

OPPOSITION LOOMS ON BIG SPENDING TAX

WASHINGTON, Aug. 31 (AP)—The senate finance committee voted today to retain most of the house schedule of corporation taxes in the new revenue bill, including a 90 per cent excess profits levy and combined rate of 45 per cent on normal and surtax income.

The committee voted 11 to 8 for the 45 per cent rate after it had rejected, 13 to 6, a motion by Senator Bailey (D-N. C.) to cut this to 40 per cent. The treasury had proposed that the combined rate be made 55 per cent.

80 Per Cent Ceiling
Approving the rates established by the house for corporations with \$25,000 annual income or less, the committee voted 9 to 6 to insert a new treasury proposal by which no corporation would pay more than 80 per cent of its net excess profits tax income in taxes to the government.

Meantime, a forthcoming treasury proposal for imposition of a stiff new tax on individual spending today appeared headed for a stormy reception.

Proponents of a retail sales tax served notice shortly after Chairman George (D-Ga.) had announced that the committee would receive the new treasury proposals Tuesday, that they did not like the levy which George outlined to reporters yesterday.

Social Security Raise
As explained by the chairman, a tax of possibly 10 per cent would be levied against all money spent by an individual over and above certain specified exemptions. George said treasury officials hoped that such a levy, which would be in addition to regular income and other taxes, would yield between four and five billion dollars and at the same time check inflationary spending.

The treasury meanwhile was reported to have served notice on the finance committee that it would seek to increase social security taxes to a combined total of 5 per cent on employers and employees after work on the revenue bill is completed.

SOVIETS MAY NOT FEEL LIKE HELPING

PORTLAND, Aug. 31 (AP)—Soviet Russia may be unwilling to assist the United Nations in opening a second front against Japan unless they open a second front in western Europe, Lawrence Empey predicted yesterday.

The long-time Far Eastern correspondent for the London Daily Mail said in an interview, "When we ask them (the Russians) for help from Siberia in attacking the Japanese mainland, they might ask: 'What did you do to help us against the Germans?'"

He said a Russian officer recently told him that a second front in Europe would pull 750,000 German troops and several thousand planes from the Russian front. "You would lose 100,000 men in the attack, but it would give us time to reorganize and come in against the Germans in the east stronger than ever," he quoted the Russian as saying. And I agree with him."

Religious Freedom At Stake, College Head Tells GOP's

PORTLAND, Aug. 31 (AP)—Religious freedom is the greatest issue at stake in the war, Dr. William G. Everson, president of Linfield college, told a republican party rally yesterday.

The four cornerstones of America, the retired major-general said, are economic freedom, education, law and order, and our system of family life. "Atop all these is religion," he said, "and without freedom of religion none of them can exist."

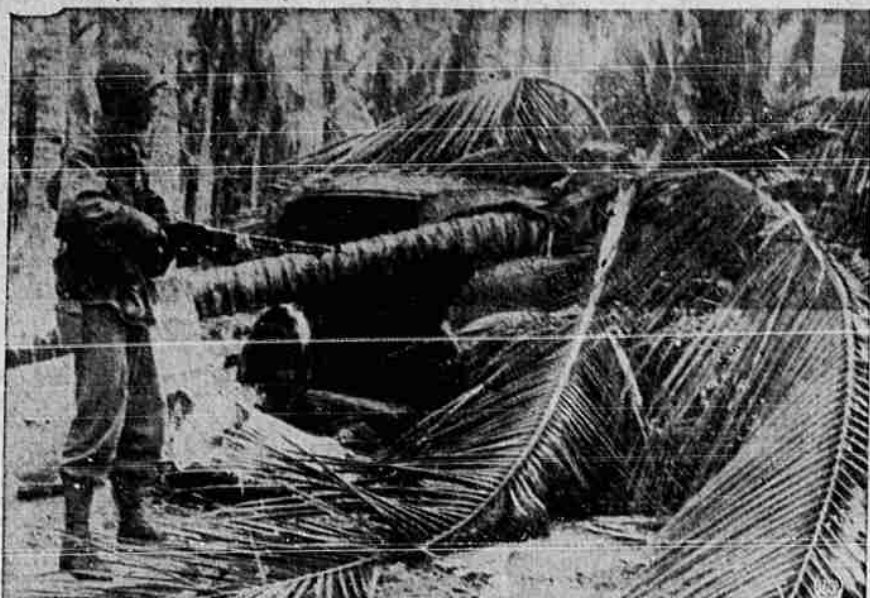
Earl Snell, GOP nominee for governor, charged the Roosevelt administration and democratic congressmen with "side-tracking essential win-the-war measures until after the November elections."

