

SECT ATTORNEY HITS STREET VENDOR'S RULE

Citing the bill of rights, J. E. Davis, attorney for the Jehovah's Witnesses religious sect, last night told city councilmen that passage of a proposed street vendors' licensing ordinance would be in direct defiance of that bill.

Davis said that any measure which tended to restrict freedom of press or religion was opposed to the provisions of the first amendment to the constitution. The attorney appeared before the council in an effort to halt passage of the ordinance, aimed at curbing a recent wave of Main street pamphlet selling, which passed its second reading last night.

If it were not for the bill of rights, Davis told the council, "you would not be sitting here tonight." And, he warned, if the ordinance passes "it's going to hit that press."

(The ordinance specifically exempts newsboys and vendors of the Holy Bible from the proposed \$10 licensing fee.)

Ordinances Upheld
Davis quoted from the pamphlet "Consolation" numerous editorial comments in opposition of similar ordinances in other sections of the country.

Later council discussion following the second reading centered on City Attorney J. H. Carnahan's observation that in four test cases before the supreme court of the United States similar ordinances have been upheld.

Councilman Rollin Cantrall said that the Jehovah's Witnesses "kind of get under my skin." They object to military service, he said, and "one of them told me 'we don't buy war bonds if we can help it.'"

Davis, before leaving, requested a copy of the proposed ordinance and said he would appear again before next Monday night's session when the measure comes up for final reading. He was accompanied by more than a dozen members of the religious sect.

Deny Taxicab License
The council also denied a new taxicab license to George Duke, from whom a license was suspended last week because of an illegal liquor sale conviction of one of his drivers. Councilmen said, however, that if he surrendered the suspended license, a second application would be considered.

Councilman Walter Wiesendanger asked that something be done about the continuous wailing of locomotive whistles in the Hot Springs district. His remarks were punctuated by the wailing of a locomotive whistle.

OREGONIAN FILES AGAINST MRS. LUCE

WESTPORT, Conn., Aug. 18 (AP)—Miss Vivien Kellems, who said that in seeking the honor she is "fighting a lot of clever politicians" plus the fortune behind Playwright Clare Booth Luce, formally announced Monday her candidacy for the republican congressional nomination in the fourth Connecticut district.

Miss Kellems, a native of Oregon and a graduate of the University of Oregon, while not mentioning her by name, directed several shafts at Mrs. Luce, whose republican friends in Greenwich, her home town, have indicated that they would back her, despite her recent statement that she would not actively seek the nomination.

"I do not indulge in clever moves, jockeying for position, letters of withdrawal which by some strange sleight of hand turn into an invitation to be drafted," Miss Kellems, attractive, thirtyish president of a cable grip manufacturing company, told Westport republican women.

Mrs. Luce, wife of Time-Life Fortune publisher, Henry Luce, recently wrote a letter asserting that she could not actively seek the nomination because she lacked knowledge of local issues, although she said she felt better qualified than other candidates to deal with war problems.

U. S. Navy Pictured as Completely Air-Minded

NEW ORLEANS, Aug. 18 (AP)—Scoffing at the oft-repeated claim that admirals love battleships too much and airplanes too little, the new chairman of the navy's general board pictured the United States navy as the most air-minded in the world for several years back.

As a result, asserted Admiral Arthur J. Heppburn in an interview here, "our naval air force is the best in the world."

"We have always gotten as much aircraft as we could," said Admiral Heppburn, former commander of the United States fleet.

"Nobody has ever given a bigger proportion of his total appropriations to airplanes than we have. The thing to remember is that we had only so many men. Until about a year ago, we had only about 100,000 men to

man everything. We have been, and are, expanding in all classes of ships — battleships, cruisers, destroyers, aircraft, submarines and everything."

Admiral Heppburn pointed out that the dive bomber and torpedo plane were inventions of the United States navy, and declared that, "while the army was talking about big bombers capable of flying overseas, we were flying them, six years ago, while I was admiral of the United States fleet."

But the veteran seafighter was just as emphatic in denying the opposite extreme, the claim that aircraft have made battleships obsolete.

"As long as we have surface navies," he said, "the causes that brought about the battleship will bring it back again. It may be a different type, but it will still be a battleship."

Actor, Famed as "Boy Hamlet," Dies in New York

HASTINGS-ON-HUDSON, N. Y., Aug. 18 (P)—Walker Whiteside, 73, who won fame at 15 as the "Boy Hamlet" in touring Shakespearean productions and whose career as an actor spanned 47 years, died last night after a three-year illness.

A native of Logansport, Ind., he played Hamlet, Othello, Richard III, Shylock and Lear before he was 20, and at 25 made his New York debut as Hamlet with his own company at the old Union Square theatre.

