BIEBER—Lee Metcalf, about 50, a cook, drove over from Medford, where he resided, to attend the funeral here Saturday of his old friend Charles C. Hall, who had died following a heart attack.

Saturday night Metcalf went automobile riding with another old acquaintance, Mrs. Mildred Gamma. She was driving. Two or three miles from Bieber, Metcalf gave a little gasp and slumped in his seat. Mrs. Gamma stopped the car, got out and opened the door on his side. Metcalf fell out, she said, and lay still. Unable to lift him into the car, Mrs. Gamma drove into Bieber alone and summoned help.

When a doctor reached Metcalf, he was dead. Friends said he had had heart trouble for some time.

Metcalf resided in Bieber at various times in the last dozen years.

War News Came Slower in 1898, S. H. Beach Recalls

How he got the thrilling news of Dewey's victory at Manila while stopping at a lonely mountain station west of here in 1898 was recalled Tuesday by S. H. Beach, a former resident of this county who is back on a visit after many years' absence.

"I was coming into this country with stock from the Rogue river valley," said Beach. "We stopped overnight at Hart station, between Klamath Falls and Ashland. The man at the station had just heard from a passing vehicle about Dewey's victory.

He gave us the news." Beach is visiting here with his sister, Mrs. Vance Hutchins.

After coming here in 1898, he taught school at Pine Grove and Poe Valley. He operated a ranch at Naylox, now known as Algoma.

Beach moved from here to Berkeley, and spent some years in Washington, D. C., where he was with George Creel's war information bureau during World war one, and also spent four years in Alaska.

Beach plans to remain here for several days.

SACRED HEART TO OPEN AUGUST 31

Students of Sacred Heart academy will return to their studies Monday, August 31, and classes in both grades and high school will resume work on this day, it was announced by the superior in charge.

This year a course in pre-aeronautics will be offered academy students with Bruce Weed as instructor. Weed is a graduate of Ohio State college, Roosevelt flying school and has had considerable experience flying all types of planes, it was said. Also added to the curriculum is a course in home economics for high school girls. This is the first time home economics has been included in the course of study. Oil and china painting, music and arts departments will also be included.

Both grade and high school students are asked to register at 8:45 a. m. Monday and classes will be held only in the morning. The regular schedule will be followed Tuesday. Academy officials said a mid-September vacation would be held if such a holiday was declared by the public school system.
