Mrs. Laurence Aske to Judge Annual Fall Flower Show of Library Club

An important three-day school, of interest to those studying flower arrangement or those who wish to embark on this fascinating work, will be held September the ninth, tenth and eleventh, when Mrs. Laurence Aske of St. Helena, California, will be in Klamath Falls to teach.

Mrs. Aske is coming to this city under the sponsorship of the garden study group of the Klamath Falls Library club and will arrive here September the eighth. She will teach three laboratory lessons beginning on the ninth. The classes are open to the public and those interested may register with Mrs. Frederick W. Hamilton, garden club president.

Mrs. Aske, whose home is in the lovely Napa valley, is an accredited judge and has judged at numerous flower shows. She has advised garden group members here that her three lessons will deal with fruits and vegetables, cones and greens, and the last lesson will be on table arrangements. With the holidays not too far away, the lessons will be of particular interest. A small fee is asked for the series.

The visitor has taught flower arrangement for a number of years and for the last two years in high schools. She has lectured to most of the best garden clubs in northern California and has decorated for many of the large affairs of her community including several occasions for the Palace hotel in San Francisco. She arranged flowers in the decorative art section of the Palace of Fine Arts at the World's fair, and lectured at the hostess house on Treasure Island. Mrs. Aske has also judged at the large shows in California including those held at Sacramento, the Oakland spring show, and at San Mateo. She will also judge the fall flower show to be held here on September the fourteenth at the Willard hotel.

All interested women are invited to attend the lectures during Mrs. Aske's stay in the city.
