 to Grants Pass. They remained in the valley until the spring of 1899 when they operated the resort of Colstein in the Siskiyou mountains near Ashland.

On August 4, 1904, Mr. and Mrs. Telford and their five children, moved to Klamath Falls where Mr. Telford entered the boat building business and served as carpenter. His boat house still stands on Link river at Conger avenue. Many of the early day homes here were built by Mr. Telford.

Henry C. Telford died August 14, 1914. His wife's passing occurred exactly 28 years to the day. Mrs. Telford was a member of the First Presbyterian church and was active in work of the various organizations until she became an invalid five years ago. She had been in a wheel chair since that time. Mrs. Telford had made her home with her son, Wilbur, since her husband's death.

Surviving are four sons: Charles A., of El Paso, Tex.; Ray A. and Wilbur L. of this city; Harry C. Telford of North Bend, Ore.; and one daughter, Mrs. Jessie E. Edwards of Linslaw, Ore.; six grandchildren and two great-grandchildren. Funeral announcement will be made later by the Earl Whitlock Funeral Home.

Two Indicted For Violating Negro Rights

WASHINGTON, Aug. 14 (AP)—Attorney General Biddle announced today that the government had initiated federal court action against two Beaumont, Tex., police officers for violating the civil rights of a negro soldier.

Biddle said that he had ordered the filing of an information in federal district court at Beaumont against Policemen Clyde Brown and Billy Brown for mistreatment allegedly dealt Private Charles J. Reo on July 28, after Private Reo was ordered off a bus for taking a seat reserved for white passengers.

The soldier was beaten when he alighted from the vehicle and while being taken to police headquarters was shot twice, Biddle said in a statement released by the office of war information.
