He called upon farmers to lead the way around greater stability of prices by giving up the 110 per cent parity limitation. This would mean that the government could set ceiling prices at any level it might see fit from parity upward.

Wickard explained, however, that parity prices might not be enough to induce farmers to produce needed supplies of some vital products. In these cases, he advocated payment of government subsidies rather than higher prices.

Eighteen officials of AFL and CIO metal-fabricating unions were invited by the war production board to a conference here next Monday at which raw material shortages will be discussed.

The Economic Outlook, published by the CIO, said shortages due to inefficient management by the steel industry had caused a considerable number of plants to shut down.

allied planes were destroyed against only 35 German planes lost. The British admitted the loss of 98 RAF planes against 191 German aircraft destroyed or damaged.

Nazi Losses

British accounts listed 91 German planes definitely destroyed and 100 others shot down or damaged. The RAF lost 98 planes out of 1000 aircraft in action, but 30 of the RAF pilots shot down were known to be safe.

The British discounted Berlin claims that the Germans had beaten off the attack by painted-up commandos of the four United Nations—American Rangers, Canadians, British and fighting French — "without calling up reinforcements of important strength."

London advices said the entire machinery of the German defense plan in the west apparently was set into frenzied motion and declared the allies not only achieved every major goal but completed the vast operation within six minutes of schedule.

Vigil Kept

The last wounded commandos were brought ashore this morning, while squadrons of RAF Spitfires and Hurricanes kept vigil overhead and other fighter planes streaked across the channel in the direction of Dieppe.

Losses in killed and wounded were admittedly severe, as had been expected for so daring an attack against the gun-studded nazi coast, but the British said there was no confirmation of the German claim that "hundreds" had been killed, 1500 prisoners captured and 28 armored cars destroyed. Some tanks, used for the first time by the commandos, were known to have been lost.

British military experts said the operation showed:

1. That the British Royal navy and the RAF still rule the English channel.
2. The real strength of German land and air defenses in western Europe.
3. Prospects for establishing a beachhead for a full-scale allied invasion.

In addition, the raid provided invaluable experience in army-air cooperation, in battle tactics and in landing methods.

In other words, the allies (British and American) had command of the air, and German land-based aircraft COULDN'T BREAK THROUGH to smash the invasion armada.

All competent authorities have told us that complete and unchallenged command of the air is essential to any cross-channel attempt at invasion of Europe.

MacGowan says the allies had it.

ONE other word:

A British fighter pilot, high up in the air where he could see it all, describes the attack by American Flying Fortresses on the German airfield at Abbeville, just north of Dieppe:

"They hit EVERYTHING on that air field. Bombs fell perfectly, from a great height, directly on hangars, buildings and key spots. Only ONE stick went wide, and that hit a runway."

Our Americans, you see, were doing to the Germans what the

Japs did to us on Luzon—destroying the air fields from which their defending fighters must operate.

HERE is a guess as to the primary purpose of the Dieppe raid:

If you are a duck hunter and have a new gun, YOU WANT TO TRY IT OUT before the big flight starts, so you will know where to shoot and how to shoot when the time comes.

Our men and the British are trying out the new gun they have been forging with such care during all these long months.

When they tackle the Germans in western Europe, they will now know better how to handle their new weapons and what to expect of them.
