prompt speech, quoted him as declaring he well understood "the feelings of sadness and patriotic excitement which now fill vibrant hearts."

Take Over Ships

The president said ships of aggressor nations would be taken over to compensate for damages and the property of axis subjects in Brazil would be held responsible, while all those who had given information on ship sailings would be "put to work with spades, shovels and pickaxes to build roads in the interior."

The Brazilian steamers Bage and Cuyaba, due to take axis diplomats to Europe, were held in port.

Just before noon a crowd tore Brazilian flags from the offices of two pro-axis newspapers.

Property Attacked

Special police prevented damage to the newspaper buildings but there were other cases of attacks on German property by enraged Brazilians.

There was one attempt to attack a suburban German hospital. A German bar was sacked. Demonstrations occurred against various business houses known to be German-controlled.

Dispatches from Porto Alegre told of anti-axis demonstrations by a huge crowd there.

Along the northeast coast survivors continued to arrive in battered lifeboats, wreckage drifted ashore, and planes of the Brazilian air force kept the whole area under careful patrol.

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standing that such rationing would be applied in the future "only in case the allocation of government meat purchases among packers, and the adjustment of price ceilings combined with regional allocation should not solve the problems of equitable distribution."

The committee, headed by Secretary of Agriculture Wickard, declared in a statement that it had reviewed the current supply situation and preliminary reports on future requirements and supplies.

On this basis, the statement said, "the committee recommended that the military agencies, lend-lease administration and the war production board collaborate in developing a program for allocation of government procurements as equitably as possible among federally inspected packing establishments in the United States."

Germans Get An "Invasion Scare" All Their Own

LONDON, Aug. 18 (AP)—Advises reaching the Norwegian government-in-exile here today declared German forces in Norway experienced an "invasion scare" when a British convoy was recently sighted off the Trondheim coast.

It was said the Germans occupied the Trondheim telephone exchange and locked the operators in a room where they were held overnight.

Many followers of pro-Nazi Premier Vidkun Quisling removed their party emblems, burned confidential papers and hurriedly left town amid fears of a British attack.

The British convoy presumably was en route to northern Russia.

several landings in the Guadalcanal-Tulagi area, "rapidly" overcoming enemy resistance, and their captured shore positions "have since been developed and are now well established."

2. Japanese naval forces closed in for action with the allied fleet on only one night, August 8-9, and backed off "before reaching the vessels engaged in the landing operations."

3. Enemy air attempts on the first two days of the landings inflicted only "minor damage" on the American troops.

The communique mentioned damage to both sides in the naval encounter but it kept the enemy guessing, of course, both what the United States lost and what the United States knows of Japan's cost in trying to defend the Solomon's shores.

Airmen of General MacArthur's command, meanwhile, scoured the Japanese-held harbors in the South Sea Islands close enough to the Solomons to reinforce their imperiled garrisons.

A communique today that the allied planes on offensive reconnaissance bombed shipping in the port of Kavieng, on the island of New Ireland, but that the results were unobserved. New Ireland is northwest of the Solomons in another link of the island chain at the top of the Coral Sea.

PLANT SEIZURE NOT AN ENDORSEMENT

WASHINGTON, Aug. 18 (AP)—Secretary Knox said Monday that the navy's seizure of the General Cable company plant at Bayonne, N. J., last Friday "must under no circumstances be construed as an endorsement of the attitude of the group of the employees who participated in such action."

Knox made the statement in a telegram to Michael Petrosian, employees' leader, who had wired President Roosevelt a promise that the workers would double their efforts now in order to offset the loss in production caused by the work stoppage last week.

The navy acted after the employees had gone out on an unauthorized strike resulting from a wage dispute.

The war labor board had attempted to settle the dispute but Knox declared that it failed because the workers, in striking, defied it.

"The navy has too much fighting to do to be managing plants which should be operating in the American way under their own management," Knox said, "and I am sure the men will want to relieve the navy promptly of this responsibility."

LOUISVILLE, Ky., Aug. 18 (AP)—Work at eleven Reynolds Metals company plants here was slowed today by a labor stoppage, active of the International Union, CIO Aluminum Workers of America, said "This thing started when the company yesterday fired Ray Stober, our chairman in the No. 7 plant for no good reason."

R. W. Pasnick, field representative of the concern, said the work stoppage was causing a loss to the nation of the equivalent of one medium bomber an hour, although he said all plants were operating to some extent.

Reynolds said the company had not been officially advised of the cause of trouble but said he understood Stober's dismissal was the reason advanced by the workers.

"This dismissal certainly is not sufficient cause for these aircraft division workers remaining away from their work as their action has interfered with production to our war effort," the company president stated.

