School's Attitude
Stoll learned of the attitude of Klamath school districts toward the labor problem at a conference Friday, at which County School Superintendent Fred Peterson said that even if it were necessary to close schools for an entire term, the work experience would be worthwhile for the students and the action should be taken in behalf of farm production and the war effort. The U. S. employment chief described this as a "fine demonstration of patriotism."

Schools will open at the end of this month, but will be closed in agricultural districts if an emergency requires school pupils to fill a gap in labor ranks. Both city and county schools have agreed to this program.

Geurts announced that the FSA will immediately open a mobile camp at Tulelake, to provide housing for workers. Camps at Merrill and Malin will be opened toward the middle of September.

He said that the Merrill camp will occupy the Merrill CCC camp north of Merrill instead of the old mobile campsite adjoining the town.

It was stated that when these camps start, the U. S. employment service will place agents there to be certain that the camp occupants get to jobs immediately.

The FSA will operate in the Klamath basin under the Portland office jurisdiction, considering the entire basin one area regardless of the state line, Geurts said. Recruiting of labor for this district will also be on the basis of a single area, it was stated by Stoll.

Klamath potato growers will probably meet within a short time to get their organization going again after a period of comparative inactivity. The employment officials emphasized that it is necessary for grower organizations to be in operation in order to carry out essential parts of the labor supply program.

A present major reason for organization work will be the establishment of an adequate wage that will serve to attract workers into the region. An organization likewise can be effective in obtaining tire allotments for farm use, sacks, priorities on machinery, and dealing with other vital matters, it was stated.

Henry Semon, chairman of the county farm labor committee and president of the potato growers association, said at the conference that it is imperative for farmers to begin thinking about providing more housing on their own ranches for farm workers.

On Friday, the employment officials, draft officials, and the farm labor committee met in the offices of County Agent C. A. Henderson for a consideration of the entire problem. Stoll's announcement followed this session.

Just how soon the organized non-violence campaign can be started is uncertain. One congress source said next week would be "quiet" as far as the congress is concerned, but big things could be expected beginning August 24.

Although normal conditions apparently had returned for the most part after almost a week of rioting and vandalism, a new flare-up occurred today at Calcutta, India's great eastern city.

Demonstrators there slashed telephone wires, wrecked fire alarm boxes and interfered with street car service. Eight were wounded when police fired into one crowd.

Training Plane Being Repaired After Accident

A primary training plane, damaged in Friday's accident on the municipal airport, was being rapidly repaired Saturday and was expected to go back into service immediately, according to City Airport Manager Louis Soukup.

This plane figured in a ground collision when a Taylorcraft, flown by Byron Diskin, swung into the primary trainer at the edge of the north-south runway.

Manager Soukup said the Taylorcraft was badly damaged and might not be restored to service. Diskin was slightly hurt in the crash. Occupants of the other plane were uninjured.

ALLIED PLANES POUND ENEMY BASES, SHIPS

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Japanese fighter planes were shot down and three damaged. All allied aircraft returned to their bases although some were damaged slightly.

Lines Protected

Meantime, naval units protected the allied communication lines and escorting supply vessels to the occupation forces and the army and shore based aircraft continued to attack the enemy air bases and harbors, the navy reported.

Outcome of the battle for the island bases was expected to decide whether the Japs retain the stepping stones to attacks on Australia and New Zealand or whether the United Nations attain a base for future offensives against enemy positions.

Further indication of the progress in the Solomons came from an English war correspondent, who cabled his London paper from Sydney that the Americans "have or soon will have complete control of Tulagi island," a major point of attack.

So strongly entrenched were the marines, he added, that only "the heaviest reinforcements" could dislodge them. At the same time, he declared that the Japanese apparently were prepared to risk a big naval action to hold the Solomons and the fighting would continue for weeks.

"The navy's statement on the conflict was that:

"The task of consolidating the shore positions now held by United States marines in the Solomon Islands is progressing satisfactorily.

"Naval units are engaged in protecting our lines of communications and escorting supply vessels to our occupying forces."

"United States army and allied shore-based craft are continuing to attack Japanese air bases and ship concentrations in enemy-held harbors."

WLB Grants Raise To Textile Mills

WASHINGTON, Aug. 15 (AP)—The war labor board announced today that it had granted an increase of 7½ cents an hour to 61,000 workers in 40 New England and 11 southern textile mills, and denied a \$1-a-day increase demanded by 32,000 employees in ten plants of The Aluminum Company of America.

A request of 800 workers in the Buffalo plant of the American Magnesium company, subsidiary of Alcoa, for an increase of 15 cents an hour also was rejected by the board.

REDS BATTLE NEW THREAT TO STALINGRAD

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miles southwest of Moscow, and at Voronezh, which is 300 miles southeast of Moscow.

The serious new threat to Stalingrad was acknowledged in a red army bulletin which said the Germans had driven a deep wedge into soviet defense lines below Kletskaia, 75 miles northwest of the big Volga steel city.

The action apparently centered in the Kalach sector, 50 miles west of Stalingrad, where the Germans earlier this week declared they had "annihilated" the bulk of two Russian armies. The Russians said yesterday they had repulsed a massive tank-led attack in the Kletskaia-Kalach region after the nazis had broken through to the Don.

Rhodes Shelled

Other swift-breaking developments in the European war picture:

1. British warships shelled the town of Rhodes on the island of Rhodes in the Italian Dodecanese for 12 minutes early Thursday, setting great fires and inflicting extensive damage, the British reported.

The island lies in the eastern Mediterranean close to Turkey. 2. U. S. army fighter pilots were officially disclosed to have entered the battle over the western Egyptian desert, swinging into action with the RAF yesterday amid an intensification of air fighting.
