CIVILIAN FREIGHT CAR LOADS UPPED

WASHINGTON, Aug. 19 — To bring about a more efficient utilization of railroad freight cars and locomotives, Joseph B. Eastman, director of defense transportation, this week issued a general order requiring the maximum loading of cars carrying civilian freight.

The order which becomes effective Sept. 15, prohibits railroads from accepting for shipment, with certain exceptions, any freight cars which are not loaded either to their marked

load limit or to their full visible capacity.

Tank cars, flat cars, and cars containing less than carload freight are excluded from the order's provisions.

The order was drawn up in collaboration with representatives of the national industrial traffic league and the regional shippers advisory boards, and reflects suggestions and criticism made by these groups and individual shippers.

Letters from Corregidor Arrive After Six Months

WASHINGTON, Aug. 19 (P) — Letters written by American soldiers in the Philippines before the fall of Bataan and Corregidor, and recovered from the Pacific after the ship bringing them to the United States was sunk, are now being delivered to the soldiers' families, the war department reported this week.

The recent receipt of mail from men who had been fighting in the Philippines led some of the recipients to think that communications had been reopened with the islands, the department said, but the letters actually started their long journey in March.

The mail left the islands "probably by way of a submarine, which transferred it in a mail pouch to a small freighter," the department reported. "Subsequently, the ship was torpedoed. The mail bag floating at the scene was pulled from the sea and its contents were forwarded to the army postal service."

Bull Elk Hunting Ban Expected
SALEM, Aug. 19 (P) — Governor Charles A. Sprague said today he probably would issue an order before tomorrow night suspending the open season on bull elk in Douglas and Coos counties because of the forest fire hazard.

The open season on bull elk is scheduled to open in both counties next Sunday.

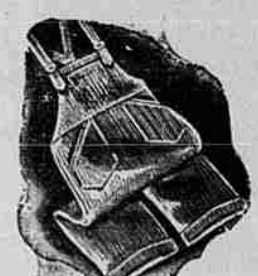
