"Little Theatre" Is But One KUHS Improvement

An attractive "little theatre" room off Mon Clair street is one of several improvements in buildings and grounds which will greet Klamath Union high school students when they return to their classes Monday.

A large room, once used for auto mechanics, has been transformed into the theatre room by installation of wall board, a stage, and a new floor that slopes toward the stage. Eventually, opera chairs will be installed.

Easily Accessible

Arnold Gralapp, city school superintendent, said that the room will not only be used for high school dramatics, but will be available for use by dramatic groups of the community. The Mon Clair street entrance makes it easily accessible from the street.

A major improvement at the high school building is the establishment of a chemistry laboratory which Gralapp says is as good as can be found in any northwest high school. The chemistry and advanced science room, once a study hall, has been fitted with eight tables, each served with hot and cold water, gas and electricity.

Re-Decorated

A new library for freshmen and sophomores has been set up on the second floor in room 304. Juniors and seniors will use the county library.

The home economic rooms in the high school building have been attractively re-decorated.

Despite the heavy grinding it received last year, turf on Modoc field is now in excellent condition. It has been carefully groomed throughout the summer, and helpful in this effort has been new traveling sprinkler equipment installed at Modoc field.

Fields Levelled

This sprinkler is rigged up with a long cable, which slowly winds up on a drum, pulling the sprinkler across the field. As a result, watering has been more

evenly accomplished at Modoc field than ever before.

Practice fields near the natatorium have been leveled and eventually will be turfed. The high school has acquired a new piece of property, which lies between the natatorium and the corner of Modoc field. This will be used for practice.
