

HAMM CHOICE CONFIRMED BY U. S. SENATE

Frank Hamm, former Klamath Falls police chief, has been confirmed by the United States senate as United States marshal for Oregon.

Word of the action was carried on the Associated Press wires Friday. Hamm's nomination was announced some time ago, but Friday's report was the first that the senate had confirmed. Hamm has not yet been formally notified, but it is expected he will leave soon for Portland, where he will have his offices. He succeeds Jack Summer-ville.

Hamm resigned as police chief shortly after his nomination, and was succeeded by Earl Heivel, who has the rank of acting chief.

The senate also has confirmed re-appointment of Georgia Casebeer as postmistress at Bly.

Charles W. Ogle, re-nominated as register of the Lakeview land office, also has received senate O. K.

OPA ASKS STRICT TRUCK TIRE RATION

WASHINGTON, Aug. 21 (AP)—With September tire quotas facing a reduction from the August level, the office of price administration called upon local rationing boards today for the "strictest possible interpretation" of recent regulations restricting truck eligibility to essential vehicles.

Trucks still on the eligible list include those necessary to the war effort or public health and safety.

In a letter to local boards, the OPA said the war production board, which allocates rubber for military, civilian and other uses, had notified that allotments of tires must follow a downward trend for the remainder of 1942.

The OPA in July ordered that tires be denied to an estimated 200,000 vehicles carrying alcoholic beverages, soft drinks, candies, furs and other luxury goods.
