We discover in a perusal of northwest sport pages this week considerable Washington doubt about the 1942 Washington football team with which Ralph (Pest) Welch will make his maiden venture as a top coach. Quite a few of the sportsters north of the Columbia feel that Pest's backfield will be lacking in altitude and will therefore be passed dizzy. This, coupled with a prevailing Seattle opinion that Welch lost too many games to build a conference caliber line, seems to make the Huskies a doubtful entry.

It might be mentioned in passing, however, that of late years the sports writers have been prophesying badly, so you can take their dark views anent Washington for what you please.

Getting back to that altitude question, one scribe points out that the three first line quarterbacks measure 5-10 1/2, 5-11 and 5-11, the four top halfbacks all are under a 5-foot 11-inch ceiling, and the tallest fullback available is a stubby 5-10 1/2.

Offensively the company would appear to pack a good wallop as most of the members are heavy enough despite limited stature. But when the time comes to defend against passes—high, spot passes—well, asks our commentator, what is Washington to do?

The boys are simply "far too short for effective defensive guarding against aerial in a conference where huge, rangy ends with rubber legs and prehensile hands and lanky, pass-grabbing halfbacks are specialties. Enemy scouts (if any) are going to note this size deficiency first thing (it's probably well catalogued all around the loop already) and Welch is going to wish he could mount his characters on soapboxes for the duration.

"What height Welch does have in his backfield is down among the fourth-stringers, so there's no paper solution to the problem. It's a shortage that's liable to be fatal."

Baseball Offers World Series Kitty Share

RED CROSS, USO ASKED TO ACCEPT MORE THAN \$350,000 OF CLASSIC'S RECEIPTS

CHICAGO, Aug. 28 (AP)—Baseball's offer to share an estimated \$357,544 to \$379,008 of its world series kitty was extended today to two organizations—the USO and the Red Cross—and needed only their formal acceptance and subsequent approval by government authorities to go into effect this fall.

K. M. Landis, commissioner of baseball, said that to his knowledge the world series never before has been conducted as a benefit.

After conferring yesterday with Presidents Will Harridge of the American league and Ford Frick of the National league, Landis revealed the plan and said the two intended

beneficiaries had not been consulted beforehand. In New York, Paul Badger, administrative vice president of the USO, declared his organization was "extremely grateful at this gesture and we will be glad to participate in the world series receipts."

Landis drew up 1942 series estimates based on last fall's classic between the New York Yankees and Brooklyn Dodgers, which teams appear headed for an encore meeting this year, and allowing for the fact the first two games will be in the National league champion's home park, came up with statistics which included:

The \$100,000 for radio rights,

previously shared by players and "baseball"—including the commissioner's office, the two leagues and the two participating clubs, all would be turned over to the USO and Red Cross. Of the \$160,731 gate receipts from each of the first two games, approximately \$81,972 each day

would go into the players' pool and \$78,748 to baseball.

Of the \$262,800 receipts from games 3 and 4 in the larger Yankee stadium, approximately \$128,722 would go each day into the USO-Red Cross pool and \$134,028 into the players' kitty, "baseball" getting nothing.

Richards Impressive; Ted Schroeder, Louie Brough Advance Into 2nd Round

NEW YORK, Aug. 28 (AP)—The national tennis championships have been going on only one day at Forest Hills, but it is obvious that California is not going to let the war interfere with its normal production of outstanding young stars.

The latest from out that way is George Richards, a left-handed, 19-year-old from Montebello, a suburb of Los Angeles. Although southpaws are something new, even for California, Richards looks like he may rate with the best that state has produced. Which is to say, the best.

In his opening match yesterday Richards swarmed all over one of the east's best junior players, Irvin Dorfman of New York City and Yale, 6-3, 6-3, 6-4. His second round match is against George Ball of El Paso, Texas, tomorrow.

