INDUSTRIALS, RUBBERS GAIN RISING POWER

NEW YORK, Aug. 21 (AP)—Rubbers, together with selected rails and industrials, regained their rising stamina in today's stock market although many issues continued to loiter in the losing column. Transfers were in the neighborhood of 325,000 shares.

Wall street seemed more hopeful regarding war developments in Europe and the Pacific but customers, generally, were disinclined to get too far out on a limb because of possible eventualities over the weekend.

Stocks in the new high class included Goodrich Common and Preferred, Firestone Tire, Goodyear, U. S. Rubber, Union Pacific and Texas and Pacific railway.

Resistant performers were Bethlehem Steel, Anaconda, Kennecott, Schenley, Pan American Airways, United Air Lines, Homestake Mining, Marshall Field, DuPont, Allied Chemical and Intercontinental Rubber.

Bonds improved but commodities were shaky.

CHICAGO, Aug. 20 (AP)—Wheat prices fluctuated within a range of only 1 cent a bushel today and other grains except corn held to a correspondingly narrow span as the market reflected contraction of trading interest because of the uncertainty as to the nature of anti-inflation proposals now being drafted in Washington.

Reports that some government officials were studying plans that would mean eventual virtual stabilization of farm prices around parity levels chilled both buyers and sellers. Traders said there was no incentive for investment or speculative action until this situation is clarified and as a result the market was guided almost entirely by small scale commercial transactions.

Wheat closed 1/2 lower to 1/4 higher compared with yesterday, September \$1.18 1/2, December \$1.21 1/2; corn 1/4 higher, September 84 1/2-85; December 87 1/2-88; oats 1/4 up; rye 1/4 higher; soybeans unchanged to 1/4 lower.

Pine Orders Leap Over Last Week

PORTLAND, Ore., Aug. 21 (AP)—Orders for White Ponderosa, sugar and associated species of pine for the week ending August 15 total 80,933,000 board feet, up almost seven million from the previous week, the Western Pine associated reported today.

Figures for the previous week were 74,014,000 and for the same week last year 84,282,000. Similar comparisons of shipments: 92,545,000 board feet, 86,369,000 and 98,231,000; production: 96,815,000 board feet, 98,183,000 and 99,382,000.

BOSTON WOOL

BOSTON, Aug. 21 (AP)—The Boston wool market was not active but choice 12 month Texas fine wool was sold at a clean price of \$1.18. A few small sales of scoured three eighths fleeces were made at \$1.07. Sales of fine and half blood grey wools were reported at a clean price of 90-95 cents.

GOVERNMENT TAKES OVER SECOND PLANT

BOSTON, Aug. 21 (AP)—A spokesman for the S. A. Woods Machine company revealed on Thursday that the government had taken over a second of its plants and termed the seizure "unwarranted and purely coercive."

"After taking possession of our shell plant last night," the company spokesman said in a statement, "the government this morning revealed the punitive and oppressive character of its proceedings by also taking over our other plant."

The company's South Boston plant, engaged in war material manufacture, was taken over by the army ordinance last night after the management's refusal to comply with a war labor board directive.

The plant taken over today, a company spokesman said, "is entirely segregated, makes no implements of war, is a separate unit for collective bargaining and was not involved in any way with the war labor board case."

The company at the same time pledged to "cooperate wholeheartedly" in maintaining production of vital war materials.