Better Training, Better Education Make AEF of '42 Better Than in '17

WITH THE UNITED STATES FORCES IN BRITAIN, Aug. 31 (Wide World)—The soft-voiced American colonel of engineers looked over a good-sized chunk of United States equipment in Great Britain and remarked "We're so far ahead of what we were in 1917 there's no comparison," and that's what a lot of people in this country are thinking today.

From Whitey, a mongrel dog brought overseas in a barrack-bag to mascot for an infantry battalion, to the most impressive gold-braid, the second AEF to Europe looks far better than the first.

Better Looking
It is generally agreed that the American soldier of 1942 is better educated, more physically fit and better trained than was the doughboy of 1917-18.

Moreover, he certainly is more personable.

Many a soldier from the United States arrived here in the last war wearing an ill-fitting uniform—a uniform which never was any great shakes even when it was the right size—with bulky equipment clanking about him. Possibly he even wore one of those old-fashioned campaign hats, with the wide brim and the dents in the crown.

The American soldier in Britain now invariably is a well-appearing fellow. He received a good uniform before he left home, and he keeps it cleaned and pressed.

Good Reception
When United States soldiers came over in the last war, they were roundly cheered by the English, who gave the newcomers many of the good things they had. It is rather the other way 'round this time. Rationing being what it is, the United States soldier is more likely to share with the British his own good things, instead of accepting the proffered largesse from the people of this country.

Several United States army officers said they believed the British were more hospitable to Americans than they were 25 years ago, and that American soldiers generally were getting

along better with the British than did their predecessors.

Miss Sergeant's Okish
A colonel cited "a good example":

"I just got a letter from a prominent woman asking if she might entertain a group of American officers at dinner. They just didn't do that sort of thing here before."

Known from the home cantonnments to the western front, in the last war, as a choleric, misanthropic "belly-robbler," and still something less than persona grata among enlisted men, the mess sergeant got his word in:

"Everything's better now. The food, clothes, equipment, all the living conditions."

"Sure there's grumbling, but that's the army."

No Gripe Coming
And now, let a soldier in the ranks speak:

"If we go on getting fed this well and if the people here don't get fed up with us, we'll have no gripe coming. As for extra grub, let them send over guns and ammunition, not food that we can get along without. After all, the British have been getting along on this food—and much worse."

"I like the British because they mind their own business. Why should anyone think we'd have to be coddled? Are we a bunch of Camp Fire girls?"

GREYHOUND ASKS CO-OPERATION

Commenting on the transportation situation, particularly as it will affect those who plan to travel over the Labor day holidays, F. W. Ackerman, vice president of Pacific Greyhound Lines, pointed out that a heavy extra burden will be thrown on the already overloaded facilities of public carriers. Because of this, Pacific Greyhound is urging the public to observe certain suggestions that will aid in the handling of essential wartime traffic and at the same time help those who must travel and keep delay and crowding to a minimum.

The bus official emphasized that military traffic cannot stop for holidays, that war workers must get to their jobs as usual, and that labor has given up the celebration of its traditional holiday in order to carry on with vital war production.

The suggestions offered by Greyhound to those going away over the Labor day weekend follow:

Get full information on trips and schedules in advance.

Purchase tickets now to avoid the last minute rush at depot.

Take as little baggage as possible.

Take short trips in preference to long ones.

If possible to arrange it, leave before Saturday, and return after Monday.

Ackerman concluded by urging: "If the Labor day trip you are planning is for pleasure only, postpone it—buy war bonds instead."