Another west coast youngster who created a fine impression in his first appearance was James Brink, a lanky 17-year-old from Seattle, who carried no less a campaigner than Sidney Wood Jr., to five sets before he capitulated by 5-7, 7-5, 6-0, 3-6, 6-0.

The west coast already had the two tournament favorites, Ted Schroeder of Glendale, Calif., and Louie Brough of Beverly Hills. They won their opening matches as scheduled, in straight sets. Miss Brough looked slightly magnificent as she swept through Mrs. Marjorie Gladman Van Ryn, 6-0, 6-2, and Schroeder surmounted a straining tendon in his racket wrist to pummel Lieut. Russell Bobbitt of Fort Knox, 7-5, 6-2, 8-6.

Today the fans had something to look forward to in the initial appearances of Pancho Segura, the scamping Ecuadorian, and Jinx Falkenberg, the model, who ran a dead heat in pre-tournament publicity.

Pros Still Favored By Three Touchdowns

Huge Stadium Sold Out; 101,200 Fans Expected to Watch Zuppke's Last Stand

CHICAGO, Aug. 28 (AP)—One of the finest teams of college all-stars in nine years is figured by football wisemen to be about three touchdowns shy of matching the Chicago Bears tonight in Soldier Field.

George Halas ran his National Professional champions through final practices last night under the lights of Soldier Field, where a record crowd of 101,200 persons will flock tonight. The customers will have paid approximately \$300,000 for their seats from which at least \$160,000 will go to army and navy relief funds.

Both teams are in peak form and confident of victory. A triumph for the All-Stars would break a three-year monopoly held by the champions of the National Professional Football league and would be the third win for the collegians in the nine years of the series. Two games ended in ties.

Halas, the mastermind behind the Bears' famous T-formation, thinks the game will be a lot tougher than last year, when the Bears defeated the Collegians 37 to 13.

He's lost keymen to the armed forces but still has a powerful outfit of veterans left.

Bob Zuppke, noted for springing upsets, has coached the Collegians into a highly fighting mood during the last month, filling them with ultra-fancy, fan-flashing plays along the way. After more than 30 years in the coaching business—29 of which were spent at the University of Illinois before he left last fall—Zuppke is giving the sport his farewell after tonight.

Ceremonies will start at 8:15 p. m. (central war time).

WYATT AIDS BUMS' WIN

ST. LOUIS, Aug. 28 (AP)—Credit Whitlow Wyatt with an assist in Brooklyn's triumph over the Cardinals yesterday. At his own request, Wyatt pitched batting practice before the game for the first time this year, to "get the boys started." After hitting against Wyatt, the Dodgers, who had dropped three straight to the Cards, went out and salvaged the finale, 4-1.

