Council, Police Judge Petition Deadline Nears

Petitions of candidates who will run November 3 for three city council posts and the police judge job must be in by September 15, the city hall offices warned today.

The terms of Councilmen John Keller in Ward 2, Harvey Martin in Ward 3, Rollin Cantrell in Ward 4 and Leigh Ackerman as police judge will expire December 31. New officials will be elected in the November general election.

Officials at the city hall said that according to the city charter, deadline for petitions, which must be filed with the police judge, is September 15.

Police judge petitions must bear names of 1100 registered voters — 15 per cent of the total votes cast for mayor in the 1940 election. Councilman petitions must have the following number of signers:

Ward 2, 106; Ward 3, 127; Ward 5, 115. Each total represents a number equivalent to the number of votes cast in each

ward for mayor in the 1940 ballot.

It was pointed out that women voters must sign their given, and not their married, first names.

Aluminum Workers Get Wage Boost

PORTLAND, Ore., Aug. 20 (AP) — Workers at the Vancouver and Troutdale plants of the Aluminum Company of America had a higher wage scale today and company officials believed it would alleviate the worker shortage.

A new base pay of 85 cents an hour was established, a 10-cent increase. A bonus system was dropped.

Under the old scale and bonus, workers could make up to 82 1/2 cents.

C. S. Thayer, superintendent of the Vancouver plant, said that although the new scale was somewhat lower than that of the shipyards, it was comparable to other industries in this area.