Turning from classical presentations in 1907, he starred in "The Melting Pot," which ran for 268 performances in New York and later enjoyed almost as long a run at the Queens theatre in London.

In 1912 he produced "Typhoon" on Broadway for 100 performances, with Florence Reed and Malcolm Williams with him in the cast, and in the fall of 1914 began a run of 100 performances in New York as Wu Li Chang in "Mr. Wu."

Truck-Driver Killed Near Albany

ALBANY, Aug. 18 (P)—A truckload of logs crashed through the cab of a truck four miles east of Crabtree on the Albany-Scio road yesterday, killing the driver, Charles B. Alley, 29, Lebanon.

Coroner E. C. Fisher reported that the truck's front wheels became detached, dropping the frame onto the roadbed, and the logs crushed Alley inside the cab.

Alley, who resided in Warrenton until recently, was employed by the Green Mount Logging company. Surviving are the widow and two children.

AVIATION EXAM BOARD COMING IN SEPTEMBER

According to an announcement received from the U. S. army recruiting service, the aviation cadet examining board will be in Klamath Falls during the first week of September for the purpose of examining and enlisting applicants for appointment as aviation cadets in the U. S. army air force.

Eligible young men between the ages of 18 and 26, inclusive, are urged to submit their applications without delay, in order that they may be included in this group. Requirements call for a birth certificate or other proof of date of birth and birthplace, three letters of recommendation, and for applicants under 21 years of age, their parents' consent. Applications and consent forms are available at the army recruiting office, 219 Postoffice building.

Successful applicants will be immediately enlisted in the air force reserve and will return to their homes until such time as they are called for active duty, which will be in approximately 60 days from date of examination. Applicants who are rejected for some slight physical defect or who are unable to pass the mental test in the grade required but who score 85 or better are eligible for training as service or glider pilots under the civil aeronautics administration at the Klamath Falls airport.

Applicants due for induction under the selective service act may be deferred until they have completed the examination, provided application is made within sufficient time to secure this release. Full information and literature may be obtained at the local army recruiting office.

Gable Buckles Down to Rigid Discipline

MIAMI BEACH, Fla., Aug. 18 (P)—Shorn of his famous mustache, Corporal Clark Gable is buckling down to the rigid discipline of the army air force's officer training school here.

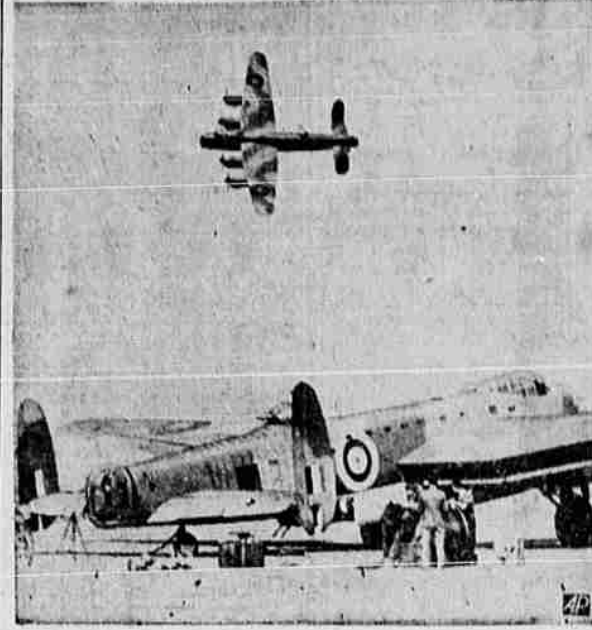

Seagoing Cowboys Make Good in Uncle Sam's Navy

CLOVIS, N. M., Aug. 18 (AP) If, before long, the seagoing cowboy jingles his spurs and six-gun into this man's navy, don't be surprised.

Cow waddies of the eastern New Mexico plains have scented a way to mix saddles and salt water, and scores are looking for methods of joining up with the U. S. coast guard as guardians of the nation's shores.

The last time New Mexico's cowboy fraternity mixed in a spot of trouble, Teddy Roosevelt's rough riders were born.

This time, sun-tanned riders of range and rodeo ring are on the loose in answer to the call of the coast guard for trained riders to patrol the beaches against invasion.

The coast guard recently announced plans to start recruiting a mounted beach patrol in the near future under the coast guard command of the eighth naval district, New Orleans.

Since word leaked out, riders from the Texas panhandle and eastern New Mexico have ridden into town for information. Many of them already belong to mounted patrols organized for local emergency duty, and some are stars of rodeo arenas from coast to coast.