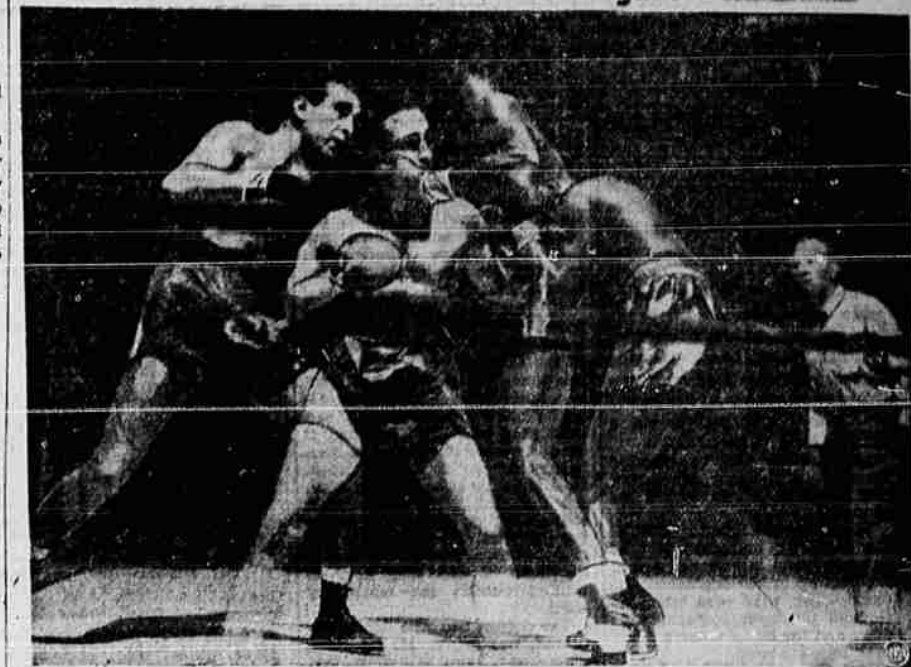
MAN MOUNTAIN LOSES

The world series is beginning to look safe again for the Brooklyn Dodgers and New York Yankees. What little excitement had been breathed into the two major league pennant races in recent days apparently was expelled yesterday as the Brooklyn Dodgers bounced out of their lethargy and quelled the St. Louis Cardinals 4-1 and the onrush of the Boston Red Sox was checked by the Cleveland Indians 4-2.

The Dodgers had the cocksureness taken out of them at St. Louis as the Redbirds took the first three tussles, but the net result of the struggle in Sportsman's park was to send the Dodgers in to the last month of the season with a 5 1/2-game lead.

The Cardinals came back last night with Max Lanier in the fourth game of the series with the Dodgers in just two days' rest since he had held Brooklyn to four hits Monday night. The stocky southpaw wasn't up to the job, however, and was shelved for five successive singles and three runs in the fourth. Another lefthander, Ernie White, came in and was pelted for an additional single and Brooklyn's final run before getting his house in order.

The veteran Curt Davis, once a Cardinal, won his 14th triumph of the season as he held the Redbirds to eight scattered hits and knocked in two of Brooklyn's runs with a single. The Red Sox' string of nine consecutive victories not only was broken in the only American league game, but Cecil (Tex) Hughson's skein of 11 straight pitching triumphs also was snapped as Jim Bagby of the Indians hurled a five-hitter. One of the five, however, was Ted Williams' 27th home run in the first inning.

At Cincinnati the New York Giants beat the Reds 2-0 by bunching five hits in the 11th inning after Harry Feldman and Ray Starr had labored through 10 scoreless innings.

Hank Gornicki provided a one-man show at Pittsburgh by pitching two-hit ball and hitting a two-run homer to lead the Pittsburgh Pirates to a 5-0 victory over the Boston Braves.

Tacoma Tigers Tip Salem Solons, 3-1

SALEM, Aug. 28 (AP)—The Tacoma Tigers needed only eight hits, five of which were for extra bases, to win their third straight Western International league baseball game, 3-1, from the Salem Senators last night.

The extra base wallops, four singles and a triple, were largely responsible for the single counters rung up by the Tigers in the second, third and ninth innings.

Pacific Coast league baseball fans used to mumble sympathetically about "poor old Tom Seals," but today they have only praise for the plodding San Francisco southpaw pitcher.

Seals, far down on the performance list for league hurlers, turned out a four-hit job yesterday to blank the formidable Seattle Rainiers, 4-0, and outpitched Dick Barrett, the loop's leading chucker.

The lower division Seals bunched three runs in the sixth on two hits and a pair of walks off Barrett, who was charged with his 12th loss against 23 wins this season.

Batters took the limelight at Los Angeles where the first-place Angels pounded four Portland hurlers for 20 safeties to win 16-6.

The excitement was no less at San Diego where Hugh Luby, Oakland, third baseman, surpassed a 25-year-old league record for continuous games played by participating in his 679th contest since 1939.

Apparently inspired by the event, the Oaks took the twilight game, 2-1, behind the six-hit pitching of Jack Salvoso, who chalked up his 18th win of the season.

Sacramento, one of the twilight teams, edged out Hollywood, 3-2, in a 10-inning tussle decided by Ray Mueller's homer.
