No More Group Evacuations, DeWitt Decides

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 20 (AP) — If the army finds military security dictates the removal of further persons or groups from the Pacific coast, action will be taken individually in each case and not collectively, as in the evacuation of Japanese.

This policy, together with a procedure to make it effective, was announced last night by Lieut. Gen. J. L. DeWitt, chief of the western defense command.

It is applicable not only to aliens but to any "dangerous or potentially dangerous" persons, whatever their citizenship or background. On the other hand, it makes reasonably clear
