

MAJOR BOWYER TRANSFERRED TO PHOENIX

Major Norman Bowyer of the Salvation Army received word Friday that he is to be transferred immediately to Phoenix, Ariz., where he will be second in charge of the Salvation Army's work with the armed forces in Arizona and New Mexico.

Major and Mrs. Bowyer will report for their new work on August 30.

Their successor here is expected to come from Chicago. A formal announcement of the new appointment has not been made.

Major Bowyer came here as Adjutant Bowyer from La Grande four years ago. During his term as head of the Salvation Army work here, the army has moved from quarters on Walnut street to the remodeled structure at Klamath avenue and Fourth street, regarded as one of the finest Salvation Army plants on the coast.

KISKA SAID TO BE SUPERIOR HARBOR

SEATTLE, Aug. 21 (AP)—The Rev. Bernard R. Hubbard said recently Japanese-occupied Kiska is the best Aleutian island harbor—one that the enemy can utilize easily as a submarine base.

Arriving from Alaska, the noted "glacier priest" told interviewers:

"There are three good harbors along the Aleutian peninsula. One is Dutch harbor. One is Kiska. There is another, but of the three, Kiska is by far the best. Now there is no use kidding ourselves in the face of plain fact. The Japs have the best in the Aleutians."

Asked if occupation of Aleutian outposts is a real threat to the Pacific northwest, Father Hubbard declared:

"Of course it is. Forget about borders—the Aleutian weather controls flying. But think of submarines. Think a moment, and realize that Jap subs based at Kiska can prey on North Pacific shipping from a base 2000 miles closer to America than they have ever been before."

Father Hubbard said the American navy is "doing a grand job" in the Alaska fight, but warned the war in the west will be long and bitter. Asserting Americans "at home and not yet awake," he added "it is distressing to come from a land where American men are fighting and dying, and find business as usual, politics as usual and politicians worse than usual at home."

MACON, Ga., Aug. 21 (AP)—The good night kiss of a soldier and his date is not disorderly conduct in Macon, ruled Recorder George M. Nottingham, a World war one veteran.

An 18-year-old Macon girl and her 22-year-old army air corps soldier date were charged with disorderly conduct by the girl's landlady who observed the couple kiss good-night after returning from a movie.

"If I'm guilty of being disorderly, then every man in Uncle Sam's army belongs in jail," the young soldier told reporters as he waited to be called by the court. "And if every girl who kisses a soldier-sweetheart good night is going to be locked up, this is going to be a mighty dull war."

KLAMATH PAYROLL FOURTH IN STATE

Klamath county's industrial payroll for the fiscal year ending July, 1942, was \$9,451,286, fourth highest of the state's record total, the State Industrial Accident commission announced today from Salem.

The Klamath payroll accounted for 3.55 per cent of the state's total of \$265,967,180 which exceeded the previous record of \$186,054,225 established in the year ending July 1, 1941. Oregon's payroll for the year ending July 1, 1940, was \$184,176,340, the commission pointed out.

Topping Klamath county were Multnomah with \$132,230,349 or 49.72 per cent of the state total; Marion with \$18,329,333 or 6.89 per cent, and Lane with \$16,132,252 or 6.07 per cent.

The state's July payroll, not included in the total, was \$29,101,892, a gain of nearly \$10,000,000 over July of 1941.

Other southern Oregon counties were listed as follows (total payroll listed first followed by per cent of the state's total): Jackson, \$6,465,246, 2.43 per cent; Josephine, \$2,120,829, .80 per cent; Deschutes, \$2,488,336, .94 per cent; Lake, \$2,506,345, .94 per cent.

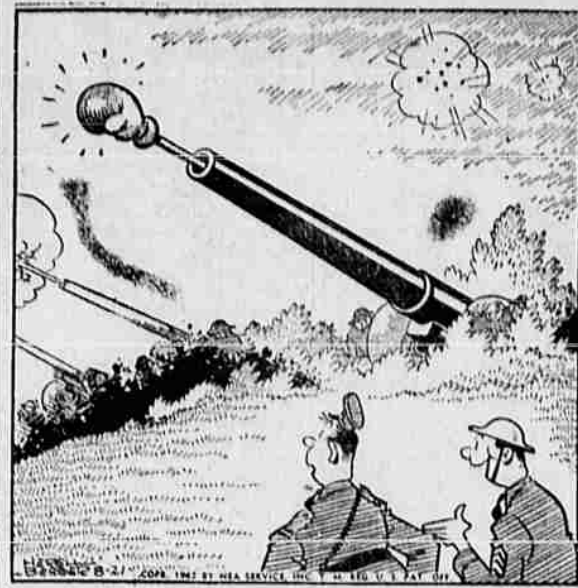