DRAFT QUOTA INFORMATION SLOWED DOWN

WASHINGTON, Aug. 31 (AP)—Rep. Coffee (D-Wash.), said today he had learned during a conference with Brig. General Lewis B. Hershey, director of the selective service system, and Col. C. G. Parker, Hershey's executive assistant, it would be impossible for the selective service to advise draft boards much in advance as to the quotas they will be called upon to fill.

Coffee said the officials had advised him enormous numbers of men would be called within the next few months to fill army requirements. Training facilities are ready and waiting, Coffee said, and the army is now ready to proceed with "full steam ahead."

Clarification
General Hershey also pointed out, Coffee said, that due to the heavy rush of voluntary enlistments, particularly following the battle of the Solomons, the Aleutian battles and the raid on Dieppe, inevitable delays in correlation and adjustment of data develop and that two to four months sometimes must elapse before proper credit can be given states and quotas reallocated.

Coffee said he also learned selective service officials are in frequent conference with the war manpower commission and that Governor McNutt is striving to retain, to the fullest extent compatible with the need of the armed services, skilled workers and workers indispensable to war industries. Selective service officials, Coffee said, expect a clarification of this situation to be published in the near future "so that the public may be apprised in advance what to expect."

Dry Kiln Operators Gather at Moore Park for Picnic

Seventy-four dry kiln operators and their families from Oregon and northern California gathered at Moore park Sunday for the annual picnic. They came from as far south as Westwood and as far north as Bend. One of the operators, Cloy Brown, flew from Westwood in his private plane.

The Dry Kiln Operators' club, whose president is R. Heber Radcliffe of the Ewauna Lumber and Box company, meets each month to discuss technical problems involved in the drying of lumber and to profit from each other's experience. They will meet in Klamath Falls in September and their October meeting will be held in Bend if it is found possible to charter a bus for the trip. Since Klamath Falls is centrally located, most of their meetings are held here, it was pointed out.

Corn Is Ready to Can-- Here's How to Do It Well

(Editor's Note: This is another in a series of weekly articles on the preservation of foods, released through the cooperation of the Klamath county home demonstration agent's office and the Klamath county nutrition committee.)

Are you among those thrifty homemakers taking advantage of the growing season to can the winter food supply? If so, you know corn is ready, or soon will be, for canning.

Contrary to general belief, corn is not hard to can successfully. There are a few precautions which must be observed and the most important one is careful selection of the corn. It must be in the "milk" stage. To test it, press fingernail in kernel; if milk flows freely it is right for canning. Corn continues to harden after removing from stalk and flavor decreases rapidly. Because of this it is important to can corn as soon as possible after gathering. Do not allow it to stand overnight or longer, as this will cause loss of flavor and make canning more difficult.

Once canning is begun, work rapidly so corn does not stand

at semi-hot temperatures. The preferable way of preparing it is cutting corn from cob before pre-cooking. This allows corn to be packed boiling hot into jars and aids in processing.

After pre-cooking (boiling) for 3 to 5 minutes, the hot corn should be packed loosely into jar to within one inch of top. Water in which corn was pre-cooked or boiling water is used to fill jar within 1/2 inch of top. This allows good proportion of liquid to solid material. Wipe sealing edge of jar with clean cloth and adjust jar cap. For "self-sealing" cap place lid on jar with sealing composition next to glass and screw the band firmly tight. Do not allow jars of corn to stand, but place them at once in canner to process. The pressure cooker is preferable and processing time for corn, whole kernel, packed hot, is 75 minutes for pint jars and 80 minutes for quart jars at 11 pounds pressure. For corn, cream style, packed hot, process 105 minutes at 11 pounds pressure in pint jars. When processing is complete, remove jars from processing vessel as soon as possible and

YANKS PREPARE AT TOWN IN INDIA

NEW YORK, Aug. 31 (AP)—A New York Times dispatch by Herbert L. Matthews from "a town in India" said today that an American force numbering thousands was there developing its resources.

"Curiously enough, the only abundance here is an enormous quantity of precious material booked for China under lease-lend that cannot get to China now that the Burma road is closed and cannot be used by the Americans and British because of that technicality," Matthews wrote.

The town was unidentified, but this might indicate it was in eastern India near Burma where the Japanese have concentrated troops.

"Right now this town can take everything that the enemy might throw at it," Matthews added.
