CHURCH OF AIR NOW HEARD ON 200 STATIONS

The Young People's Church of the Air, Inc., conducted by the Rev. Percy B. Crawford, will be broadcast from 1:30 to 2 o'clock every Sunday afternoon over more than 200 stations on the coast-to-coast network of the Mutual Broadcasting system, beginning August 30. In addition, plans are now underway to have this program aired by shortwave from station HCJB, Quito, Ecuador, to South American listeners.

From a modest beginning 11 years ago, the Young People's Church of the Air, one of the first programs to feature non-denominational gospel services, has grown steadily in popular appeal. Last April Rev. Crawford responded to public demand by scheduling his program for broadcast every Sunday during the summer months for the first time.

Large Audience

The Young People's Church of the Air until now has been heard over 85 stations. The present tremendous expansion in station outlets will give this program one of the largest audiences of any continuing radio feature. Instrumental music, a choir and a vocal quartet are used to complement the inspirational message preached by Rev. Crawford. All of the musical arrangements are made by Mrs. Crawford.

During the year, in addition to his appeal to his radio audience of many millions, Rev. Crawford addresses numerous meetings and rallies in all sections of the country.

Catfish Stew Makes Tasty "Meat" Dish

Speaking of local markets, how about the river that runs through so many towns. This catfish stew recipe comes from Georgette Harvey in "Porgy and Bess," the musical classic. Miss Harvey says it might solve the meat shortage problem right now.

Catfish Stew

(Serves 4 to 5)

One-half lb. fat or butts meat, 1 large or 2 medium potatoes, 2 small green peppers, 1 lb. potatoes (more if desired), 2 1/2 lbs. catfish.

Break up the catfish into small pieces and soak 15 minutes in salted water. Dice the fat or butts meat, stew in a little water for 20 minutes. Simmer, do not cook rapidly. Add onions and green pepper, cut into small pieces, to stewing meat and simmer for 15 minutes. Then add catfish and simmer with a little more water added. When meat and fish are almost tender, add the diced potatoes and cook only until potatoes are tender.

Sliced Cucumber Pickles (2 pints)

One quart cucumber slices, 3 small white onions, sliced, 3 tablespoons salt, ice, 2 teaspoons

curry powder, 1 cup sugar, 1 cup vinegar, 1 cup water, 2 teaspoons mustard seed, 1 teaspoon celery seed, 1 clove garlic, minced.

Select 6 or 9 slender cucumbers about 6 inches long. Wash, cut off ends and slice about 1/2 inch thick. Mix slices and onion rings with salt in a bowl of ice cubes. Stand 2 or 3 hours; drain. Mix curry and sugar in saucepan. Add remaining ingredients. Boil for 5 minutes. Add cucumber and onion slices and bring to boil. Pour into hot, clean preserving jars; seal.
