Rev. Gottfred J. Anderson will terminate his pastorate of the First Covenant church this Sunday. He has served the local church since April 1, 1937, coming here from Fresno, Calif. As a minister in his labors has been his family, Mrs. Anderson, Marjorie, Phyllis and Wilbur.

Rev. Anderson has been active in the Klamath Ministerial association. Besides serving on various committees, he has held the position of secretary, vice president, and was chosen president at the close of last season. He regrets that, because of his removal from the city, he cannot fill this position.

The Anderson family expects to leave Klamath Falls on Thursday, Aug. 27. They will visit their former home in Fresno, Calif., and intend to journey eastward the first week in September. Their new charge is at the Covenant church in Oakland, Neb. This church has a record of 57 years of continued service. Both Rev. and Mrs. Anderson are from northeastern Nebraska. They have been appreciative of the friendliness and cooperation of the people living in Klamath Falls and vicinity and wish to express their sincere thanks.

MALE CONVOY JOB COST 4 WARSHIPS

LONDON, Aug. 21 (AP) — Malta has received vital supplies, brought by a convoy which made a hectic voyage under heavy attack to the Mediterranean stronghold at a cost of four British warships, the admiralty announced Wednesday.

The anti-aircraft cruiser Cairo and the destroyer Foresight were sunk, in addition to the aircraft carrier Eagle and the cruiser Manchester, loss of which had been announced previously.

Swarms of axis aircraft and many submarines attacked the convoy in a battle which started east of Gibraltar on August 11 and continued through August 13.

While British losses were considerable, the punishment inflicted on the enemy was high, the admiralty said. It was announced that 66 enemy aircraft are known to have been destroyed and that it is extremely probable many others were lost.

There also were some losses of merchantment in the convoy, but on this point the admiralty said a large proportion of the convoy reached Malta.
