

STUDENTS MAY BE RELEASED FOR FARM WORK

TULELAKE—Parents of boys attending the seventh and eighth grades of the Tulelake elementary school may present written requests to Jerome Keefer, principal, for release of students necessary to continuance of agricultural pursuits during the first 10 days or two weeks of school, Keefer announced Thursday. Requests must reach the school by the opening date, Monday, Aug. 31, and students should be prepared to enroll on the opening day.

Teachers will co-operate in assisting students to make up work following return to classes and are anxious to assist in any way possible to meet the farm labor emergency, it was stated.

The school cafeteria is being remodeled, with tables and chairs to replace the old tables and benches. Equipment purchased from a closed restaurant is being installed and Mrs. Belle Stark has been employed as cafeteria cook. Her assistant has as yet not been named.

The Teachers' Institute at Yreka is scheduled for July 27-29 inclusive. John Thurman will again be in charge of the building and grounds.

Keefer announced the following members of the faculty, which include a number of new teachers: first grade, Mrs. Francis Carter, San Jose, who will teach her first term here; Mrs. Phyllis Turner, also of San Jose and a new member of the staff, will be in charge of the second grade and Miss Patricia Ramsden, who taught here last term, will teach the third and fourth grades.

Aileen Heberle, Reolinda, Calif., who taught here last term, will be in charge of the fifth grade and Mr. Browne, who taught last year at Montague, will be room teacher for the sixth and seventh grades and will be responsible for boys' physical education and glee club. Keefer will teach the eighth grade.

George Reiben, principal of the high school, is expected home this week from a vacation spent in Washington.

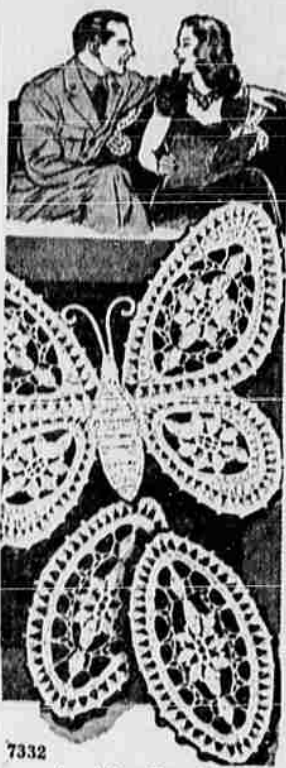

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Summer Style Pot Roast Is Budget Feast

Those inexpensive meat recipes will make a feast for Sunday without upsetting the budget.

Summer Style Pot Roast
(Serves 6 to 8)

Three pounds chuck of beef, salt, pepper, 1 cup flour, 1 cup water. Wipe meat with cloth. Season to taste; rub flour into meat until all has been used. Place meat in large kettle; pour in water and cover tightly. Bring to simmer, and continue to cook at simmer stage for about 2½ to 3 hours. Add more water if needed. If meat is kept at very low simmer, more water will not be needed.

Here's a wonderful dish with a little-used delicacy.

Pork Liver Casserole
(Serves 4 to 6)

One and one-half pounds pork liver in one piece, 1 cup flour, 5 slices bacon, 1 large onion, sliced, 1 cup diced celery, 1 cup

cooked tomatoes, 1 teaspoon salt, 1 teaspoon pepper, 1 cup hot water.

Wipe liver with damp cloth and dredge in flour. Pan-broil the bacon until just done; drain. Sauté the onion and celery in bacon drippings until soft and yellow. Add flour that did not cling to liver, and stir until smooth. Add tomatoes, salt and pepper. Cook, stirring constantly, until mixture thickens. Place liver in casserole, add tomato mixture, water. Cover and bake in a moderate oven (350 deg. F.) for 50 minutes. Remove lid, place bacon over liver, and cook, uncovered, for an additional 10 to 15 minutes.
