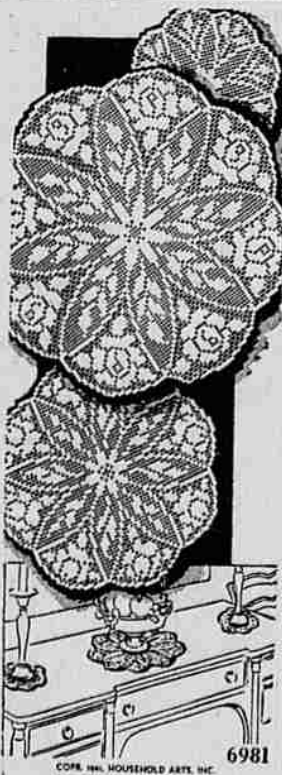
Many Parties Enjoyed By Folks in Neighboring Town

Extension Unit News

Fats and oils are of vital importance to the war effort. They are important foods, too. With overseas sources of supply reduced through enemy action, domestic supplies must be increased, consumption reduced and waste curtailed. We are increasing the supply by raising more fat hogs and producing more vegetable oils from such sources as peanuts, soybeans and cottonseed. We must reduce consumption by using less oil in paints and varnishes, by wasting less soap, by the more intelligent use of fats in cooking.

The housewives of America can help in two ways: first, by making sure that every ounce of edible fat is used in order to reduce total purchases; second, by saving all surplus fat which they cannot use economically in their own households and returning this fat to the butcher.

Drippings, residue, all forms of grease, should be placed in a clean container with a lid, and kept in a cool place if possible. When a pound or more has accumulated, it can be turned in for salvage. There will be no health hazard, even if it gets stale.

The important thing to remember is that no fats or oils of any kind are to be thrown away. It would be a serious health hazard if through our own carelessness we were obliged to reduce sharply the amount needed by each person for a normal diet.

LOS ANGELES, Aug. 22 (AP)—Executives of the war production board, declining to permit use of their names, indicated Friday the government is considering requisitioning air conditioning equipment from hotels, theatres, department stores and office buildings.

PORTABLE LUMBER MILL COMPLETED

DORRIS—A new portable lumber mill to be known as the Raymond-Rollins Lumber company was rapidly nearing completion this week on property at Picard leased from Art Campbell.

The mill will begin operation Monday, according to Earl Rollins, half owner in the company with Bill Raymond, logging operator. Expected daily cut will run from 8000 to 10,000 feet, and the mill will employ five men.

Logs for the mill will be supplied by Ted Webb and a six-man woods crew from timber located west of Picard.

Most of the rough lumber is to be sent to the Big Basin Lumber company at Klamath Falls for finishing and future use in government war industry contracts.

Dorris Voters Will Get New Voting Booths

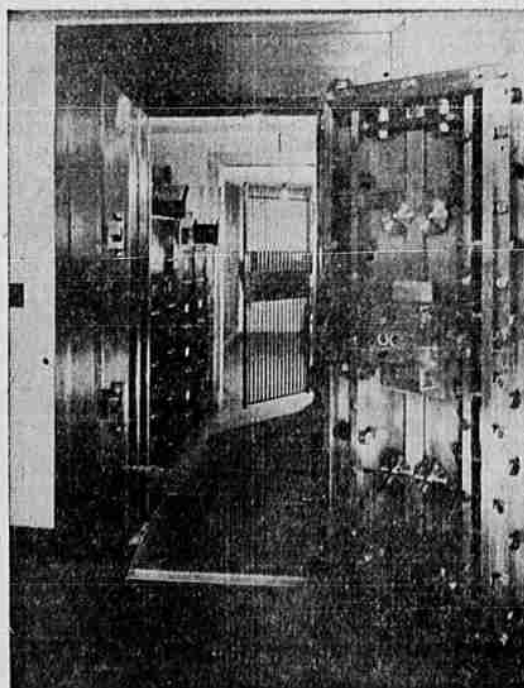
