STOCKS FALL UNDER DARK WAR REPORTS

NEW YORK, Aug. 26 (AP)—Depressing war reports from Moscow, stressing the dangerous position of Stalingrad, again dominated stock market trends today and leaders fell fractions to a point or more.

Up to midday certain of the key issues showed fair resistance, but in the later proceedings the retreat became general with some acceleration in volume. In a few instances losses ran to 2 or more points in the final hour. Transactions were approximately 375,000 shares.

Stocks showing sizable declines included U. S. Steel, Bethlehem, General Motors, Chrysler, American Telephone, Western Union, Santa Fe and Southern Railway. Down 2 or more were Union Pacific and Electric Power and Light 6 per cent and 7 per cent preferred.

Commodities bowed under selling attributed to the proposed federal price controls.

WHEAT

CHICAGO, Aug. 26 (AP)—With losses of about a cent a bushel, the wheat market today absorbed moderate selling to offset the effect of larger receipts at northwest terminals so far this week.

Mill buying, reports of better flour business and sale of 10,000 bushels to be shipped out of Chicago helped at times to check the decline. Dealers bought 20,000 bushels of new spring wheat to arrive here and southwest reports indicated farmers would have to find storage space for large quantities of grain now piled on the ground or risk deterioration of condition which

would make it ineligible for government loans.

Wheat closed 1-1 cent lower than yesterday, September \$1.174-1, December \$1.204-1; corn 1-1 cent down, September 83 1/2, December 85 1/2; oats 1-1 cent off, soybeans 1-1 cent down; rye 1-1 cent lower. Rye closed at lows for the season, September at 60 1/2.