Pickets appeared at the various plants but no disturbances were reported.

Deer Tag, Hunting License Refunds Held Unlikely

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 18 (AP)—The deer hunting season has been restricted for most of California and some hunters are wondering if they can get a refund on the deer tags and hunting licenses they bought.

The game commission said today there is no provision in law by which such refunds could be made; that funds, once deposited, can be refunded only by special act of the legislature therefore, it is impossible to make a refund.

"However," the commission stated "those who have purchased licenses know their money will be used to carry on the work of fish and game conservation, to provide better hunting and fishing in the future."

LOST GROUND RETAKEN SOUTH OF STALINGRAD

In the western Caucasus as axis troops forced two more crossings of the Kuban river in the Krasnodar sector.

Far down the Caucasus, where German flying columns have driven more than 250 miles along the Rostov-Baku rail line toward the Grozny oil fields, the Russians said their troops "waged defensive operations and repelled an enemy attack" in the Mineralnye Vody region.

Meanwhile, Soviet newspapers urged the United Nations to carry the war to Germany "with all their power and energy" and declared that Hitler "already has laid bare other vulnerable parts of his front in Europe in order to obtain success on the Soviet-German front."

Churchill Message

In London, Britons expressed belief that the Churchill-Stalin talks last week initiated a new phase of the war which would swing the allies into a multi-front offensive to bring about Germany's downfall.

Churchill himself messaged Stalin, declaring: "I am certain that our contact will play a useful part in furthering our cause."

YAKIMA, Wash., Aug. 18 (AP)—Philip S. Hitchcock of Bend and Sisters was elected district governor of Kiwanis International, Pacific Northwest district, at the 25th annual convention here today.

Lieutenant governors for Oregon sub-districts are Ben Hazen, Portland; Leo Adler, Baker; L. F. Griffith, McMinnville; Archie Vaughn, Bend.

Chehalis will have the 1943 convention if it is a war-streamlined meeting such as this year's convention.

RAF STRIKES AT NAZI RAIL CENTER

Osnabrueck is one of the main arsenals in the Ruhr valley and has big steel works and other railroad outlets for the German factories. It already had been raided once this month, on the night of August 9, when the British bombed it for the 40th time in this war.

Britain meanwhile was attacked by a small number of enemy aircraft which crossed the south coast and dropped bombs at a few points in the south and west of England.

The British said some damage was done and casualties were reported but they claimed two German bombers were destroyed, one over Britain and the other near its base in France by a fighter pilot.

retreat and capturing several miles of lost ground.

To the northwest of Stalingrad, Iavostia (Russian newspaper) says the "red army, infantry and tanks fulfilled their order to halt the enemy by all means."

THE Russians are still losing in the Caucasus fighting, leading one to guess that they are planning (if they have the choice) to defend Stalingrad and the Volga at all costs, leaving the Caucasus north of the mountains to the Germans if they have to.

CHURCHILL, back in London, today messaged Stalin: "I am certain that our contact (in Moscow) will play a useful part in furthering our cause."

This message, your own good judgment will tell you, is purely for public consumption. Stalin told Churchill what he wanted and had to have. Churchill made certain promises. All that was settled in Moscow.

Churchill's message is the sort of bread-and-butter note you send to someone you have visited.

TWELVE U. S. Flying Fortresses based in England attacked Rouen, across the channel in France on their own, without British help, and six other Flying Fortresses attack Dunkerque and Cherbourg. No bomber losses are reported.

After the attack, General Spaatz, commanding U. S. army air forces in Europe, says: "We will bomb the Germans as fast and as often as possible until we win the war."

FIVE Brazilian ships—one of them a troopship—have been sunk by axis submarines in the past three days. Brazil is getting hot under the collar, and a dispatch from Rio de Janeiro says:

"The Brazilian government bitterly criticizes the axis for its disregard of the most elemental concept of HUMAN RIGHTS." The Brazil government promises that these attacks on Brazilian property and lives will not go unpunished.

WAR, as practiced by conquerors of the Hitler stripe, has ALWAYS disregarded human rights. The way to protect human rights is to be always ready to FIGHT EFFECTIVELY FOR THEM.

Brazil isn't equipped to fight effectively.

So she may expect her human rights to be trampled upon except in so far as she may be protected by the U. S., which is GETTING READY to fight effectively.

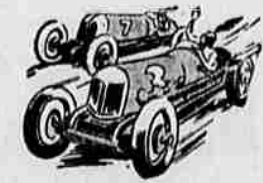
"We will bomb Germany as fast and as often as possible until we win the war," he said. "This marks the real start of an ever-increasing American bombing offensive."
