DEPOSITIONS TAKEN IN NEW FLOOD SUIT

Depositions were taken in circuit court Friday in the case of Ketsdever brothers versus the California Oregon Power company and others, one of the Algom flood suits.

Deposition taken Friday was from George Ketsdever, one of the plaintiffs. It appeared likely this would not be completed until some time Saturday.

The Ketsdevers are suing for approximately \$78,000 for alleged damages resulting from the break in a dike which flooded a considerable area in the Algom district over two years ago.

Depositions have also been taken from Mrs. Ellen Herlihy, another of the plaintiffs in Algom flood suits. She is suing for \$28,187.83.

Under circuit court procedure, the defendant, in a case of this nature, is permitted to ask for depositions in order to discover the grounds on which the suit for damages is based.

Camp White Head, Guests Plan Visit To Lake o' Woods

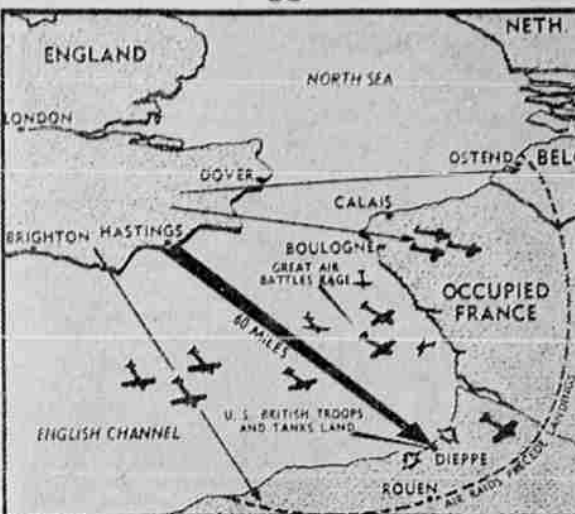

COURT WILL DECIDE CIVIL CASE FACTS
