Windshield Stickers Will Replace Car License Plates

SALEM, Aug. 24 (AP)—Bids will be called in a few days on the printing of the windshield stickers that will replace motor vehicle license plates in 1943. Secretary of State Earl Snell said today.

The stickers, having white letters on green background,

will be 41 inches wide and 31 inches high. The top half will consist of a scene showing a family crossing the plains in a covered wagon, a picture of Mt. Hood, and a forest scene.

The bottom half will contain the figures 1943 and 1943, while immediately below, in large letters, will be the words "Old Oregon Trail," commemorating the 100th anniversary of the Old Oregon Trail.

The words "1943 vehicle license" issued by the secretary of state will be below, while at the bottom will be the serial number.

The serial number will bear no relation to the 1942 license numbers, although every vehicle must bear the 1942 plates plus the sticker.

Cars purchased next year will be issued 1942 plates plus the stickers. Stickers are being used next year because there is no steel available for manufacture of license plates.

Appeals Judge Dies After Long Illness

NEW ORLEANS, Aug. 24 (AP)—Judge Rufus E. Foster, 71, senior jurist of the U. S. fifth circuit court of appeals, died at his home last night after an illness of several months.

President Theodore Roosevelt nominated him U. S. district judge for the eastern district of Louisiana in 1909. He was elevated to the circuit court in 1925 by President Calvin Coolidge.
