

Pelicans Trip Crater Nine, 5-2

Benham Twirls 4-Hitter In Valley Saturday Night; Locals Score 4 in Seventh

In a game which was for nothing more than grudge and incidental cash, Klamath's Pelicans topped Medford's champions Saturday night, 9-5, on the valley diamond.

Losers in three of the last four tiffs with the Medfords—a trio of beatings which meant the loss of both the Oregon-California league title and the president's cup playoff—the Klamath Saturday tossed in Ken Benham who turned in a classic four-hitter which beat Lieut. Norm Lewis, the valley's team's ace pitcher.

Lewis held the locals to six bingles but lapsed badly enough in the seventh to give up four runs.

The game was a sparkler throughout from Medford's initial run in the first. They got it when Swaryck walked and scored on Worthley's double off the left field fence.

The Bigbills evened it in the second on three Crater errors and no hits and in the seventh really opened up. Marshall started it by getting on via a bobble but Benham whiffed. Larson and Gross singled, sending Marshall home. Eyestone then walked leading the bases. Crapo's single to left scored Larson and Gross.

Hatfield tied out to right but Goldbar got a pass to again fill the bag. Lewis passed Haynes to force in a run, leaving the paths again crowded but Marshall struck out to end it.

The Medfords retaliated with one in their half when Lewis was safe on an error and came home on Swaryck's double.

The game definitely wound up baseball for the year for the Pelicans and gave them their eighteenth victory in 27 starts against league competition during the summer.

Vancouver Cinches W-1 Loop Pennant

The Vancouver Capilano have written their last remaining hopes for the Tacoma Tigers held of winning the Western international league baseball pennant this year and have clinched the bunting themselves.

The Caps doused the Tigers' final mathematical chance yesterday with an 8-6 seven-inning victory over the Tacomas after losing the first game of a doubleheader, 17-9. The games were at Tacoma.

The split decision left Vancouver 11 games ahead with but nine games on their schedule while Tacoma has 10. Capture of the pennant by Vancouver for the first time in the six-year W-1 league history marks the conclusion of a bitterly contested season that saw the two teams alternate in first place until July 19, when the Caps assumed the lead and never gave it up.

Ted Schroeder, This confused observer thought Frankie Parker looked swell in trimming Richard Hart of Miami, 6-1, 6-3, 7-5. Yet two neighbors in the press marquee said positively that Frankie hadn't shown a thing.

Pancho Segura of Ecuador, another title possibility, was somewhat disappointing in his first appearance. The form he displayed in beating Ensign Ronald Edwards, 9-7, 6-3, 6-1 will not take the big cup back to South America.

William Talbot was close to brilliant at times in defeating E. Victor Seixas Jr., of Philadelphia yesterday, 6-3, 6-2, 8-6.

Up to today, all the 11 seeded players—eight domestic and three foreign—still were in there pitching.

Like cuffless trousers and ceiling prices, that pennant duel between the Brooklyn Dodgers and St. Louis Cardinals—which most folks figured would get here sooner or later—finally has arrived.

After coasting along in the comparative safety of a lengthy lead through most of the National league campaign, the Dodgers found themselves separated from the threatening Cardinals today by nothing more than three short games.

Perhaps as responsible for the leg injury of Center Fielder Pete Reiser which has put the National league batting leader in the hospital after hobbling for nearly two weeks.

Pistol Pete, who has failed to get a hit in his last 15 official trips to the plate, finally was sent to Johns Hopkins last night for treatment of a torn ligament in his left thigh.

The Dodgers fired both barrels at the Pirates yesterday and came away with nothing better than an even break, while the Cardinals swept a doubleheader with the Boston Braves for a total of 19 victories in 22 games.

Whitlow Wyatt pitched the Dodgers to a 3-1 decision in the opener, but Larry French failed to last through the first inning of the nightcap as the Bucs pounded him and three relievers for a dozen hits and triumphed, 9-5.

The Cardinals beat the Braves, 8-3, in their first game. The second went 11 innings before Harry Gumbert, who pitched two-hit ball in five innings of relief, doubled for the run that won for him and the Cards, 3-2.

In the American league, the St. Louis Browns split with the Boston Red Sox while the Yanks were winning a pair from the Detroit Tigers.

Red Ruffing pitched five-hit ball to beat the Tigers, 7-1, in the first game but it took a tenth inning single by Pinch Hitter George Selkirk to decide the second for the Yanks, 4-3.

John Niggeling hurled the Browns to a 4-1 first game victory, beating the Red Sox for the fifth time this year. The Sox bounced back to take the second, 12-6.

Cleveland and Washington divided their bargain bill, the Indians winning the first game, 3-1, and the Senators capturing the nightcap, 2 to 0.

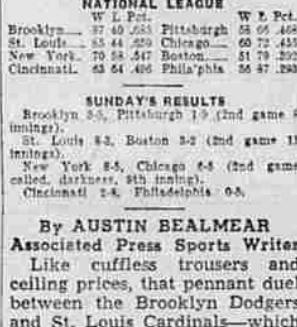
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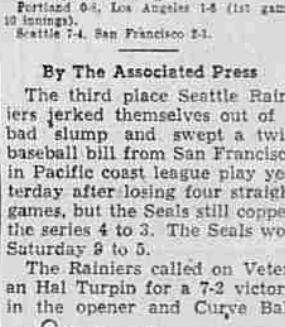

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Sam Baugh, Washington Redskins Trample Army All-Stars, 26-7, in L. A.

Kimbrough Gallops 58 Yards for Stars' Only Score in Benefit Tiff

LOS ANGELES, Aug. 31 (AP)—The powerful Washington Redskins won the game, 26 to 7, but the Army's western football squad carried the laurels of battle off the field.

The Army team, heading for Denver today for its next grid engagement with a professional aggregation, the Chicago Cardinals, was decisively trounced by the Redskins, but they put up a surprisingly stubborn struggle for the full four quarters.

Major Wallace Wade, coach of the Army outfit, summed yesterday's opening contest for the Army relief fund when he commented:

"Thank goodness, we won't meet any more Sammy Baughs on this tour."

Baugh, plus speedy Dick Todd, his backfield mate, plus the artistic toe of Bob Master-son, combined with experience and a well polished machine, brought the army's downfall before the 55,000 fans who saw the game.

On the Army credit side was a raring, plunging Texan, long John Kimbrough, who broke loose for 58 yards and the Army's lone touchdown of the game on the second play after the opening kickoff.

"No, I wasn't disappointed with my boys," said Wade. "I figured we'd lose by two touchdowns."

"Baugh, of course, is amazing (Sammy completed 23 out of 39 passes) and their blocking was better than I had expected."

Receipts total around \$80,000, of which about \$45,000 will go to the Army relief fund.

The Rev. Clement Kane, C. S. C., athletic board chairman, said abolition of the rule barring freshmen placed football on the same basis as other university sports which already have opened varsity competition to first-year students.
