Second Lieutenant Injured in Crash

TACOMA, Aug. 22 (AP)—Second Lt. William R. Murphy, Jamaica, Long Island, was in the McChord field base hospital today with severe injuries suffered when his army fighter plane crashed and sank in Puget Sound yesterday.

Murphy managed to get out of the plane a few seconds before it sank in several hundred feet of water. The ship fell about a half mile north of Du Pont in the vicinity of Ketron Island, about 20 miles south of here. A bomber with two captains and a lieutenant-colonel aboard crashed and sank near the same spot last May and neither the plane nor the men was ever found.

CHEERFUL WAR NEWS PEPS UP SHORT SESSION

NEW YORK, Aug. 22 (AP)—

Selected stocks continued to reach for higher levels in today's brief market proceedings although many leaders lacked recovery animation.

Aiding buying sentiment to some extent was the cheerful war news from the Pacific and the growing belief in financial circles that the United Nations were getting ready for a real blast at the nazis in Europe. In addition, broadening earnings taxes and other heavy costs drew attention to individual issues.

Low-priced stocks, most of which were unchanged to up a shade, came out in sizable blocks and helped expand the two-hour volume at around 200,000 shares, one of the largest Saturday turnovers for the year to date.

The list edged forward in spots at the start. While closing advances of minor fractions were plentiful, numerous issues held at Friday's final figures or were a trifle in arrears. Steels and motors did virtually nothing while rails were exceptionally narrow.

In the new high division were Goodyear, U. S. Rubber preferred, Texas & Pacific Railway, Amerasia, Standard Oil of Calif., and Otis Elevator. Occasional plus markets were pinned on American Can, American Telephone, Loew's, American Tobacco "B" and Corn Products.

MISSING—Mr. and Mrs. Jim Leach of 708 Prescott avenue, Thursday were advised by the war department that Leach's brother, Corp. Albert Leach of Cody, Wyo., was listed as missing in action in the Philippine islands.

The last word received from Corp. Leach was in November of 1941 from Fort Stotsenberg, P. I. The young soldier, 22, had many friends in the Klamath area. He was a bombardier aboard a Flying Fortress which landed at the Klamath municipal airport two years ago.

WHEAT

CHICAGO, Aug. 22 (AP)—Corn prices turned lower with losses ranging up to 1 1/2 cents a bushel today that carried quotations back to around seasonal lows.

Wheat fell a cent and other cereals almost as much. Liquidation of September corn contracts, excellent crop weather throughout much of the belt, reports of record barley receipts at Minneapolis and a let-up in industrial demand helped to weaken corn. Slight expansion in new wheat receipts at spring belt terminals and increasing movement of grain from the northwest to Chicago, although much of this has been government fed wheat, attracted notice. Prices at Minneapolis for September delivery are almost 8 cents a bushel under Chicago quotations.

Corn closed 1 1/2 cents lower than yesterday, Sept. 83 1/2, Dec. 88 1/2-88; wheat 1-1 1/2 down, Sept. \$1.17 1/2, Dec. \$1.20 1/2; oats 1-1 1/2 lower; soybeans unchanged to 1/2 off; rye 1-1/2 lower.
