

ENEMY FLEES POSITIONS IN TULAGI AREA

225 miles from the strong allied New Guinea base at Port Moresby and 420 miles from the Australian mainland, were pounded by an allied land-air attack that destroyed Japanese planes, troops, supplies and fuel dumps.

General MacArthur's Australian headquarters reported that allied airmen shot down 12 or 14 enemy planes during the day in fights over Milne bay and the Japanese base at Buna, 180 miles up the northeastern coast of New Guinea. Earlier Japanese losses at the swampy Milne bay landing including a transport, probably a carrier and six landing barges.

Meanwhile, a terse navy department communique reported that "Japanese surface forces appear to have withdrawn from the vicinity of our positions in the Tulagi area."

While modern naval warfare might result in turning a withdrawal into another large scale invasion attempt in a matter of days or even hours, the enemy's disappearance was regarded generally as a victory for U. S. marines and American naval and air forces.

Boost Asked In addition to the 95-cent minimum, the union was seeking a 12 1/2-cent per hour boost for skilled and semi-skilled labor, a 50-cent per shift differential for night work, elimination of men's and women's pay differences for comparable work, posted wage scales, and standardization of wages for similar jobs throughout the area.

The union asked that their demands be made effective September 1.

Watches on the British southeast coast reported the heavy roll of gunfire from out in the mists of the strait suggesting to some a sea battle in the region of the entrance to the North sea.

Similar cannonading was heard at Varberg, on the west coast of Sweden. Swedish reports said it appeared to come from warships embattled somewhere in the narrow waters of the Kattegat through which German vessels would have to pass between the North sea and their home bases.

RAF Hits Italian Cruiser; Desert War Still Idles

CAIRO, Aug. 28 (AP)—An attack by RAF torpedo-carrying aircraft on an Italian cruiser of the 7847-ton Giuseppe Garibaldi class Wednesday night off Antikythera island, northwest of Crete, was reported by British headquarters today.

The same night and near the same place a southbound enemy vessel which appeared to be either an oil tanker or a large merchantman, accompanied by escort, was attacked by the planes and believed struck by a torpedo.

Operations in the desert were confined to air activity and desultory artillery exchanges yesterday as an ominous lull continued to hang over most of the El Alamein front.

dispatches declared that in one salient (presumably northwest of the city) the Russians had hurled the Germans back in local counter-attacks, recapturing three settlements.

The defenders were hardest pressed from the southwest where the Germans were reported charging over mounds of their own dead.

Fighting Slows Pravda reported that a strong force of nazi parachutists who landed behind the Stalingrad line and seized temporary control of a road junction had been wiped out.

Fighting for the Caucasus appeared moving at a slower pace now that the battles had moved into mountain passes more easily defended.

Red army men fell back again in the Prokladnenski area of the Caucasus, but held firm at a junction of mountain roads south of Iransodar, the mid-day communique announced.

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the dike might be interpreted as an admission of liability, no individual, firm or agency has undertaken the job of repairing the damage.

Court Aid This week, however, it was learned that some effort had been started to work out a plan whereby this could be accomplished without affecting the legal action in any way but still eliminate the nuisance.

Members of the county court said Friday the court had agreed to use its good offices in helping the project along, without use of county money or involving the county in any way in the litigation. The court, it was understood, might act as trustee and disbursing agent of funds contributed for abating the nuisance.

County Judge U. E. Reeder said the court was interested only from the standpoint of public concern. He said that one piece of property in the flood area, which previously paid taxes of \$147, has paid \$9 since the land was flooded.

Highway Danger In general, the plan under consideration is to have various interested parties, not necessarily litigants, contribute to a fund to be used in repair of the damage and maintenance of the dike. There would be an agreement that this work would not in any way affect the litigation.

SHIP SUNK

WASHINGTON, Aug. 28 (AP) The navy reported today that a small Norwegian vessel was torpedoed and sunk late in July by an enemy submarine in the Atlantic off the northern coast of South America. Survivors have landed at a United States east coast port.

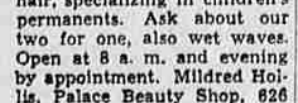

Whether this program would be realized was undetermined Friday.

In addition to sanitation aspects of the flood situation, the flood has been regarded as a danger to The Dalles-California highway and to the Southern Pacific railroad, both of which cross the flooded area, as well as to the Algoma Lumber company.

The flood last winter threatened the highway on a stretch which was re-built at the time the break first occurred. It is also understood that the continuance of flood conditions constitute a danger to the Algoma Lumber company, inasmuch as a break in another dike there would let water into the company's yards.

It was to put them out of commission (supposedly) that the Japs launched their May and June campaign in China.

THE Chinese, by their own admission, have no great offensive strength. The Japs have PLENTY of strength left. Why are they backing up in China?

Time will tell. At the moment, one guess is as good as another. (Naturally, one suspects they are getting ready for something somewhere else.)

THE expected big push in Egypt hasn't materialized. But there is still a feeling of tenseness in the news from there.

Rommel is supposed to have had not more than four divisions for his drive that carried him almost to the gates of Alexandria. It is guessed that he has at least six divisions now, and maybe eight.

What we and the British have is known only to the higher-ups.

THE news from Russia is obscure. The Germans are probably within less than 30 miles of Stalingrad and are reported to be pounding the city from the air. Russian resistance on the Caucasus front is said to be stiffening as the fighting enters the foothills where tanks can't be used so advantageously. There is little news from the Rzhev front west of Moscow.

MEANWHILE, on the home front, FDR suggests the idea of meatless days—which, he says, would mean that 30 or 40 ships now used to bring meat from Argentina, New Zealand and Australia could be used to transport tanks, planes and munitions.

sion base was rated here the greatest success scored thus far by the Chinese armies in their comeback in Chekiang and Kiangsi province, where they are keeping constant pressure on Japanese forces withdrawing from their extensive conquests of May and June.

Some 200 miles of the 450-mile Chekiang-Kiangsi railway, all of which was in Japanese hands late in June, now has been recovered and the Chinese are rapidly extending the area of their reoccupation.

The high command indicated that in Kwangtung province, south China, a Japanese withdrawal was in progress similar to that which has been underway for more than a week in Chekiang and Kiangsi.
