The Seattle Rainiers defeated the Portland Beavers 4-1 in Pacific coast league baseball last night but they lost ground in their desperate race to overtake the leading Los Angeles Angels.

The Angels, led by heavy hitting Eddie Mayo, increased their lead to four games over Sacramento and nine over Seattle by winning a doubleheader from the San Francisco Seals, 2-1 and 12-3.

Mayo went to bat eight times during the evening and collected six hits, accounted for two runs, stole base once, made three assists and failed to err.

The Rainiers took only an hour and 36 minutes to best the league stragglers Beavers in a tight pitching duel between Seattle's Larry Guay, who yielded only four hits, and Ad Liska, who allowed only seven.

Jo Jo White led the Rainier Stickmen with a first inning score and the winning tally in the sixth when Liska wild pitched twice after White doubled.

Sacramento also won but lost ground to the Angels with a 4-1 victory over San Diego behind the three-hit hurling of Kemp Wicker.

Eddie Lake, Seals, shortstop, drove out three hits, one a home run, in four trips to the plate.

Hollywood batters rallied in the seventh after being shut out for six innings and pounded Vince Di Biasi, Oakland hurler, for four runs to win, 6-2.

Freddie Gay gave up 10 hits, the same number yielded by the Oak pitcher.

The two teams play a doubleheader tonight, the last night twin-bill loop teams will engage in for the duration.

We would have found more about it had J. Peak not skipped off to Lake o' the Woods this week.

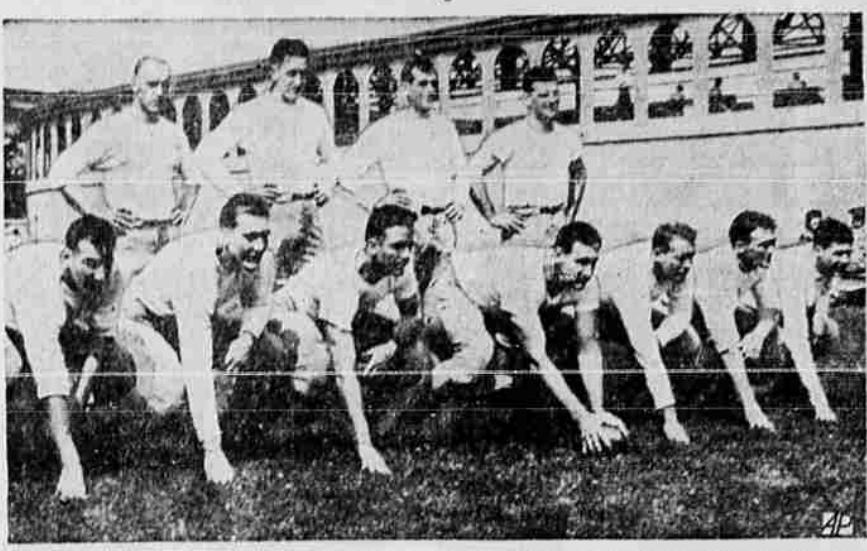
He will be back, howsoever, and we shall find out.

Moving Grid Games to Fans Is Answer to Travel Restrictions; Optimism Seen in AP Gate Poll

NEW YORK, Aug. 19 (AP)—Moving the football games to the spectators instead of having the spectators move to the football games is the answer to the college athletic departments to the war-inspired travel restrictions.

Although virtually every coach and athletic director polled by the Associated Press expressed optimism regarding attendance and gate receipts for the coming season, many of them either had moved a contest to a large city or was contemplating such a switch.

Even the staid Big Ten approved the transfer of the Ohio State-Illinois fracas from small Champaign, Ill., to much bigger Cleveland.

It was the coaches of colleges in the smaller towns who were pessimistic.

Bernie Moore of Louisiana State figured that gate receipts for the Tigers' home games would be off from 25 to 40 per cent because of Baton Rouge's small size, plus the tire and gas situation. Mike Ahearn, veteran Kansas State director, estimated his club's home receipts at Manhattan, Kas., "might be cut in half."

Army guessed the crowds at its three West Point battles would be off 30 per cent.

Their sentiments contrasted sharply with the majority, especially with the ones expressed by officials at schools in Boston, New York, Chicago, Los Angeles, Dallas, Minneapolis, Washington, Baltimore, Atlanta and New Orleans.

But just in case their optimism might be of the morning glory variety many of the directors made schedule shifts in hopes

of insuring profitable gates. West Virginia, unable to get an attractive "breather" for its home field on Oct. 3, agreed to play in Boston college's stadium; Maryland moved the Rutgers game to Baltimore and the Florida contest to Washington; Pennsylvania and Army will play in Philadelphia instead of at West Point; Princeton is bringing both the Army and the Navy games to New York's Yankee stadium.

Stanford will play Santa Clara and the University of Washington at San Francisco instead of Palo Alto; Alabama moved two games from Tuscaloosa; Mississippi took its game with Georgia to Memphis and it is possible the Ole Miss-Vanderbilt tussle will be decided on the same field; Texas A & M and Rice collide at Houston instead of college station in other site changes.

After nearly everybody except their relatives had given them up for lost, the St. Louis Cardinals are threatening at last to make a race out of the National league pennant drive.

With Southpaw Max Lanier hurling seven-hit shutout ball, the Cards ran their latest winning streak to five in a row last night by beating the Chicago Cubs and Claude Passeau, 5-0.

The Dodgers dropped into Philadelphia for a one-night stand and were jolted, 3-1, by the Cincinnati five games behind the Giants by whitewashing the Reds, 3-0, on the six-hit hurling of Johnny Lanning in another night contest.

In the American league, the Boston Red Sox ran their winning streak to five games by edging out the New York Yankees, 8-7 in 10 innings.

Johnny Peacock doubled off Relief Pitcher Johnny Murphy in the tenth and scored the winning run on Dom DiMaggio's outfield fly, handing the veteran Yankee fireman his seventh straight defeat.

Denny Galehouse turned in a seven-hit shut out in a night contest as the St. Louis Browns whipped the Chicago White Sox, 7-0, and climbed to within a single game of the third-place Cleveland Indians, who were idle.

The Washington Senators came from behind to trip the Philadelphia Athletics, 2-1, in another arm light tilt, with Alex Carrasquel shading Phil Marchion in a mound duel.

Manager Ernie Bishop's gentlemen will be presenting their finest and most formidable squad in the Crater ball park but will probably be facing a similar setup by Manager Dutch Lieber of the Ore-Cal loop champions.

With no information from the valley other than it'll be "Dutch Lieber night," the veteran manager and former Pacific coast loop star was nevertheless expected to name Lieut. Norman Lewis as his starting hurler.

It was Lewis who handcuffed the heavy-hitting Pelicans with five blows Saturday to whip 'em, 3-1, and carry off the circuit championship.

Lieber, ordered to report to his San Francisco draft board for induction, will watch his Craters play for the last time. The Medford Athletic association is sponsoring the plan to honor the veteran.

Tonight's game will start at 9 o'clock. Saturday night the Pelicans hook up with the Craters here in Recreation park in the second of the two-out-of-three series.
